Welcome Call to Order Introduction of Attendees Treasurer's Report

Bank account balance is \$1,403.53.

Topic: Legislative Updates and Community Concerns

Speaker: State Representative Javier Martinez

Key Legislative and Policy Updates:

1. Tax Relief Efforts:

- A bill passed to return more money to New Mexicans via income tax reductions—particularly benefiting middle-income earners.
- Intent to reintroduce similar legislation next year without reducing public services.

2. Behavioral Health Investment:

- \$250 million down payment made for a statewide regional behavioral health plan.
- Goal: Increase access to mental health and addiction treatment, especially for the homeless and underserved.
- An additional \$100 million has been allocated to a behavioral health trust fund to support long-term services.

3. Child Welfare System Reform:

- New laws aim to better protect children in state care, especially infants and toddlers.
- Some legislation now requires mothers with substance use histories to attend treatment programs.
- An independent ombuds office has been established to allow families to report concerns outside CYFD.

4. Public Safety Legislation:

- New measures target fentanyl trafficking, auto theft, and gun violence.
- Acknowledgement that previous laws were ineffective—this is a more focused approach.

5. Capital Outlay Projects:

- Over \$2 million allocated to local projects including:
 - Valley High School pool improvements.

- Street and park enhancements near Candelaria and 12th Street.
- Drew Center and surrounding landscaping upgrades.

6. Affordable and Transitional Housing:

- \$250M/year continues to be invested through the NM Mortgage Finance Authority for building diverse, affordable housing.
- A separate \$75M targeted for transitional housing for 1,200 unhoused individuals, largely focused on repurposing motels.
- Clarified: No transitional housing is currently planned for the immediate neighborhood.

Community Questions & Concerns:

1. Traffic Safety:

- Multiple residents raised urgent concerns about speeding, racing, and unsafe pedestrian areas along Rio Grande Blvd.
- Request for increased enforcement and physical infrastructure like medians or speed bumps.
- Representative suggested collaboration with city council and district staff to pursue grants and improvements.

2. Neighborhood Development & Zoning:

- Questions about potential changes to building codes (e.g., bill 2469 on unlimited building heights and duplex permissions).
- Representative clarified those bills didn't pass committee and thus didn't advance.

3. City & State Coordination:

- Emphasis placed on partnerships between local government and state representatives for future improvements.
- Encouraged residents to advocate at both the city and county levels, particularly through their city councilor.

4. Community Engagement:

- Representative invited ongoing feedback, questions, and meetings—often meets constituents informally at local coffee shops and breweries.
- o Encouraged direct communication via text for follow-up concerns.

Key Updates and Initiatives

1. Rio Grande Boulevard Traffic & Safety Study

- The City has hired a consultant to study traffic conditions from **Edelweiss School to Candelaria Road** along Rio Grande Blvd.
- The study includes:
 - Speed and crash data collection
 - Field reviews to identify dangerous intersections
 - Community engagement through public meetings starting later this summer (likely August)

- Conceptual traffic calming and safety designs (e.g., medians, curb extensions, landscape improvements)
- Community input will be critical to shaping the design proposals.

2. Speed and Noise Enforcement

- **Speeding:** Council has requested Rio Grande Blvd be added to the list for new **speed enforcement cameras** (APD currently operates 20, with plans to double).
- **Noise Cameras:** Three pilot noise cameras will be tested downtown. If successful, these may expand to other areas, including Rio Grande Blvd.
 - o Cameras capture both vehicle sound levels and license plates.
 - o Goal: Deter illegal mufflers and noise disturbances with enforceable penalties.

3. Nearby Infrastructure Projects

• Griego's Road Project (12th to 4th Street):

- Includes pedestrian refuge islands at ditch crossings (e.g., Hartwell Lateral, Drain Stream).
- Already designed and included in the upcoming \$375K general obligation bond package.

Speed Trailers Deployed:

- Two new mobile speed trailers have been purchased for the Valley Area Command.
- One was recently deployed near Grove and S Theatre to address local complaints.

4. Roundabout Confusion at Rio Grande Blvd

- Residents expressed safety concerns at the roundabout near the river due to inconsistent driver behavior (failure to yield, improper stopping).
- City is considering **public education campaigns** and possibly additional signage to improve roundabout usage and safety.

Resident Questions and City Responses

• Speeding and Dangerous Driving:

- Multiple residents described racing, overtaking on double yellow lines, and pedestrian hazards.
- APD and City staff acknowledged the urgency and will continue to deploy resources and move enforcement tools around problem spots.

Noise Complaints:

- o Loud mufflers and modified exhaust systems are frequently reported.
- Current ordinances exist, but enforcement is limited. The goal is to supplement with automated noise cameras and fines.

• Traffic near New Developments:

- A new apartment complex near Los Anaya's and Rio Grande Blvd raised concerns about increased traffic.
- Staff took note and will bring this to Councilor Baca for review, including whether traffic calming is needed in adjacent areas.

Concern About Speed Limit Increases:

- A pending city transportation plan may increase speed limits on parts of Rio Grande Blvd, despite neighborhood efforts to reduce them.
- Staff committed to gathering more information and ensuring community concerns are heard before changes are finalized.

Speaker: Colin Baugh

Topic: Water Management, River Health, and Community Engagement

Macro-Level Issues: Water Debt & Regional Water Management

• Elephant Butte Reservoir & Compact Debt:

- New Mexico is in water debt (approx. 124,000 acre-feet) under the Rio Grande Compact.
- o Storage at Elephant Butte is restricted until this debt is resolved.
- o Negotiations with Texas are ongoing, and progress appears to be underway.
- Comparatively, the Colorado River Basin has more severe debt issues, so there is hope for resolution here.

