

Message from Pastor

"This is my body." Such a familiar statement to any faithful Christian, especially to us Lutherans. These are words of promise and hope. They are words of power that deliver exactly what they say when spoken in the context of The Lord's Supper, the body of Christ to and for you. On the night that He was betrayed, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ used these words to make a new covenant that He sealed with His own Body and Blood "...for the forgiveness of sins." With these words of Jesus we are given new life.

But as with all good things in God's Creation, we have taken the gift of these words, and have turned them into something corrupted, sinful, and warped. "This is my body," has become a rallying cry for what Pope John Paul II first called "a culture of death." This January Christians from all over the country will once again descend on Washington D. C. to march in support of Life Issues. January is chosen because it was in that month that the tragic Supreme Court decision known as *Roe v. Wade* legalized access to abortion on demand, a decision that opened the flood gates to so many other issues of Life which we as Christians continue to stand against, even with the overturning of that fateful decision.

"This is my body," a woman says, and she is allowed to have the new life and body growing within her killed for the sake of convenience. "This is my body," says the man suffering from a painful illness, and now multiple states allow that person to demand medical assistance to commit suicide. "This is my body," a person says to justify any one of a number of other sinful and corrupted actions in order to put themselves first and foremost in all things, actions that will ultimately lead them to death in both their body and their spirit.

But we know better. Our bodies and our lives are not our own. They have been bought and paid for by the Body and Blood of Christ. His body was the payment that was made to redeem our bodies and lives from eternal death. The Executive Director of Lutherans for Life, Rev. Michael Salemink writes, "Legislative decrees do not form the foundation for our faith. Judicial decisions do not forge our confession. Neither do philosophical principles nor emotional intensity nor cultural consensus. These forces, as well as all our convictions and conduct, follow from the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

"Jesus has earned the authority He exercises. He entered into death for us and rose alive again, victorious over it. He reserves for Himself the privilege of providing life, and the responsibility for deciding death...Life always arrives as His gift – in His time and on His terms... God's love furnishes each human life with equal and infinite value. His work of creating in His image...proclaims all human beings special. His labor of redeeming...proves all human beings precious. His activity of calling...pronounces all human beings priceless. His grace – not one's age or appearance or origin or actions or abilities, or any lack thereof – provides sanctity and significance...God never gives up, and neither do His people, particularly wherever the devil's deceptions use death as a solution to suffering...

### **Frequently Asked Questions**

The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod answers frequently asked questions about its beliefs and positions

# QUESTION: Can you explain Epiphany? Also, when was the Circumcision of our Lord?

**ANSWER:** Epiphany is from a Greek word meaning to "reveal" or "make manifest." The season of Epiphany is our time to focus on the revelation of "who" Jesus is: both true God and man.

On the Festival of Epiphany, Jan. 6, we hear the reading of the visit of the wise men (Matt. 2:1-12). In that event, these foreigners bowed down in acknowledgment that this infant was indeed the Christ, the Son of God.

The Sunday after Epiphany we hear the story of the Baptism of Jesus (Matt. 3:13-17). Here, God the Father confirms this man standing in the water is His beloved Son. The following Sunday we hear the story of the changing of water into wine at Cana (John 2:1-11). Through this event, Jesus revealed his glory and his disciples put their faith in him.

According to Jewish law, all males were circumcised on the eighth day — one week after their birth. We don't know the actual birth date of Jesus so we don't know the day of His circumcision either.

But since we have set aside a date for observing His birth, Dec. 25, we then set aside Jan. 1 (eight days later) as the date for the naming and circumcision of Jesus (Luke 2:21). The significance of this day is that our Savior began His long ministry of submitting Himself to the Law in our place.

Also, this was the first shedding of His blood, and points, in a small way, to the ultimate shedding of His blood on the cross.

It is with sadness that I share with you a tragedy that took place in our District over the weekend.

There was an accident on Highway 10 near Weuyauwega that killed four young people; the stepchildren of our brother Pastor Kurt Schilling who serves Emmaus Lutheran Church (Town of Lind) which is about 5 miles south of Waupaca.

Two of the children were in their 20's and the other two 14 and 9; part of the Weyauwega-Fremont School District. Reports state that they were returning home about 9:00 pm Saturday night when a pickup truck traveling in the wrong direction hit them head on. The driver of the pickup truck was in critical condition and has been arrested for drunk driving.

Circuit Visitor Jeffrey Smiles and myself have been in contact with Pastor Schilling and the leaders of Emmaus. The family of Emmaus has established a Go Fund Me account to assist Pastor Schilling and his wife with funeral expenses and setting up a memorial. 


