1. Qaisra Shahraz MBE JP FRSA, Founder and Executive Director of MACFEST, Muslim Arts and Culture Festival



Qaisra Shahraz is the Founder, Curator and Executive Director of MACFEST. She is a prize-winning and critically-acclaimed novelist, scriptwriter, peace and gender activist. Qaisra was born in Pakistan and has lived in Manchester since childhood. Qaisra has gained two Masters Degrees in English & European literature and scriptwriting for television.

Qaisra has won the prestigious National Diversity, 'Lifetime Achiever Award' for her services to 'Literature, Education, Gender and Interfaith Relationships' in 2016. In 2018, she gained the University of Salford 'Alumni Achievement Award' for having achieved distinction in her multiple careers and for contributions to the arts and community cohesion. In 2017, Qaisra was recognised by Lovin Manchester as number 1 in a list of '50 Most Influential Women in Manchester'. Similarly she has been recognised as one of 100 influential Pakistani women in 'Pakistan Power 100 List' and included in the 'Muslim Power 100' list (2018).

She is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts, a literary judge, a former Director of Gatehouse Books, an advisor to International Journal IJRHS and Asia Pacific Writers and Translators partnership. Her novels, *The Holy Woman*, *Typhoon*, *Revolt* and collection of short stories, *A Pair of Jeans* and other stories and *The Concubine & The Slave Catcher* - stories from around the world, have been translated into several languages including Mandarin. Her book, *Holy Woman* won the Bradford Waterstones' title of 'Best Book of the Month' and has been a bestseller for 15 years in Indonesia. Her novels and stories including, *A Pair of Jeans* are studied in schools and universities. A critical analysis of her works has been done in a book entitled *The Holy and the Unholy: Critical Essays on Qaisra Shahraz's Fiction* (2011). She has appeared in many international writers' festivals and book fairs. Her award-winning drama serial *Dil Hee To Hai* was broadcast on Pakistani Television in 2003.

Qaisra has enjoyed a successful career in education as an Ofsted inspector, a quality manager, assessor, education consultant and international teacher trainer including working under the auspices of the British Council. She is highly committed to promoting community and social cohesion through her roles as MACFEST's Executive Director, a trustee of Manchester Multi Faith Centre, Co-Chair of Faith Network 4 Manchester' Co-Chair of 'We Stand Together,' Executive Member of Manchester Muslim-Jewish Forum and a UK partner with New York's Foundation for Ethnic Understanding. Qaisra has a wide range of skills and expertise necessary to oversee all aspects of the festival.

2. MACFEST: Context and Background Information



Qaisra set up Macfest as a social enterprise, registered as a Company Limited by Guarantee (CLG) with company number 10951781 with 1 Executive Director who oversees all governance and operational matters. The company's address is registered with Madisons Accountants in Manchester.

Funders

MACFEST is funded by the Arts Council, Greater Manchester Combined Authority, and Foundation For Ethnic Understanding. In addition we have been amply supported in sponsorship in kind including by University of Salford and BBC Radio Manchester.

Directors and Advisors

The Executive Director works closely with a Board of Directors, a panel of national advisors, a marketing specialist and volunteer festival assistants. All share her passion, vision, ambition and enthusiasm. They bring with them vast knowledge, skills, expertise and achievements in their various fields of work on a local, national and international scale.

2.1 Mission

Successfully making its debut in Autumn 2018 MACFEST, an International festival, is the only one of its kind in the UK. Its primary mission is to bring Muslim and non-Muslim communities together in not only Greater Manchester and the North West area but also beyond the UK. MACFEST's purpose is to raise awareness of Muslim heritage, the richness of Muslim arts, literature and culture. In particular, the festival aims to break down barriers, debunk stereotypes about Islam and celebrate the Muslim world at large.

'Celebrating Arts and Connecting Communities' is MACFEST's tagline. We aim to promote the message of tackling hatred through our slogan 'Spread Honey Not Hate'.



2.2 Aims

- To promote peace, harmony and respect for other cultures including Muslim heritage.
- To bring together Muslims and non-Muslims to celebrate the positive aspects of Islam, its rich heritage and lifestyle.
- Enhance interfaith relationships including those between the Muslim and Jewish community and tackle anti-semitism through twinning events.
- Enhance community engagement and cohesion amongst the citizens of Greater Manchester and beyond. We want to engage people of all ages and denominations, including school children, local communities, migrant and refugee communities and colleges/universities.

2.3 Here is a brief history of MACFEST’s growth over 5 years:

2018 - 10 days festival taking place in a variety of places in Manchester: partners/ venues and hosted 7 schools and Manchester College.

2020 - 3 weeks Greater Manchester festival hosted in Manchester, Oldham, Stockport, Trafford and Rochdale. Hosted in various venues, as well as partnership with Rochdale literature Festival, Manchester Science Festival & schools & colleges.

2021 - Throughout the year festival kept our audiences/communities engaged. Due to Corona Virus - mainly digital, global, hosting international live events i.e. from Baku, Turkey, Morocco, Dubai etc. We were also digitally hosted in Liverpool, Oldham, Bury and Bolton. More colleges and schools came onboard & new festival partnerships developed with Tameside, Salford and Dewsbury.

2022 - 8 month long festival, with themed monthly festivals, (women, Youth, Ramadhan, African and Arab festival etc) live & digital platforms and global-engaging international artists & bringing entertainment, cultural feasts to our UK audience.

2023 - we are offering offer 70+ hybrid events for 6 months (Feb–July 2023); a rich feast of art & cultural activities from Muslim diaspora: art exhibitions (4th March), panel discussions, poetry readings, cultural hubs, musical performances & themed festivals: Women (25 women events), Youth & Libraries; schools/colleges MACFEST days.

MACFEST is celebrating 5 Years of Art, Culture and Muslim Heritage nationally and globally.

Welcome to MACFEST 2023, a ground-breaking and award-winning international Muslim Arts and Culture Festival. Hosted in several towns and cities, theatres, art galleries and libraries, schools and colleges across the North West it is celebrating its 5th Anniversary on 4th March at the Whitworth Art Gallery. Manchester.

Founded after the Manchester bombings of 2017, Qaisra Shahraz MBE, its founder and executive director had a vision of united communities, free from division and accepting of differences. To fight back against racism and Islamophobia, MACFEST began in 2018, to help to introduce the city into the world of Muslim culture, hoping to fight ignorance with cultural awareness.

