Message from Pastor

Properly Busy

First, I want to thank everyone for their help and support while my family and I endured the coronavirus and necessary quarantine. My first symptoms subsided quickly, but then a few days later I was hit again. God humbles those who need to be humbled. I added a few days to my quarantine because Tami & Brayden were a few days behind me and it seemed prudent not to accidentally carry the virus to church. This week we emerge from our cocoons, eager to spread our wings... or at least go to the grocery store, get a haircut, etc.

In short, there is a lot we haven't been able to do and now we have to catch up. I cancelled every meeting, class and shut-in appointment on my schedule for two weeks, but those things don't just evaporate like October frost on the sidewalk. I need to fit the missed things in with all of the other things on my schedule. To top it all off, things will start to ramp up at the end of this month, with deer season opening, Thanksgiving and – most certainly not least – the start of Advent on Sunday, Nov. 29. Sometimes people ask if pastors dread the busy times (Advent and Lent) and perhaps some do. I actually prefer them. Yes, I am a little strange and feel a bit lost when I don't have five things to do. Some of you are like that as well. But the reason I like Advent and Lent isn't because they are simply full of activity. It is because they are properly busy, focused on what is truly important.

Paul warned the church in Thessalonica against idleness and selfishness, saying ""we hear that some among you walk in idleness, not busy at work, but busybodies." (2 Thes 3:11). There apparently were people in the congregation acting like mooches, sponging off others but giving the appearance of being "too busy to work". We are all to support ourselves, to earn our own way so that we can then be of help to others. We are to use our time wisely on the things that matter, not being busy for the sake of looking busy, not filling up our time with fruitless endeavors and selfish pursuits. Advent helps us do that. Advent is not pre-Christmas. It is about the coming of the Christ into the world for us sinners. He came once to usher in a new age of reconciliation with God by dying on the cross. And He will come again to inaugurate the final age, the renewal of the universe and us along with it. An age of peace and holiness, when we will live in the presence of the Living God just as Adam and Eve once did.

So as we approach this Advent season, remember what it is we are waiting for: We aren't waiting for Jesus to be born. He already did that. We are waiting for the consummation of all of God's promises to the prophets and evangelists. We are waiting for the return of our Lord. When you are expecting a special guest, you know what you should be busy doing: Preparing. This should be our focus each day, not just four weeks out of the year. Going about the work God has given us so, helping others, making peace with those we are in conflict with, and sharing the Gospel of Jesus as if His arrival were right around the corner. Because it is.

St. John Church Council Minutes

Tuesday, Oct. 13,2020

It was decided that from here forward, each month, the council minutes would be published in the newsletter following the meeting.

The council met Tuesday, Oct. 13'th, at 7pm. with Doug Brown opening the meeting, Present were Pastor Schopp, Stephan Schneider, Cathy Schneider, Ronda Durkee, Jeff Werner, Mel Niemann, and Sharon Niemann.

Pastor opened the meeting with prayer. Stephan gave a summary of the last meeting business.

Pastor gave his report and the major topics will be reviewed at the voters meeting. We did nominate Pastor Shawn Andersen, Pastor of St Peter Lutheran Church / Dorchester as circuit visitor. Discussion of Thanksgiving Services determined that to limit number; we would celebrate Thanksgiving on the 22'nd of November, the Sunday before that Thursday. This would protect our need to distance and limit visitors during the time of the new mandates for Covid 19.

Elder's reported that a list of delinquent members will be handed out at the voter's meeting on Oct. 18'th. Then, a special voter's meeting would be on November 15'th to take care of the list. In the mean time, each member on the list will be contacted one last time to offer every opportunity to consider their options.

Outreach team reported that the blood drive, Oct. 24 already had 6 appointments reserved. Complete sanitation of the parish hall will be done after the event. Information has been gathered on the legal options that we have for putting a sign down off of the corner of Huckleberry and Highway 97. These look to be in the range of \$1000 for a plain 1ft X 8ft arrow. To a 2ft X 4Ft sign for \$3000. This is what Stratford Sign has proposed so far.

