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Judie's Journal

Hi Sewing Friends,

Summer is just about officially over with slightly cooler weather, vacations ending

and kids back in school so we start to have different trends in our wardrobe. We plan for more cozy and comfort apparel for the fall

and winter and what says cozy better than a quilt. No, you are not going to wrap yourself in a quilt and stay inside all winter but you are going to incorporate a quilted look in your garments. The fashion runways right now are hot with the Quilting Look to include well known designers like Calvin Klein and Dior. Patchwork and quilting motifs are shown in skirts, jackets, tops, wallets, purses and even household items such as linens and home dec pillows. Purses, such as Coach, have applique quilt designs on their bags. Trends are showing younger Americans taking a new interest in Contemporary Quilting (quilting with a more artsy flair and blocks of bold colors) and they enjoy wearing this look as a fashion statement. Quilting in clothing can be as simple as a subtle applique on a collar or cuff or as bold as a quilted jacket. Either way, for those that sew their own garments, it is a great way to incorporate your creative ideas and talents and let everyone see your talents in the garments you wear in public. Also a great way to start a conversation about ASG when people comment on your outfit! For our ancestors, quilted garments were a necessity for warmth but now with the interest in repurposing and recycling the "Americana look" has returned. For many of us quilters we have worn this look proudly for years but we are not alone in the fashion world anymore. As sewists and textile artists we still have the ability to create one of a kind items instead of off the rack. We can show off our skills with intricate patterns, fancy stitching and creative embellishing. For those of you that are non-quilters a simple quilt block pattern can be beautifully incorporated in the back of a jacket, along a hemline or as a decorative pocket. Try saving a usable part of a vintage quilt for part of the garment instead of getting rid of the whole thing. Since piecing a quilt is very time consuming it is more cost effective for manufactured items to have smaller blocks in certain areas of the garment, but you as sewists can add as much or as little as you like. The fashion industry may not be able to keep up with this trend and offer it at reasonable prices for and extended time so you may see more quilting motifs used instead of pieced blocks. As a quilter I am excited to see any interest generated in this art and a way to promote awareness of our American heritage.

So on that note, what better time to learn a new quilting technique than at our Chapter Event on October 13th in North Augusta. (See flyer on p.5 for more info) Linda Barrett Hanslip, an award winning quilter and nationally recognized instructor (and a member of our Chapter!!!!!) will teach us how to add sparkle and glitz to quilted items and garments with the appropriate use of crystals. Join the chapter for this fun event and test your creativity with a new skill at the "Bling Event".

It's not too late to register for the Chapter Give Back event in Aiken on September 22. Anita Drennon, Sulky certified teacher (also a Chapter member!!!!) will guide us for a fun day in making a unique fabric water bottle holder (for holding a plastic water bottle) in



The project will require 1/2 yd. 45" wide fabric for fish body, lining and fins (you will need an add'l fat quarter for contrasting fins) — 1 each 3.5"x 10.5" red cotton fabric for lips — 1 each 10.5"x11" lining fabric.



ASG.org educational video on "Specialty Needles". At the Moonlight Stitchers August meeting, I led the program introducing ASG National's web site to our group and watching the educational video on "Specialty Needles". You would think that after many, many years of sewing I would know everything there was to know about needles. Not so. Even I learned something. The video covered some basic information about needles in general and shared web sites that could be helpful. Then it went into detail on easy threading needles, Jeans/Denim needles, Wing Needles, Twin Needles and Leather Needles. Along with the needle information, suggestions for fabric type and hints on getting better results were included. Personally, I didn't know there was an easy threading needle for a sewing machine as well as a few other tips. I'll let you find your own by watching. The video is only 40 minutes long and well presented.

Cutting Line Design patterns have A LOT of ease we are all finding, so it's important to consider the finished garment measurements when working with this pattern line specifically.

What's Ahead:



It was nice to get to know her better and she was a great tour guide for our adventure to The Strip. Betty Watts, a chapter member and part of the Notions publication team was there and was very



busy attending to the business side of the conference.

the 2019 conference is Boston!