MACFEST's mission is: celebrating arts, diversity and connecting communities. MACFEST offers a rich feast of over 75 events from 18th February to July 30th, celebrating the rich heritage of the Muslim diaspora communities. Nearly all the events are free. The festival is themed; youth, women, Ramadan, Museum and libraries mini Festivals. The international feast, includes events being hosted from Afghanistan, Dubai, Tunisia, Kuwait and USA,

This year's festival is set to be their biggest. There is something for the whole family: literature, art, history, music, performance, photography, culture, comedy, art exhibitions, demonstrations, debates, women and youth panels, children's activities, and art workshops. We are bringing you a great line-up of local, national and international speakers: performers, writers, academics, photographers, comedians, poets, film makers, actors, artists and singers: from Manchester - to USA.

This year's instalment of MACFEST is set to be their biggest. Joining forces with the newly formed Muslim Women's Arts Foundation and Festival, this year's instalment promises a greater diversity of speakers and artists, shedding more light on women's experiences and contributions to culture that often go unnoticed. There are many highlights, 'Poetry and Cuisine from Andalusia', Ramadan in Tunisia, Afghani women artists from Kabul art workshops, 'Arabic Weddings' 'Eat like a Sultan: cooking in the Muslim Medieval Ages' Turkish folk dance, and an 'In Conversation session with Fatima Manji, the Channel 4 News reader and reporter, launching her new book.

Focusing more on culture instead of religion and politics, MACFEST draws cultural fragment from across the Muslim world; Afghani women artists, Turkish folk dance, Kuwaiti photography, Palestinian embroidery, Andalusian poetry, as well as British Muslims contributing their art and experience. An international festival with collaborators from all corners, coming with a massive 64-page brochure that boasts a dizzying number of events available.

2.4 Activities & Services

We are a community-led art & culture festival. Only one of its kind in the UK, MACFEST is a unique, award winning, multi-art forms festival, hosted across the North West. it's aim is to celebrate arts, Muslim Heritage, culture and connect communities of all faiths. MACFEST is a local, national & international festival; it has 4 distinct strands; heritage, education, culture and arts.

We deliver MACFEST through multi-art forms; Literature/poetry, arts (exhibitions), photography, fashion, film making, performance, talks, cuisine, history panels.

CREATIVITY & CREATIVE PEOPLE lie at the heart of MACFEST. We reach & work with young people, women, families & local organisations; through collaborative working we enable them to plan, deliver, create & showcase their work with us.

We celebrate **MULTI-ARTS** forms:

- **LITERATURE:** poetry, books, travel writing, manuscripts, Mushaira, author panels, writing workshops.
- **Arts:** (exhibitions), commissioned artwork, demonstrations (Palestinian embroidery & textiles).
- **WORKSHOPS:** calligraphy, batik & marble, silk painting, paper cutting, mandala making, card making, & doodling.
- **PERFORMANCE,** eg Arab Dabka, Sudanese, Indonesian, Turkish & Uighur folk dance. Wedding ensemble by Bengali Anamika Group.



We have a proven track record of delivering successfully 5 festivals including the year long digital 2021 programme of events across Greater Manchester during the pandemic.

2.5 Themed Festivals

We offer themed festivals ie Arab,(September 2021 week long) South Asian,(August) and African Heritage (October, to tie in with Black History Month & 2022); Youth & Children,(February 2022) Muslim Women Art Festival (March 2022 to tie in with International women week and in partnership with Muslim Women Arts Foundation.), Ramadan & Eid Festival (April,), National festival (May to August) ie hosted in Bolton, Bury, Rochdale, Stockport, Oldham, Trafford, Liverpool.



MACFEST festival promotes community cohesion - engages 1000s of people of all ages. MACFEST UK is a great social, cultural 'connector' of diverse communities. We have a high percentage i.e. 50% of hard to reach or socially/economically excluded groups taking part. Through its art and cultural activities it plays a significant role in developing stronger and inclusive communities and improving the quality of life of its residents.

2.6 Supporting communities during the pandemic 2021

To support our communities feeling isolated during lockdown MACFEST, had a strong commitment to engage with communities, using digital platforms, and various strategies.

MACFEST reached out to local people, those who were hard to reach or felt isolated especially during the pandemic, lasting 2 years. When other cultural organisations and community groups closed down, we kept going. We delivered 75 digital events in 2021. Through our festival we continued to engage local & national communities, using digital platforms to offer many events in 2021. Thereby breaking barriers, and promoting social & emotional well-being.

During the pandemic we joined students from Greater Manchester schools and colleges and heard their perspective about life during the pandemic, racism and Islamophobia, and celebrated their cultural heritage of their country of origin. MACFEST hosted a special panel with students from six countries: from Gambia to the USA. School students shared their thoughts about how the pandemic affected their lives and education during the last few months.

2.7 Diversity, Inclusion and Disability

MACFESTUK key strength is in strengthening community relationships and enhancing social inclusion; it reduces divisions & feeling of ghettoisation; challenges racism, Islamophobia, & anti-Semitism; whilst encouraging and developing intergenerational and positive relationships, including between different groups of Manchester residents.

We adopt a very positive approach towards DISABILITY and are committed to our festival being accessible to all. We host 2 artists (blind & deaf & 5 disabled staff/volunteers & make reasonable adjustments to enhance their participation.

2.9 Community Led Festival

MACFEST whilst international is very much a community led festival by engaging diverse local communities and working with Manchester citizens offering community-led, cultural events in a variety of settings & venues; in schools, mosques, universities, local colleges, Museums, British Muslim Heritage Centre, Central library & local communities centres (Turkish, Bengali, Arab, Nigerian/Pakistani).

MACFEST is a great social connector for migrant communities, enabling not only learning to take place but forming of new friendships, excellent social interactions, and above all enhancing integration of migrant communities and refugees communities into British society and way of life, who otherwise might feel isolated.

We engage at least 10 Muslim diaspora groups/migrants/refugees, from all backgrounds, engaging 100s from each community i.e. taking part in activities as well as attending i.e. musical performance etc.

Each year we showcase the cultural heritage of various Muslim communities living in the North West including Bengali and Uyghur (Chinese). See Brochure attached, programme of 74 events with global reach.



2.10 Community Empowerment and Development

We provide fab opportunities for communities to develop, share their love of arts & sample cultural life of different Muslim communities and also to develop employability skills resulting in volunteering and paid work. At least 1000 people from various communities have taken part to showcase talent & their cultural heritage (Bengali, Uighur, Indonesian, Bosnian, Pakistani, Turkish, Moroccan, Nigerian, Somali etc) hosting cultural evenings, curating cultural hubs or delivering art workshops ie batik painting by Indonesian, Marble Ebru painting by Turkish artist.

MACFEST is totally dedicated to developing people: artists, volunteers, team members as well as students & school children. We recognise the experience and expertise of communities by providing excellent platforms to both aspiring and established artists, poets, performers to showcase their talent, work & develop new skills of team and our volunteers.

