Message from Pastor

'Tis Better to Receive

"If many died through one man's trespass, much more have the grace of God and the free gift by the grace of that one man Jesus Christ abounded for many." – Romans 5:15

On Christmas Eve, 2004, I led my platoon on a cordon and search in the city of Samarra, Iraq. We were aware that it was Christmas Eve, of course, but we had more pressing problems at the time. Our patrol base was a partially blown up police station, we were lucky to get a hot meal every other day and we were mortared so regularly that we simply shrugged in our sleeping bags and went back to sleep. That Christmas Eve was exciting for all the wrong reasons. We were ambushed and a sniper's bullet struck the wall less than a foot from my head. We caught some bad guys with a lot of explosives and weapons. But at the end of the day, we did not stop to worship God nor contemplate what it meant that the Word came to us in the flesh to save us from ourselves. We just went to bed tired, with only more of the same to look forward to.

The next day, Christmas morning, we were once again on a patrol, this time in a cold rain. We were freezing and worn out from non-stop missions with almost daily contact with the enemy. We had reports of insurgent activity in a certain neighborhood and we banged on a door to a house, not sure if we were alerting the enemy or simply annoying some locals. The door opened and we saw... a Christmas tree.

There are Christians in Iraq and there have been for over a thousand years. They are not flashy with their faith and, honestly, cannot afford to be. There are too many people who want to kill them. But that didn't stop this family from celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ in a war-torn city, full of anger and violence. They knew what was important, even if we had forgotten. I was humbled. We excused ourselves as politely as we could and continued on our mission and we talked about that throughout the day. About those Christians living out their faith in the midst of so much hopelessness.

But they understood what true hope is. It is what the Patriarchs longed for, what the Prophets foretold and what the Apostles witnessed with their own eyes. The Christ had come, as was long foretold. He had come to bring peace between God and man. That was the gift we really needed, even if we didn't know it. With God's forgiveness and love, anything is possible.

Pray that God would make us as bold at those Iraqi Christians, to live out our faith in lives devoted to Him. To recognize that we don't have to go to church, we get to go to church, because there Jesus comes to us to give us forgiveness of all our sins. Contrary to what we have heard, it is better to receive... to receive adoption as children of God, to receive mercy for our trespasses, to receive the overwhelming love of God in Christ Jesus. Christmas is about receiving the Messiah and the gifts He bears for mankind. The Christ has come! Alleluia!

ANNIVERSARY ANECDOTE Celebrating 150 Years (1869-2019) December, 2019

How quickly we have moved from preparing and eagerly awaiting the 150th anniversary celebration, to now looking back with fond memories of that exciting event. The hours, weeks, months (and even years!) of preparations by many St. John members have given way to blessed memories of conversations and interactions with former members and former pastors, a wealth of historical pictures and documents produced and put on display, a wonderful lunch, good wishes from our sister and surrounding congregations, uplifting voices raised in praise to our Triune God and most importantly, the Word of God proclaimed at two anniversary services.

As we near the end of this anniversary year and look with anticipation to Advent and Christmas, we are reminded of so many past St. John Christmas recollections. Every generation gives witness to the excitement of the Children's Christmas Service. For some that meant new dresses or clothing, exchanging gifts, finding the popcorn ball and orange nestled in the bottom of a bag of candy, or memorizing and reciting a "piece" to bring to light the Christmas message. For the most senior of members, the memories involve coming to church by horse and sleigh, or a ceiling-high Christmas tree adorned with real lighted candles. And for others, it is the lighting of individual candles, the dimming of the overhead lights, and voices joined in singing "Silent Night" at the Candlelight Services. For some, a verse or two sung in German would roll off their lips just as it had when they were children.

As we notice the shortening of daylight hours at this time of year, we have to think back to the lives of our St. John pioneer ancestors to appreciate the difficulty and darkness of those times. For the first half of our 150-year history, there was no electricity in our church or in our homes. A few lanterns and candles were all that provided light through the long dark winter nights. How welcoming the season of Christmas and the message of "the Light that came into the World" must have been to these early Town of Wien Christians.

It was during Pastor Jeff's tenure that he began describing St. John with this slogan: "Where the Light of Jesus Christ Always Shines!" We know that we cannot physically make Jesus do anything, and in no way does the slogan suggest that the light only shines here. Yet it is no stretch of the imagination to envision Pastor Jeff driving back to St. John on any given night and being guided home by the lighted steeple piercing the dark night sky. And although many of us may see some amount of symbolism in a lighted steeple pointing to the heavens, it would mean nothing if not for all the faithful pastors called to proclaim the gospel message that enables the saving Light of Christ to shine into the hearts of our congregations and community.

It is this Light of Jesus Christ which led our ancestors through the darkness of their days, through the hardships of their lives and labors, through world wars and the Great Depression. It is that same Light that we need to focus on today as we make our way through an often fractured and chaotic world. It is that Light which we must follow into the new year; and it is only that saving Light which will finally lead us Home.

Got Extra Deer? Consider giving to Deer Donation Program

If you enjoy deer hunting but don't need any venison for your freezer, consider donating it to someone in need.

Since 2000 when this program started in Wisconsin hunters have donated 90,000 deer that supplied 3.7 million pounds of ground venison to food pantries.

To celebrate 20 years of the program, hunters who donate a deer in 2019 will receive a free hat as a thank you.

Hickory Nutz Sausage of Medford processed seven deer in 2018 for food pantries, they said they would like to have more in the 2019 hunting season.

Other processors accepting donated deer in nearby communities include Pinter's Packing of Dorchester (715-654-5444), River Valley Meats of Withee (715-229-4230), Smith Brothers Meats of Colby (715-223-2777) and Custom Meats of Marathon City (715-443-3734).

Any legally harvested deer can be donated by dropping it off at a participating processor. We suggest you call the processor first to make sure they have space for your deer. Field dress and register your deer.
