


Called the first "eco film", the photography of flocks of birds and natural scenes is beautiful and reinforces the message about plume hunting which was finally banned in the early 1900s.

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MESSAGE FROM THE MANAGER by Thomas Lockyear

The past three months have been extremely challenging for all of us in the Collier County Museum, but particularly difficult here at Museum of the Everglades. The Museum officially re-opened on December 18th with a small exhibit of photographs entitled "Images of Irma" illustrating the aftermath of the storm and the level of devastation faced by Everglades City residents. Captured by local photographer JohnBob Carlos, the images provide a stark contrast to the current state of the community – streets clean and free of debris for the first time in months. Many of our visitors are shocked to discover that these photos were from the recent storm and not historic images.

It has been a slow process getting back to business here at the Museum. Phones were finally restored two weeks ago and we have only had computer connectivity as of last Friday. About 90% of the artifacts removed to the vault at the Collier Museum in Naples for safekeeping have been returned and placed on display. We have used this opportunity to have many of our artifacts that were in need of attention cleaned, conserved, and in some cases repaired. Our ¼ scale model of a dugout canoe is currently undergoing restoration by Seminole artist and historian Brian Zepeda – who carved it for us almost two decades ago. Likewise, our model of the Bay City Walking Dredge used to build the Tamiami Trail is being fine-tuned and re-strung by its creator, Jerry Enders.

The Museum's office furniture, all of which was destroyed by Hurricane Irma, has been replaced by matching pieces with a rustic finish



nicely suited to our historic structure. Another recent addition is a huge alligator-shaped bicycle rack (able to accommodate up to 14 bikes, -perfect for tour groups that arrive by bicycle) that was originally intended as part of our parking lot improvement plan. Custom-crafted by a company in Minnesota, delivery of this wonderfully whimsical piece of functional public art was repeatedly delayed. It finally showed up in November

and has been bringing smiles to the faces of everyone who sees it.

Our new exhibit that combines a brief history of Plume Hunting in the Everglades with the 60th Anniversary (*see page 1*) of the 1958 Hollywood film about plume poaching – "Wind Across the Everglades" opened on Saturday, January 13th. Running just five weeks, this exhibit will feature some spectacular artifacts on loan from individuals and institutions who have generously agreed to help us tell this story in even greater detail. Be sure to stop in to see everything before we bring in a new exhibit for the Marjory Stoneman Douglas Festival in late February.

We appreciate your support as we move slowly forward in 2018. We have lost several volunteers due to repercussions of the storm, so if you are here in Everglades City and have time to spare – even a few hours a week – we would love to have you join us. As always, your tax-deductible donations to the Friends of Museum of the Everglades help us to continue our mission: to preserve the region's history and to share it with visitors and residents alike. We thank you for joining us on this journey. Happy New Year!