2.11 Paid Opportunities

Our festival has sustainable outcomes; generating work opportunities for communities (INCLUDING university students), companies, catering, media, printing & marketing industry and volunteers – who progress to work. We have created additional jobs for our team of volunteers. MACFEST progressed 10 members from volunteer roles to offering them part time paid work. Their progression is well celebrated and our Queen’s Award for Voluntary Service is an excellent testament to that.

Employed over 150 artists each year to offer their services, sometimes for 3 paid events. Engaged community groups ie Anamika (20 People) or Turkish folk dance (15 women) to perform for us – paid.

2.12 Women empowerment resulting in work experience

Macfest is female led. Director is devoted to women’s rights, and celebrates female artists, up-skills women, & puts them at the forefront of the festival.

We host 25 events in which we celebrate women creative, explore gender issues, & celebrate International Women Week with a number of women events. In the 2023 festival on International Women Day, 3 events celebrated Muslim women e.g. (deaf filmmaker, Kuwaiti journalists as well as past women travel writers).

Part of MACFEST, Muslim women art project aims; to debunk myths about Muslim women; actively engages & empowers migrant women of all ages & backgrounds; They plan & deliver events.

Through different activities: public performance i.e. poetry, writing of stories/recipes, art exhibitions, cultural hubs, women develop and in long term will enhance their employability skills.

MACFEST has developed director skills by successfully delivering 5 festivals. Via a good network of supporters, advisers who continue to ameliorate risk associated with running a large festival & supporting her work, eg. in fund raising & become driven, well-networked festival organiser with clear vision, dedication to improve social & community relations & promote peace amongst communities.

1.14 Community Engagement

These people have accessed the festival or been engaged in some way – i.e. numbers of artists, speakers, active participants and attendees of digital events.



Engagement of ethnic minorities and Muslim migrant communities in Manchester


In 2022 we engaged the following Muslim community groups in Manchester (Pakistani, Nigerian, Turkish, Somali, Moroccan, Egyptian, Bengali, Iranian, Indonesian, Indian, Afghani, Libyan, Uighur, Iraqi, Palestinian, as well as international artists from Uzbekistan & Azerbaijan)

-Macfest's uniqueness is in bringing diverse Muslim communities together under one roof, as they very rarely meet, thus promoting integration between these different groups and spreading peace messages with slogan, 'spread honey not hate'.

-The director uses all her contacts, influence, excellent and wide ranging communication as an international author, community interfaith and peace activist, educationist with good links to schools and colleges to reach out to people, to curate and produce a fast growing award winning festival.

Author Qaisra Shahraz wins lifetime achievement prize at National Diversity Awards

Prize-winning author [Qaisra Shahraz](#) has won the Lifetime Achievement Award at the UK's largest diversity event.

The novelist and scriptwriter, whose work focuses on women's rights, was handed the prize in recognition of her services to literature and education, as well as her interfaith activities, which aim to promote tolerance in the UK and abroad.

The annual [National Diversity Awards](#), which have been sponsored by [Microsoft](#) since they began in 2012, aim to support positive role models, community organisations and entrepreneurs from across society, regardless of gender, sexuality, age or religion, and help them effect change in areas where they feel passionate.

Shahraz, whose 2001 novel [The Holy Woman](#) won the Golden Jubilee Award, was given her award at Liverpool Anglican Cathedral by former England footballer Sol Campbell and Microsoft representatives Sarbjit Sahota and Damian Stirrett.

Liam Kelly, General Manager of Developer Experience at Microsoft and one of the judges of the Lifetime Achievement Award, said: "The diversity of each nominee's journey is in itself incredible; every person on the shortlist has their own unique reason that kick-started their compulsion to help, and they have all shown a remarkable passion and commitment over many years to help people and make a difference to the lives of others...however, the raw emotion and heartfelt words from people who wrote in to say how they themselves, their family or their friends lives have been transformed by their work really brought home the impact one person can have on so many people. It was a privilege to get a glimpse of the profound impact each nominee has had on the lives of others."

Interview: Manchester's most influential woman – Qaisra Shahraz

Qaisra Shahraz was 2017's most influential woman in Manchester according to [lovinmanchester.com](#). Though the author admits she is "bemused" at the prospect, she undeniably has influenced many through the power of her stories, and is taking the recognition as a "humbling experience."

With her published short stories and novels gaining international recognition, I wanted to talk to Qaisra and see where it all began, and what the most influential Manchester woman of 2017 has planned for 2018.

Qaisra has lived in Manchester since the age of nine, and her Pakistani roots and dual nationality became a source of inspiration for the stories she began to write. Through her school years right up to her becoming a student at the University of Manchester, "writing has remained my soulmate" Qaisra smiles.

It was here, at our very own University, that Qaisra was published for the first time. She remembered cheerfully her glee at the sight of seeing her name in print.

"I had joined Michael Schmidt's creative writing workshops and enrolled on a writing course resulting in my debut full two page feature piece in *She* magazine about Greek Vases. I bought nearly half a dozen of the magazines, for my family and friends! Seeing your name in print for the first time is magic. The excitement wears off over the years!"

Qaisra's novels *The Holy Woman*, *Typhoon*, *Revolt* and collections of stories are studied at a multitude of other universities, as well as *A Pair of Jeans* being studied in German and English schools. Qaisra's appeared in literary festivals and book fairs around the world, including Jaipur and Beijing and her drama serial has appeared on Pakistan Television. Despite all this undeniable global success, Qaisra never forgets about the love she has for her home city, with her connections to the University of Manchester remaining strong.

"In recent years I have organised two multi-faith university events celebrating diversity. Our aim was to bring students and community members of various faiths and those of none together in order to celebrate our shared values, promote peace and cohesion" Qaisra tells me.

After leaving university Qaisra's creativity projects began to blossom. She was published numerous times as an author, then eventually found her way into screenwriting.

"Writing for television came much later and was much more challenging. Creatively, I have found writing of film and TV scripts in its use of imagination the most demanding. In order to learn the craft of script and screenwriting I ended up doing a Master's degree course in scriptwriting for TV and Radio and adapted my novel *The Holy Woman* into a 90 minutes film screenplay."

When I asked Qasira what her writing process was like, she admitted that she has "no standard writing ritual or process as such" but that for scriptwriting "the jig sawing and stitching of separate scenes to create exciting episodes and embedding as much conflict and drama as possible is quite a task. I was taught on my degree course in scriptwriting to 'milk' each scene for drama — otherwise it is redundant."

And as for writer's block, the sickness that every author fears suffering from, Qaisra won't even entertain the idea.

"I have no time to have a writer's' block!" She laughs. "However, there is a new distraction on the scene which often lures me away from my creativity quite significantly — online social media!"

