Diane's Discussions

Summertime is here and it brings back memories of times on Folly Beach spent with my family. My grandparents would rent a house right on the beach for the week of the 4th of July. My cousins and I would swim, built sandcastles, and just have fun playing on the beach. A favorite activity was when Granddaddy would tie a chicken neck on a string and we would catch crabs. Then my Grandmother would put on a big pot of boiling water to cook the crabs. The 4th of July was a special day filled with family, friends and food.

When I think of July 4th, I think of red, white and blue. As time goes on, things change, but those colors are just as special to me now as they were then. Now I belong to a group called Quilt of Valor. The Quilt of Valor Foundation began in 2003 when the founder and a quilter, Catherine Roberts, had a dream while her son was deployed in Iraq. "A young man was sitting on his bed hunched over. The permeating feeling was one of utter despair. I could see his war demons clustered around him, dragging him down into an emotional gutter. Then in the next scene I saw his demeanor change from one of despair to one of hope and wellbeing. The reason for this change was the quilt he had wrapped around himself." The message to Catherine was that quilts equal healing.

Since that day, the organization has spread to all 50 states and beyond. The first 100 quilts that Catherine and her friends made went to Walter Reed Hospital. Since then quilts have been awarded to those who served in numerous conflicts including but not limited to WWII, Korean War, Viet Nam, Desert Storm, Iraq and Afghanistan. Over 200,000 Quilts of Valor have been awarded to our active duty military and veterans.

The mission of Quilt of Valor Foundation (QOVF) is to cover service members and veterans touched by war with healing, peace, and comfort. To register to receive a QOV, go to the website QOVF.org and fill out the form. The service member or veteran can register or anyone can nominate a person by filling out the form with the military information.

QOVF is a volunteer organization that depends on volunteers to make the quilts and donations. Quilters make quilts that are usually a Patriotic theme using red, white, and blue fabrics. There are many quilt patterns used. Long armers quilt using various styles.

Since I have been associated with QOVF, I've made and presented numerous quilts. The service member or veteran receiving the quilt is so appreciative. They will share memories. When presenting to a group, they will share with each other about their experiences. It can be an emotional experience.

It's very rewarding to make and present these quilts. If you're interested in helping, we can always use your help.




Chapter Give-Back Event









Our workstations were as individual as we were. From early morning until late night someone could be found sewing, and projects were likely to be spread everywhere.

In this dress pattern she learned to put in a center back zipper, make a lined bodice and applied lace. There is a lot of gathering needed for the 3 tiered skirt and this is a process that Lexi finds tedious. She may think twice before picking a design with so many ruffles.

Cailyn has picked her pattern for her summer dress with a high-lo hemline and wants to use the same fabric as Lexi.

This will be the first garment that she makes so she will need a lot of guidance during this process. Her main goal is the construction and she says she will learn how to read the pattern for cutting and sewing directions after she has seen "how the whole contraption gets put together to look good"!

What's Ahead: They have a meeting date set for July 5th to work on their projects and in August they plan to make the items for the ecology/reusables project, finish their fish water bottles and visit some new quilt shops while on vacation. Their fall project is to make matching knit tops.

In June we had a good turnout, 12 members attending, to hear Daria and Tammy's program on "Choosing the Right Pattern for Your Fabric". They shared some great information and provided members with an excellent handout for future reference.

With so many members pre-

sent we had a lot of sharing as well. Charlene Shabi showed both a jacket and a vest. The jacket, from Hotpatterns, had nice lines but Charlene noted that it had a great deal, she estimated 10", of design ease. Daria, Tammy, and Marge brought their completed Koda Crossbody bags from our recent class (see photo on p.7). Tammy showed us



a laundry bag as well as a type of "ditty" bag made from a Pioneer Woman placemat.

MaryAnn Thompson described her recent project - cutting 90 5" inch squared for project at Peaceful Hearts quilt guild! Joyce Bowers recently finished some vests as family gifts and they were a big hit and fit well.