• Historic River Channel Problems:

- Since the 1970s, part of the Rio Grande has diverted ~200 cubic feet/second into the Elephant Butte floodplain wetlands, not the compact-counted channel.
- This water loss has affected New Mexico's compact obligations.
- MRGCD is advocating for structural improvements and has support from Senator Heinrich and other federal staff to fix this.

• Alternative Water Storage in Albuquerque:

 MRGCD has secured federal approval to explore alternative storage options closer to Albuquerque—an important policy shift that could increase local resilience.

District-Wide Efficiency and Equity Initiatives

- Improving Irrigation Efficiency:
 - Projects like ditch restoration and reshaping have led to major water savings (e.g., 4 hours saved per cycle in the North Valley).
 - MRGCD is investing in local-scale upgrades to boost conservation and equity across the system.

• Equity Concerns:

 Colin emphasized how smaller-scale, community-led projects (like those in the North Valley) deserve support, even if they serve fewer acres than large commercial farms.

Community Engagement and Youth Education

Reclaiming Forgotten Ditches and Lands:

- o Local volunteers are reopening locked gates and reclaiming overgrown acequias.
- MRGCD is working with Audubon Society, Rocky Mountain Youth Corps, and others to restore waterways and vegetation.

• Education Initiatives:

- Schools like Adobe Acres Elementary and Polk Middle School are working with MRGCD to bring irrigation and environmental education onto campuses.
- o APS is supportive, and a **district-wide garden program** is in the works.

Youth Leadership & Stewardship:

 MRGCD sees youth as future stewards of the valley and wants to involve them early in restoration, climate resilience, and land use planning.

Linear Park & Green Space Vision

- Proposed North Valley Linear Park:
 - Plan for a continuous green corridor from just north of Candelaria to Griegos, potentially connecting:
 - A dog park
 - Community gardens
 - Trails behind Smith's to open space areas
 - o A community engagement event was scheduled for June 10, location TBD.
- Long-Term Vision:
 - o Reinvent neglected parcels into safe, usable public green space
 - Align with the city's "green space within 10 minutes" initiative
 - o Address wildfire risk by managing overgrown easements

Tree Removal & Biomass Use

- Tree Safety and Land Stewardship:
 - MRGCD is actively responding to public safety concerns about dead/dying trees along ditches.
 - Rather than clear-cutting, they are exploring sustainable practices:
 - Tub grinding to create biochar
 - Replanting with native trees, shrubs, and grasses that improve water retention

Topics: Crime prevention, open space restoration, city development updates, board elections, and variances.

Coverage Area: North Valley & North Valley Command Center

Crime Stats (Jan-Apr):

- Low crime overall in neighborhood boundaries (Montano to Indian School).
- Top service calls:
 - Suspicious persons/vehicles: 30 calls
 - Audible alarms

Community Reminders & Offers:

 Report concerns (e.g. speeding, illegal parking, junk vehicles) directly to her or the substation.

- Speed trailer requests are available.
- Neighborhoods can request signage for speed reduction.
- Suspicious activity and illegal dumping can be reported via the 242-COPS line or APD app.
- Encouraged use of neighborhood feedback to inform police patrol priorities.

Topic: Updates on Candelaria Nature Preserve

• Topic: Updates on Candelaria Nature Preserve

Property Overview:

- o 167 acres total (North, Central, and South Tracts).
- Currently focused on North Tract restoration (~100 acres).

• Restoration Efforts:

- Transitioned from agriculture to habitat restoration due to prior pesticide use.
- Ongoing work includes crop plans, water management, and soil restoration.
- 2025 Crop Plan now available online.

• Public Engagement:

- Monthly public tours (next: July 25).
- Volunteer days Mon–Fri (seasonal flexibility).
- o Educational programming in English and Spanish.
- o Tree nursery and "climate-resilient" demonstration site opening soon.
- Wildlife: Over 120 species observed; active coyote dens monitored.

Concerns Raised:

- Excess vehicle traffic/parking inside the preserve.
 - Staff assured vehicle access is limited to Open Space personnel and stored at designated yards.
 - Improvements in public access and parking are forthcoming.

Neighborhood Updates: Eleanor & Board

• Variance Discussions:

- 2722 Rio Grande: Developer proposed 7 homes on 1.2 acres; reduced to 5 after neighborhood input.
- 2611 Rio Grande: Odd-shaped lot—buffer reduction request approved after compromise.
- Sidewalk variance near Cos: Approved due to land constraints and historical precedent.

• Citywide Concern: IDO Changes

- Recent city council vote bypassed public hearing process.
- Resulted in reduced neighborhood power on appeals and allowed increased building heights and density.

- o A lawsuit has been filed by the North Valley Coalition and others.
- Motion to donate \$250 to support the lawsuit was discussed but tabled due to unclear details.

Board Elections

- Re-elected: David (President), Karma (Board Member)
- Open Seats: 2 vacant board member positions remain
 - o No nominations received; will revisit later.
 - o Anyone interested in working on the Candelaria Preserve subcommittee is encouraged to join efforts without formal board membership.

Announcements & Events

- Upcoming Event:
 - o National Night Out: August 5th, 2025
- Call for Volunteers:
 - Particularly for tree planting grants, which require local follow-up for planting and maintenance.
 - Median planting projects being explored as heat-reduction and traffic-calming strategies.