COLUMN: HOME IS WHERE THE HEART IS

I recently met up with British-Pakistani author Qaisra Shahraz at her house in Manchester to discuss *The Concubine* and the *Slave-Catcher: Stories From Around the World* — her new cosmopolitan collection spanning 25 years of Shahraz's writing life, covering various timelines and countries.

In the collection's first story 'The Escape', Samir, an elderly Pakistani man living in Manchester for decades, dreams of his previous life. Yet on returning to Pakistan he realises he's no longer sure where home is. Much of Shahraz's writing is about home and homecoming, belonging and unbelonging. She tells me that being a migrant with multiple identities — "British, Pakistani and Muslim" — home and the sense of belonging naturally interest her. In 'The Escape', she focuses on the first generation of migrants, "people like my father who have lived in the United Kingdom for 50 years or so." The collection's epigraph by Madeleine L'Engle evokes the disorientation of "not quite knowing where home is." Shahraz explains how relevant this notion is to Samir's story of loss and confusion. "Where does this person belong?" she enquires. "Where is his homeland? The place of birth or where he has spent a big chunk of his life? I believe it's the latter, despite the fact that one maintains emotional links with one's country of birth."

Certainly, 'The Escape' manifests Shahraz's love for Manchester where she's lived since her parents moved there from Pakistan when she was nine, and seen it expand and "change over the decades with the arrivals of refugees and migrants from around the world."

In 'Our Angel', the male British protagonist catches a glimpse of the precarity of Afghan migrant workers in the Gulf. Fascinated with the confluence of cultures brought together by the Gulf's oil industry, Shahraz shares that 'Our Angel' is based on a conversation with an Afghan taxi driver on her way to the Abu Dhabi International Book Fair. The man's insights into his working life in the Emirates intrigued her. "I focus on the plight of Asian migrants separated from their families for decades. There are clearly economic gains for their families, but this can hardly compensate for the pain of separation from fathers, husbands and sons."

The pain of separation is also explored in 'The Journey' which Shahraz wrote 15 years ago about a Muslim boy, Riaz, tragically abandoned by his parents in India as they flee to Pakistan during Partition. Riaz is later adopted by a Hindu family. Shahraz describes learning about the bitter realities of Partition from an aunt who "wept for days after parting from her best friend Gopi, a Hindu whose family had to flee southeast to India." The process surrounding Partition horrifies Shahraz to this day: "Imagine a line being drawn on a map of India, thereby making millions of people refugees overnight. I had to write this story, as I was gripped by the scale of the human tragedy."

Several years ago, Shahraz visited the concentration camps at Auschwitz-Birkenau State Museum in Poland with some Jewish friends. This glimpse of the Nazis' premeditated, industrial-style extermination of six million Jews impelled her to write 'Last Train to Krakow', about a young pregnant woman, Hela, who writes a letter to her mother urging her to buy train tickets for resettlement in Krakow.

The titular story similarly demanded intense historical research. 'The Slave Catcher' was conceived when Shahraz watched a film about slavery in Boston's Museum of African American History. The experience was epiphanic: "Within 10 minutes I had the idea, the characters and the storyline in their entirety!" It was challenging enough to write about the 19th century Boston context — never having examined the United States before — let alone discussing slaves' histories. "In Boston, black people lived free lives," says Shahraz, "but the southern states' plantation owners were chasing them decades later. They would enslave entire families, forcibly taking those born and working as free people in Boston to work in their cotton fields."


'The Concubine' was completed just three months before publication. Shahraz wrote the first scene of this panoramic story while sitting on the summit of Macchu Picchu, Peru, with a group of women writers. It is set in Cusco in the 16th century when the Spanish conquered the Incan empire. Shahraz was intrigued by the fact that Spanish brides travelled to join their men in Peru, and adumbrated what life was like for Peruvian concubines.

Shahraz recalls that in 1990 the first story she ever wrote, 'A Pair of Jeans', was picked up by German academic Dr Liesel Hermes. Impressed by the exploration of themes relating to migrants' lives and culture clash, Hermes decided to add it to the literary curriculum in German schools. It is still very popular almost three decades later, and Shahraz continues to be inundated with invitations to German schools. "A Pair of Jeans' provided me with a platform for intercultural dialogue. My aim has always been to raise awareness and debunk some stereotyped myths about Islam, Muslim women and extremism. I remind German and English students that there are extremists in all faiths. My parting remark is: 'I am a Muslim. I love my faith, but I am not a terrorist. Please connect with ordinary Muslims like me.'"

'The Evil Shadow', set in a fictitious Pakistani village, was originally written nearly 20 years ago and explores what happens when two women transgress the draconian and illogical rules that shroud miscarriage. This issue of the woman who has miscarried being ostracised as the bringer of bad luck fed into a subplot of Shahraz's third novel *Revolt*. She fearlessly breaks the silence and superstitions around miscarriage that exist across cultures, both Western and Eastern: "I abhor how superstitious beliefs can hurt, victimise, or stigmatise people," she states, imparting her strong feelings about the impact of superstition on women's experiences of childbirth and miscarriage.

We end by speaking about Shahraz's new projects. She's writing a new novel set in Morocco, and also holding the ambitious Muslim Arts and Culture Festival (MACFest) in Manchester from 2018 to highlight literature, education, art and culture. "I have devoted my life to building cultural bridges," Shahraz declares, "and such work is of utmost importance in current times when Islamophobia is on the rise. The mission is to bring all faith communities together, remove barriers, educate, raise awareness and celebrate the rich Muslim heritage." I hope to work with her on this exciting venture.

Qaisra Shahraz: A voice for the struggle of women everywhere

Being lucky enough to pursue her dreams of writing that she had since she was 15 years old, 59-year-old Pakistani-British author Qaisra Shahraz weaves a literary world that is incredibly relevant and connected with female struggles across all cultures in which they would be treated unequally.

Shahraz's stories reflect the effects of invisible, sometimes unnecessary barriers that human beings tend to build. The issues of inequality, feminism and the empowerment of Muslim women feature heavily in her works, as well as the need to bring people together in harmony.

Her books – 2002's *The Holy Woman*, 2007's *Typhoon*, 2013's *Revolt* and her most recent book, *Train to Krakow* – as well as dozens of short stories she has written for various publications as a freelance journalist, have earned her the distinction of being one of the most influential women in her hometown of Manchester, United Kingdom, and made her an indirect advocate for women's rights.

As a Muslim living in a Western country, and having been raised there since the age of 9, she acknowledges that each woman has their own struggles in basically trying to navigate their lives in different societies.