Harvest Dinner Numbers are in: We served 440meals, 30 partials and received \$5106 in donations. 70 people worked for the event. Expenses were \$1252.91 and that leaves a balance of \$3853.09 in profits.

Treasurer's report was reviewed as printed. We are showing a need for about \$1000 per month short fall over the last 12 months. (The blessing of having restricted funds that we are able to borrow from have helped greatly. This is how we started the past year and have not gone farther behind.)

Finance committee needs two volunteers for 2021. Please see Jeff, If, you are able to help with the counting.

Pastor read notes left by the **trustees**. Work has been done on the tanks, Projector is here and it is installed; we just need an electrician to complete the work to get rid of the extension cord. Church Mutual, our property insurance company is offering a free "water leak and pipe freezing" monitor. We just need to ask for it. The trustees are asked to do this as soon as they can.

All reports were approved.

In order to continue the adult Bible Class, a large screen projector needed to be installed to allow for social distancing. The only room available for this to continue is the parish hall and the large west wall. After much thoughtful discussion it was decided to move the cross to a prominent place in the building. In the next few weeks, there will be several options marked with paper cutouts to represent where that cross may be placed. Change is always hard; but this may give us a way to honor a gift to this congregation from the laborers for Christ in an even more special way.

We know blessings will come out of this crazy, awkward, scary, Covid time, but God promises all even this will be worked to our good.

Elders offered to place paper options up; so we will watch for these in the next few weeks. Make your suggestions known to the trustees and elders.

One alternative had been to put a big screen in front of the cross and we just felt that would not honor the gift like we wished it be done.

Hearing no more business, meeting was adjourned.

Confession and Absolution

We can indeed approach God with confidence. And yet, because we stand on this side of our Lord's final return, we still have with us the devil, the world, and our sinful flesh. We have not yet faced the final judgment.

And so, with sin still working in us, the condemnation of God's Law must still confront us, lest we have any delusions that we might have something to boast of before our mighty Judge.

Above all else, Confession and Absolution keep us honest — honest with ourselves and honest before God. The act of confession is not some work that we lay before the Father's throne; rather, it is the simple acknowledgment that God's Word is true and right and that when we measure ourselves against its demands, we come up short.

God's Word says "you shall not give false testimony," but in truth we have lied and gossiped and slandered. And so, the Christian confesses: "Lord, Your Word is true; I have sinned."

There are three basic ways to handle sin and guilt. One is to ignore or minimize them. We've all been tempted in that direction more than a few times. Isn't that, after all, what our sinful human nature is all about?

Another way is to institutionalize them, especially the guilt part. After all, if you can keep people feeling just guilty

enough, you will keep them coming back for more.

The third way is to give sin and guilt their proper due, and then to silence them. That is the way of God's absolution. With his forgiveness, our sin is removed from us as far as the east is from the west.

Christians know that, but they also need to hear it often. We need to be reminded that those familiar words, "I forgive you all your sins," are not just some impersonal announcement. They say what they mean and accomplish what they promise. Jesus himself said to his disciples that the sins they forgive are forgiven (John 20:23).

The last and greatest absolution that will ever be spoken to us will be at the last judgment. In the final pages of the *Chronicles of Narnia*, C.S. Lewis provides a marvelous description of this event.

As each individual comes before Aslan — the lion who is Lewis' figure for Christ — one of two things happens: either the person gazes directly into Aslan's face and recognizes his forgiving countenance, or, upon seeing the lion's stern demeanor, passes into his long shadow, forever to be separated from Christ.

In the Confession and Absolution we are being readied for our appearance before Christ on the Last Day. And hidden behind those comforting words that our sins are forgiven is the invitation, "Come, you who are blessed by my father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world" (Matt. 25:34).

When our Lord speaks those words to us at the Last Day, Confession and Absolution as we know it will cease, for we will then bask in the eternal absolution of the Lamb.