Cheri Dowd has been busy writing and other prep work for the classes she will be teaching at the ASG Conference in Boston.

What's Ahead:

At July's meeting Marge Mitchell will show the group how to make a type of pattern weight as an alternative to pins.

In August Conference attendees will share their experiences with us.

It was up to the individual on how they chose to embellish the bags and different trims as well as embroidery were used. What a cute, easy and useful project this was! In June, Margaret Tuck talked about the trend and interest in hand sewing. She described the Alabama Chanin method of sewing a t-shirt by hand. Chanin is a designer from Florence, AL who has developed a business of designing and making clothing by hand. She discussed how to use remnants and small fabric pieces to use in Kantha and

Boro style sewing as well as explaining techniques of mending holes in jeans. Margaret brought samples of a wool felt hot pad, a folk art eyeglasses case, a small Boro stitched bag and a Kantha cloth. The group looked through their stash at felted wool and fabric to create a project sampler. What an interesting and informative presentation! We were joined by Nancy Karp from the Augusta Chapter, and Ruby, another new addition to the group.

were sewn together end to end, the fun really began to sew them together to make one very long strip. It took two people holding and folding the fabric while Judie Travis continued to sew it together. With limited time at our meeting Nancy Frick took it home to sew the long strip side by side. There was lots of laughter and fun sharing as we sewed together. Looking forward to seeing the finished quilt. We enjoyed having Tina Gordon's daughter, Ashley join us for all the fun. Ashley is a Junior member and it is always a pleasure to have her join us.

June was an enjoyable night with Judie sharing interesting information on the dying and printing process of fabrics in the commercial industry. Here is a little bit of what she shared with us about the dying and printing process of fab-

rics in the commercial industry with a focus on the new digital printed fabrics. The most common and least expensive process is roller printing where dyes are rolled on top of the fabric with an 8" copper roller therefore the repeat on these fabrics is only 8". Screen printing can have up to a 22" repeat but is limited to 18



colors, as the machines are only set to handle 18 screens. The dyes are pushed through fine mesh laser cut screens and into the fiber. The new digital printed fabric, just now available in stores, has unlimited colors and the dye is sprayed on in a fine mist that

penetrates deep into the fibers. The colors and designs in this process are so vibrant and precise and can be easily identified as there are no color dots in the selvage.

Judie also demonstrated a new way of making a scarf and jacket using a Donut Tool, she bought at Sew Expo. We decided it could also be used make a great trimming for a blouse or jacket.



We had a visitor, Beth Henderson with us, she is a newbie at sewing and we hope she will join again. We told her she had found the right place to learn and enjoy her interest in creating with sewing.

Garment Group — West Columbia, SC

What's been happening in West Columbia?

At the May Garment Group meeting Cheri Dowd shared her insights on accessorizing our wardrobe with her presentation, "Pulling Yourself Together with Ac-



cessories." The goal of accessorizing is to look your best and be self-assured in your clothing and accessories. We should view our accessories as a creative opportunity. To quote Iris Apfel, "What's my style is not your style, and I don't see how you can define it. It's something that expresses who you are in your own way." Mix it up a little and don't stick to "your usual accessories." If you love pearls or diamonds or turquois, go ahead...and be phenomenal in your layering and choice of accessories.

Phenomenal...As y'all may know, I'm a podcast junkie. Recently, I listened to an Oprah "Super Soul Sunday Conversation" podcast where she shared her rendition of a poem by Maya Angelou entitled Phenomenal Woman. I'm sharing it now with all of you Phenomenal Women because it's a great way to start your day and to remember that we are not what we wear so much as who we are. Enjoy often. [Editor's note: due to space limitations, the poem has been moved to page 27.]