In the UK, women are very much free to dress and go about their daily activities as they please without the burden of oppressive laws. But she explains that the impression many Western countries have toward Muslim women tends to be demeaning. Demeaning in the sense that the religion does not allow women freedom of any kind.


"There's a mythical view that's been maintained [in the West] that sees all Muslim women as being oppressed. They think that Muslim women wear veils and headscarves because they have to. In reality, women wear these as a matter of choice. It's not a sign that we're oppressed by the religion itself," she said passionately.

Her short story *A Pair of Jeans*, from her 2013 short story collection *A Pair of Jeans and Other Stories* explores this very topic of victimization and the harsher judgments that Muslim women are subjected to regarding what they choose to wear. Shahraz argues that oppression might be the case in some extreme examples such as Iran, Afghanistan and Saudi Arabia, where the West tends to get their perceptions from.

Sometimes, writers fall in love with some of their characters. So much that they are carried over to another novel. That is how 'Typhoon' was born, says Pakistani-English author Qaisra Shahraz. A compelling story woven around the lives of three Muslim women in Pakistan, 'Typhoon' (2003) is a sequel to her first and best-selling novel, 'The Holy Woman'. For Qaisra, it was more than a love affair with her characters. It was the life of ordinary people living in extraordinary situations in her homeland, Pakistan that egged her on to write.

Qaisra was in Kochi recently to launch the Malayalam translation of 'Typhoon'.

Though she has never lived in Pakistan, Qaisra's writing holds a mirror to the country's social terrain. "I have early childhood memories of the place and I have always been in touch with it. I used to visit my grandmother," she says. Her heroine Zarri Bano, the dashing, young, educated Muslim woman who gives up her love for a cruel custom in 'The Holy Woman' (2001) shocked the western world as she surrenders to the norm.

The book flew off the shelves in Europe, found its way to the syllabus in Germany and interestingly, generated encouraging responses from Pakistan. The Mandarin version of it will soon be released at China's Bookworm festival.

Not just religion

But ask Qaisra and she says her novels are not just about religion. "All I was trying to do was introduce a Muslim woman to the world. The life she leads, the struggles she goes through," she says, especially in the post 9/11 world where Muslims are looked upon with suspicion. "I am trying to tell the world that I am just a peace-loving Muslim and not a terrorist," she says.

With a vast collection of short stories to her credit, Qaisra believes that it is important to educate through her work.

Her television drama 'Dil Hi to Hai', which was translated to Urdu and telecast in the Pakistan Television, won her two awards. The show had a viewership of more than 80 million people, what she calls real success. She is working on another TV drama series on domestic violence.

'A Pair of Jeans', her first story, published in 1988, topped popularity charts, and was published 12 times. It was also included in the syllabus in Germany. The UGC Academic Staff College, Aligarh Muslim University, recently released "The Holy and the Unholy: Critical Essays on Qaisra Shahraz's Fiction".

More than writing

However, Qaisra says she is not a full-time author. "Writing is not my life. It is just a strand among the many roles I have," she says. "My real life is with my family. I do the laundry, the dishes,... I am a mother, a homemaker, a wife, a daughter."

Most of her works have women as protagonists—women victimised by society, but who fight back with an unyielding spirit. "I never forget that I am a product of a privileged society, having lived in Britain all my life, I am extremely aware that there are women out there for whom writing a book is a luxury. Forget a book; they can't afford a scrap of paper."

Qaisra's third book, tentatively titled 'Revolt', delves into the complex realm of mixed marriages. Her fourth novel, which she would name 'Silence' will be on honour killings. Set in Morocco, the story seeks to explore the lives of women trapped in an unjust society.

This April, the UK's first festival dedicated entirely to Muslim culture, literature and ideas opened at the British Library in London. And following not far behind comes MACFEST – a new 10-day celebration of art, literature, culture, music, film, food and heritage relating to the Muslim diaspora, which will take place in venues across Manchester this November, launching on the 11th at [Whitworth Art Gallery](#). As the brainchild of the city's resident critically-acclaimed author and prize-winning peace activist, Qaisra Shahraz FRSA, who has dedicated her life to fighting Islamophobia, anti-Semitism and all forms of discrimination; we're expecting great things. The programme is wide-ranging, with over 50 events announced so far. Here are just some of the things we're most looking forward to...

The ambitious festival aims to bring Muslim and non-Muslim communities together, promoting social inclusion and helping to overcome barriers. With a surge in Islamophobia and anti-Muslim hate crime reported throughout the West over recent years, such an intention seems worthy of applause in itself. Yet, judging by the breadth and quality of the events we have to look forward to, we're expecting MACFEST to go beyond an exercise in cultural inclusivity and deliver a special occasion for the city to remember, and build upon.

A talk by the great, great grandchildren of Robert 'Reschild' Stanley will tell the only recently recovered story of how the Mayor of Stalybridge (1874-76) became 'A Victorian Secret Muslim', reverting to the faith 120 years ago after learning about the unfair foreign policies of the British government, later going on to become Vice-Chairperson of the first mosque in the UK (Liverpool). Turning to the present, Baroness Manzila Pola Uddin (the first Muslim and second Asian woman to sit in the UK Parliament) will join others to discuss the political challenges facing Muslim women today. And internationally-renowned Sudanese writer Leila Aboulela (recently interviewed on BBC Radio 4's *Open Book*) will join Shahraz for a discussion moderated by Dr Claire Chambers, Senior Lecturer in Global Literature at University of York.



Elsewhere, the poetry of the great 13th century Muslim Sufi mystic Maulana Rumi will be explored through an afternoon of music and sound at the British Muslim Heritage Centre. Stand-up comedy will come from local Muslim comedians. An exhibition of art and photography will document 'everyday life on the Curry Mile'. And a programme of screenings including the British rom-com *Finding Fatimah* (2017) and *Being Muslim Today: Travels in Europe* – a documentary by the award-winning author, broadcaster and former diplomat Akbar Ahmad – will cover a wide range of contemporary issues.

The bulk of MACFEST will take place over the weekend of 17-18 November at the iconic [British Muslim Heritage Centre](#) in Whalley Range. Venues also include The Manchester College, [Whitworth Art Gallery](#), Manchester Central & Longsight library, Abraham Moss High School, Levenshulme High School for Girls, Manchester Central Mosque, Khizra Mosque, University of Manchester, Elizabeth Gaskell House, [Manchester Museum](#), Ahmed Iqbal Ullah Race Resource Centre & Star Centre.

'Spread honey, not hate': New UK multi-arts Muslim festival wants to engage segregated communities

Last year, three terrorist attacks targeting the public in London and Manchester were perpetrated by Muslims who were mostly British. After the Manchester Arena attack on May 22 that killed 23 people, including the suicide bomber, Greater Manchester Police reported a 130 percent rise in hate crime, including a 500 percent surge in Islamophobic-related hate crime compared with the same period a year earlier.

One Manchester resident decided she needed to do something to address the "real problems" of "hatred and divisions".

"I've spent the last 15 years promoting peace and harmony, connecting communities and in particular tackling hatred aimed at Muslims," said Qaisra Shahraz, whose deep community involvement includes being a trustee of Manchester Multi Faith Centre, Co-Chair of Faith Network 4 Manchester, We Stand Together Executive Member of the Muslim Jewish Forum of Greater Manchester and a partner of the Foundation For Ethnic Understanding.

"With the rising extremism, Muslims have been targeted and demonised regularly, and I got really fed-up after the Manchester Arena attack," she added.

Naturally, the international novelist and screenwriter turned to culture and the arts. Shahraz has spent more than a year programming and organising a new multi-arts festival.

"My whole mission is to have the festival mainstream, educating people and connecting Muslim communities within themselves," the founder and curator of new festival MACFEST told Salaam Gateway.

Manchester's different Muslim communities, said Shahraz, "live in their own little groups". "For example, the Turkish hardly interact with the Somalis, [neither do] the Pakistanis with the Nigerians. We want to engage as many of these communities and help them get to know each other. So first, we want to bring Muslims and non-Muslims together and then the Muslims among themselves," she said.

The aim of the festival, which will run from November 17 to 25, is to break barriers. "Hatred and divisions are real problems. In fact, we'll have a banner that says 'spread honey, not hate'," said Shahraz.

'DIVERSITY IS KEY'

2.8 million people live in Greater Manchester, a county of ten boroughs including the biggest city Manchester. According to the latest population census in 2011, 8.68 percent identified as Muslim, a rise of around three percent from 2001. The majority of the county's Muslims are of Pakistani and other South Asian descent but as Shahraz alluded to earlier, the population is ethnically and culturally diverse.

Overall, it is estimated that 16 percent of the county's residents are of black, Asian and minority ethnic origin, said a Greater Manchester Combined Authority report released in July this year.

Drilling down further, the Office of National Statistics estimated that in 2017, around 376,000 of Greater Manchester residents, equivalent to 13 percent of the county's population, were not UK-born. Of this group, 124,000 came from the EU and the rest were born in non-EU countries.

Amidst this huge diversity, Shahraz wants MACFEST to engage as many Mancunians as possible. "I've been very strategic about it and involved as many nationalities as possible. Diversity is key. A quarter of my volunteer team are non-Muslims; people who are enthusiastic to be involved and I want them to be the face of the festival, because it's for everyone," Shahraz said.

Barbara Dresner, a Jewish-Catholic MACFEST volunteer who learnt about Muslim cultures during her travels to Malaysia and Indonesia, told Salaam Gateway she has always looked out for opportunities to get to know people from other backgrounds.

"I met Qaisra at an All Faith Network women's picnic in Manchester this summer, which I'd attended with my Hindu friend and neighbour. Qaisra and I had already met several times before at Manchester's Muslim Jewish Forum events. It was at the picnic when she asked if I'd be interested in working with her on setting up MACFEST.

"I hope the festival will enable people to learn more about the diversity of Muslim arts and culture – and one of those – will be me," said Dresner.

Similarly, Sophie Jones, a student at the University of Salford, said being a part of MACFEST is a "unique opportunity". Jones is volunteering her time to help with the filming of the festival.

STRENGTHENING RELATIONSHIPS

For the hosting venues, which include schools, universities, libraries, museums and galleries, the festival is an opportunity to strengthen ties with Manchester's Muslim communities.

"Over the past several years Manchester Museum has been developing relationships with Muslim communities across the city and we're looking to strengthen these by supporting MACFEST," Stephen Welsh, curator of Living Cultures collection at Manchester Museum told Salaam Gateway.

The schools and universities that are hosting the festival, which include the University of Manchester and Manchester College as well as Levenshulme, Whalley Range, Birkfield, Dimsay and Abraham Moss high schools, also hope to make a similar impact.

"As a school, we are delighted and honoured to take part in MACFEST to celebrate the art, literature, music, film, and heritage relating to Muslim culture," Pascal Beaudon, head of languages at Whalley Range High School told Salaam Gateway.

The school is home to 1,700 students who collectively speak 46 languages, according to Beaudon.

"We hope that by taking part in this festival we can promote our values and support Qaisra Shahraz in her effort to bring communities together to celebrate what makes Manchester unique: our people"

FESTIVAL HIGHLIGHTS

Muslim-led arts initiatives tackling Islamophobia, promoting interfaith harmony among UK children

A record number of anti-Muslim attacks and incidents of abuse were reported in the United Kingdom last year, according to monitoring group Tell Mama in its annual report released in July.

Many were triggered by four incidents between March and June 2017, which a police review said “were the most deadly terrorist attacks on British soil since the 7/7 London tube and bus bombings of July 2005.” Three attacks targeting public places in London and Manchester were perpetrated by Muslims who were mostly British, and the fourth was carried out by a non-Muslim Briton on a London mosque.

A year later in April, a three-day festival of culture and ideas dedicated to Muslim communities was held at the British Library in London. In November, a ten-day event will open in Manchester. Both aim to bridge cultures and tackle Islamophobia.

REACHING COMMUNITIES, YOUNG PEOPLE

MFest in London and the Muslim Art and Cultural Festival (MACFest) in Manchester are big multi-day, multi-arts events in the two cities directly affected by last year’s four terrorist attacks. Where MFest was held at central London institution The British Library and targeted the general public, the much bigger MACFest will be more widely distributed and also involve museums, galleries, universities and schools.

“The reason why I wanted to [have some events] in schools is because with the rise of extremism, there’s been a lot of negative backlash and children suffer in schools if they are Muslims because they get bullied,” critically-acclaimed novelist Qaisra Shahraz, who is founder and curator of MACFest, told Salaam Gateway.

The rationale behind this aspect of Shahraz’s MACFest programming is backed by data. Tell Mama’s report found that 72 percent of the perpetrators of reported anti-Muslim incidents last year were white men, with younger men, including teenagers, being some of the main perpetrators. There’s clearly a need to reach young people with issues related to Islam and Muslims.

“I want these [Muslim] children to feel proud of who they are. And for the children who bully them to learn that those are the actions of extremists – the rest of us are normal peace-loving people,” said Shahraz, whose community involvement includes being a trustee of Manchester Multi Faith Centre, Vice Chair of Faith Network 4 Manchester and Executive Member of the Muslim Jewish Forum of Greater Manchester.