Cheri's presentation shared a message of dress who you are; don't be bribed by advertisements or current fashion in magazines. Take inspiration from them and wear what is comfortable to you. Pull it all together and own your look; express your personality. Cheri concluded with some coming trend ideas from magazines and her personal observations — think 70's: jewelry, bib necklaces, dangle earrings; chain embellishments; big jewels;

cinch belts; big and tall boots; kitten heels.

At our June meeting, Kathy McCartney graciously facilitated a color analysis presentation. During the meeting Kathy draped everyone in silver and gold and the group weighed in on what looked better on them to determine undertone. Undertone is different than skin tone (light, medium, dark) that chang-



es as one gets color from the sun. We learned that we must first determine our undertone (warm, neutral or cool). Draping with gold and silver fabric is an easy way to determine this. The right color will make one look healthy and alive as well as minimize imperfections in the skin. Wearing the wrong color brings out

imperfections such as lines and under eye circles and can also make teeth appear yellow.

Once we know the undertone we can determine if we should wear clear, bright colors or soft, muted colors, OR somewhere in between. This is determined by hair color, eye color, etc. It is interesting to note (especially with the age of the women in the group) that as one gets gray in her hair this means the colors that look good must get progressively lighter to compensate for a softer/lighter hair color.

There are 3 types of colors: Those that make you look fabulous, those that are OK and can be worn by most everyone, and those that are totally wrong. Kathy shared color charts and brought



our attention to what our likes/dislikes are, suggesting that what we gravitate to is probably very close to the colors we look best in day-to-day.

Overall, both presentations were very informative and really brought the bottom line home – if it makes you feel good, wear it; own it; be confident; be a phenomenal woman!

What's Ahead? Now that we have learned more about our coloring and accessorizing, we will turn our attention back to garment sewing/accessory makes.

In July, we will bring in fabric and/or patterns that we own and just don't know what to do. What is the best use of the fabric? Is it the right color for me? What is the best fabric for a particular pattern? We will share and provide feedback to each other. Who knows, maybe even swap some items!! J Hope to see you there!

Mary demonstrated how she transfers photos onto fabric using several different techniques and supplies. Next she showed how she works with wool, appliqueing onto her many quilt and decorator items. Last she showed us how she makes bangle bracelets from soft drink bottles and various items such as yarn, scraps of fabric adding beads. We were paying such close attention, we totally forgot to take pictures. We plan one of our meeting later

Cindy Howe, the new person, told the things she liked best and what she learned and Judie, the event planner, was able to add some insight as to why things were done a certain way and also gained some knowledge on how to improve/ change things for next year. We both had so many items for show and tell



that were all made at the retreat. Both ladies made at least three tops, Cindy drafted and fitted and cut a pattern for a cute summer dress and Judie made an Oriental wall hanging, a drawstring bag and started on a Christmas wall hanging. A great deal of persuading went on to encourage others from the group to try the retreat next year.



The program was a demo on folding fabric squares using Origami techniques. Judie

showed this technique using the book "Fantastic Fabric Folding", by Rebecca Wat. She picked a design called Stars where the center is a pinwheel and multiple squares can be sewn together to make a table runner, wall hanging, quilt or just use one for a small hot pad. Extra fabric squares were given out for those that were

brave enough to fold the pin wheels. Everyone was successful with their square but we realized fabric folding is a difficult technique to present to a group.

At the June meeting Lillian Lester present-



ed a program on sewing with a serger. She created a 12 page color handout as a reference. She discussed a 3 vs. 4 thread and how and where to use decorative threads. She showed a cute towel decorated with a crocheted edge use a 3 thread overlock stitch and variegated thread and a water soluble stabilizer on the bottom. She also discussed heirloom sewing with a serger using pin tucks and flat lock with a ribbon insert. Even though all machines do not have a chain stitch feature Lillian told us the use of this type of stich for creating decorative threads for couching. Learning how to use the specialty feet was an added a bonus with a demo on the beading foot, elastic foot, ruffler and cording

foot. The program inspired all of us to go home and try some of these techniques instead of just using the serger for seam finishing.