MFest and MACFest are not by any means the first focusing on Islam and Muslims in the UK. Shemiza Rashid, a social and cultural entrepreneur working in the interfaith, Asian, and Islam and Muslim creative industries, pointed out smaller community arts and cultural events that have been organised in recent years.

“A lot of Muslim arts organisations across the country are reaching out and working alongside non-Muslim galleries to help make Islam more accessible,” said Rashid, who hosts a faith-inspired creative arts and lifestyle show for a community radio station based in Luton, a town just northwest of London.

“Events like the Kinara Festival [in July 2016] by the Love & Etiquette Foundation and Milton Keynes Eid in the Park hosted by Milton Keynes Islamic Arts, Heritage and Culture (MKIAC) have successfully reached out to communities around them to share and bridge an understanding. More festivals are emerging with a similar theme,” said Rashid. Kinara The impact of such initiatives is tremendous, said Rashid, not only for Muslim children but also for non-Muslims and adults. However, more needs to be done to truly bring Islamic art and literature to a mass audience - more investment and mainstream partners, she said.

“It is vital that creativity in Islam is nurtured to regenerate and recharge the values, and to adapt to new eras and landscapes. Islam is pure in its essence; it’s people who change with the times. So it’s about making sure we keep that connection thriving,” said Rashid.

MACFest is the first festival of its kind, putting the spotlight on Muslim arts and culture from around the world. The festival will be a celebration of the richness of Muslim culture, showcasing the art, music, cuisine, history and literature of 10 different countries.

Walking into the opening gala was like being welcomed into a friend's home; we were immediately hit with the intense fragrances of cumin, saffron, and garlic. By the entrance there was a generous spread of food, next to which people of all ages gathered.

We gleefully ate baklava, the likes of which we enjoyed with our own families during celebrations. This launch event was perfectly suited to the intentions of the [Muslim Arts and Cultures Festival](#); bringing together different communities and sharing diverse cultures and traditions.

This event was held on the 11th of November – Remembrance Sunday – and gave the perfect opportunity to bring awareness to the foreign soldiers who fought for Britain during World War I. Despite WWI being taught as early as primary school, we are often too nation-centred and insular in our teaching. We overlook the contributions of those we relied on, Colonial subjects, Muslims included, who gave their lives for our future.

The audience was presented with a short film created by The British Muslim Heritage Centre. It recounted the input of Muslim soldiers, acknowledging that 400,000 Muslims from different countries fought for Britain during the Great War. This Sunday, they were finally given the respect of a minute's silence and commemoration that we regularly provide to British Soldiers.

What followed was a variety of speeches, including a spine-tingling address by [Qaisra Shahraz](#) – the festival's driving force, and "trailblazer" as described by Rusholme MP and Director of the Festival, Councillor Rabnawaz Akbar. Akbar praised her rejection of social expectations regarding gender; she threw off the stereotype of women being a housewife, instead pursuing writing and activism.

Qaisra called out the media for scapegoating the Islam following recent terror attacks, claiming: "I am fed up of reminding people that we have extremists and nutters of all faiths." She went on to describe the need to acknowledge the beauty of Islamic cultures, saying, "enough is enough. I want to celebrate being a Muslim."

The performances that made up the afternoon – from Sufi singing to Palestinian dance – gave a insight into the rich jam-packed schedule of MACFest. The festival will support and give a platform to artists of different nationalities, ages, and backgrounds, bridging the gaps between the internal communities of the Islamic Faith.

MACFest is putting Islamic culture at the centre of discussions, shedding a positive light on a community which is often villainized. As Qaisra Shahraz summarised, the festival will "use the arts to bring communities together."



We're also looking forward to a special lecture on Islamic Geometric Design delivered by artist Eric Brough at [Manchester Art Gallery](#) (18 Jan); an evening of poetry by Manchester-based writers of Pakistani, Bangladeshi, Iranian and Somali backgrounds at [Manchester Central Library](#) (21 Jan); and an exploration of the misrepresentation of Western and Eastern culture through [The Portico Library's](#) 'Voyages and Travels' collection, led by Professor Zahia Smail Salhi (24 Jan).

Finally, head to [Whitworth Art Gallery](#) for the closing event of MACFEST 2020, featuring live music performed by artists from different Muslim communities around the world, including SOAS SILK Road Collective and the Iranian Classical Moulana Music Band (26 Jan). Altogether, the festival is intended to bring Muslim and non-Muslim communities together – and in this spirit, everybody is welcome.

Earth's protective ozone layer 'on track' to recover by 2066, according to UN



The Earth's protective ozone layer is 'on track' to fully recover by 2066, according to a new assessment backed by the United Nations. A scientific assessment found that by around 2066, over the Antarctic, by 2045 over the Arctic, and by 2040 for the rest of the world, levels should return to what they were in the 1980s.

While Meg Seki, executive secretary of the United Nations Environment Programme's ozone secretariat, added that the report delivers "fantastic news". Scientists and environmental advocates have contributed these latest efforts to the ongoing success of the 1989 Montreal Protocol, which banned 99% ozone-depleting substances. Having first come into force after scientists raised the alarm over a "hole" in the Earth's ozone layer chemicals that were found to deplete the upper stratospheric layer were banned. Mr Newman went on to explain that the two chief chemicals that "munch away" at the ozone - bromine and chlorine - have "stopped growing" and levels are "coming down," another testament to the effectiveness of the Protocol. In a 2016 update of the Protocol, known as the Ki...

New funding given to victim support services to help with cost-of-living pressures

The Deputy Mayor of Greater Manchester has announced new funding for local organisations across the city-region that support victims and survivors of domestic abuse and sexual violence. The funding will help organisations respond to the ongoing cost-of-living crisis, assisting them to continue to provide support to those accessing their services over the winter months. The funding has been provided in part by the Ministry of Justice through the victims' core grant funding. The money will go towards practical measures, such as care packages, additional capacity within services, peer mentor sessions, group counselling, costs to support people accessing services and interpreter costs. Organisations that will receive funding responded to an expression of interest process which specified priority support for communities of identity, no recourse to public funds, older people and people with disabilities. The funding started reaching organisations in December 2022, to ensure help and provision was available over the holiday period. Speaking about the announcement, Kate Green, Deputy Mayor for Policing, Crime, Criminal Justice and Fire said: "I'm happy that we're able to allocate this funding to our local organisations to help with rising costs due to the cost-of-living crisis. "Over what can be difficult winter months, this funding will help them continue their good work to support victims and survivors of domestic abuse and sexual violence. "We remain committed to keeping people safe, supporting victims and survivors, and continuing to tackle gender-based violence and abuse in all its forms."

UNICEF Pakistan has permanent field offices in all four provinces and has established four hubs to bring UNICEF operations and programmes closer to the hardest hit areas. We have been working with the Government of Pakistan, UN agencies and NGO partners to respond to the needs of the most vulnerable populations in 62 calamity-affected districts, both for displaced populations and those returning to the location of their destroyed villages. UNICEF's current appeal of US\$17.6 million to provide life-saving support to women and children affected by the floods remains only 37 per cent funded.



As a non-Muslim, I was delighted to be invited to join the volunteer group assisting with MACFEST 2018. I wholeheartedly support the Director Qaisra Sharaz's aims for the Festival, particular given that there had been a tragic bomb attack at Manchester Arena the year before, which might have resulted in tensions between differing communities in the city. Sadly today, we never seem to be free of people who try to encourage suspicion and mistrust between people from different backgrounds.

My prior contact with Qaisra was through the Muslim-Jewish Forum and Faith Network for Manchester. Manchester has a rich mix of residents from all over the world, some who have lived here for generations, and some who, like my Jewish father, were or are former refugees or asylum seekers.

The festival shared many of the positive contributions Muslims from all over the world have made over time - and are making today, including in Greater Manchester. It was therefore a very effective learning experience for all who attended. It was deliberately very inclusive: many of the events were free, and any charges modest. Meeting other participants at the events was one of the benefits of attending. Seeing the different Muslim communities in Manchester mixing together was a real joy, as well as the mix of ages and of all backgrounds. Every event seemed to me to be a positive experience for all, together with the excitement of knowing you are partaking in a ground-breaking event. Some examples would be the Somali evening in Manchester's Central Library, and the gathering at the Turkish Star Centre, both packed events, full of enthusiasm and warmth.

The use of many iconic buildings was a real bonus, again adding to the learning experience: I had never visited the British Muslim Heritage Centre before. This was an ideal opportunity to welcome newcomers to such buildings, including the many museums and libraries in the area. MACFEST has I believe, stimulated some of those institutions into reviewing how they can highlight Muslim culture more in the future.

It now seems very likely that the aim of making MACFEST an annual event will be achieved. Qaisra's wide connections means that there are far more potential contributors than could fit in to the first one! One example is that just this week (January 2019), a related workshop on Sufi whirling (semazen) took place, showing yet another aspect of Muslim practice, which was a moving experience to others of different faiths – or none, as well.

"As a non-Muslim, I am delighted to have re-joined the volunteer group assisting Qaisra Shahraz with the second Muslim Arts and Culture Festival, held in and near Greater Manchester in January 2020 - with some additional events taking place through to May.

The opportunities MACFEST provides, to learn about other cultures and meet people with very different backgrounds are as important now as in 2018, when the first MACFEST took place. This year Oldham, Rochdale, Stockport were included: it is extremely rewarding and encouraging to see people of such varied backgrounds working, socializing and laughing together. Tez Ilyas's comedy event drew 400 people to the British Muslim Heritage Centre.

MACFEST gives voice to Muslim refugees from and survivors of persecution and their children, from several countries: I value this highly, as my father was a 14-year-old Jewish refugee from Nazism in 1939. Amongst others, two sisters from Bosnia took part this year.

Qaisra thoughtfully gave prominence to members of cultural backgrounds who had not appeared at the first MACFEST, eg the Uighur and Indonesian communities made several different contributions this year. She also included in the programme schools such as the Manchester Health Academy, where the vast majority of pupils are not Muslim. Pupils at this school designed a MACFEST poster, so needed to research Muslim art and culture for this prominent aspect of the festival. They also held a MACFEST Day, including particular focus on Turkish, Moroccan and Saudi Arabian culture. The children and staff had clearly also enjoyed producing food and poetry for this special day: their passion and dedication clear.

The use of various media was again very evident, including social media to advertise the festival and share the events widely across the Greater Manchester area - and wider, eg in Huddersfield in Yorkshire. Local newspapers, television and radio were also involved. The festival has again showcased many contributions Muslims male and female, from all over the world, have made over time, and still do, including in Greater Manchester. It was therefore a very effective learning experience for all attendees, myself included. Many of the events are free, and any charges modest: MACFEST is very inclusive.

Many iconic buildings again became involved, adding to the learning experience: as many Greater Manchester residents have never visited the Portico or John Rylands Libraries before. Another venue new to many: the Lowry Theatre in Salford, where a delightful musical evening took place, which was filmed - as are several MACFEST performances, so that even those not able to attend on the day will be able to experience the immersive atmosphere these created. The Lowry event with Spanish, Turkish and Persian music was sold out, a sign that such events could occupy larger theatre spaces in future. The Royal Exchange Theatre was also a new and special venue this time, providing a striking environment for the introduction to Persian motif painting, as did a branch of Blackwell's bookshops, for a Literary evening with readings of prose and poetry. New partnerships at MACFEST included Manchester Metropolitan University and Manchester Literature Festival. I look forward to future MACFESTs, knowing they will provide many more and varied memorable experiences to this area's residents and visitors."

The Rusholme Heritage Project team, were delighted to hear that MACFEST had been shortlisted under Leading Lights of the Year category at The 7th British Muslim Awards. I would like to express my personal recommendation for MACFEST as a worthy winner in this category.

I was very pleased to be asked by Qaisra, along with my two project colleagues, Michael Baker and Della Batchelor, to take part in MACFEST. Several months ago we had been asked by Hanif Bobat, from the Ethnic Health Forum in Rusholme, to make a photographic documentary record of everyday life along the "Curry Mile". The Wilmslow Road area of Rusholme, which for many years had earned the title through its preponderance of curry restaurants, was now changing in composition and character, through natural demographics, to a more middle eastern flavour and perhaps should now be called "Shisha Mile".

Qaisra involved our small group in some planning meetings and was keen for us, as non-Muslims to contribute our photographs and dialogue about Rusholme into MACFEST. We set up an exhibition of our mounted photographs in the main marquee over the weekend and observed it being a focus of attention for many visitors including BBC radio, Baroness Warsi and local MP Afzal Khan. This exhibition was very important in promoting this new project by, for example, our being asked to take part in local radio interviews and generating an article in a south Manchester community magazine, Open Up.

Qaisra invited us to give an illustrated talk at MACFEST about our Rusholme Project during the weekend which was followed with a lively Q&A session. This resulted in other contacts being made such as a Rusholme councillor and a local Muslim youth coordinator, which we will follow up at a later date.

I was also asked to be an event photographer over the weekend and was pleased to experience the opening session and some of the keynote talks in the marquee. The festival brought together Muslims, non-Muslims, people of different nations, different customs, ages and gender. It was a joy to see this mix of people and families interacting and enjoying themselves in this peaceful and creative environment initiated and created by Qaisra Shahraz.
