Due to the fury of Hurricane Irma the temporary special exhibit, "A Heart for Alligators: A Retrospective of the Art of Jurg 'George' Furrer' will be relocated to the Collier Museum at Government Center, 3331 Tamiami Trail E, Naples, FL 34112. The exhibit will be on display in the newly renovated Rogers Art Studio from Saturday, November 11, 2017 to Saturday, December 30, 2017.

The exhibit opened briefly at the Museum of the Everglades the week prior to the storm but was removed for safe-keeping. The Museum of the Everglades remains closed to the public while it undergoes repairs. While it is unfortunate that this exhibit will not be shown as planned in the community George loved and became a part of, the venue chosen for its relocation is nonetheless appropriate. It is a historic building that once served as the studio of E. George Rogers, a local artist, who likewise dedicated his craft to his community.


HURRICANE IRMA'S DEVASTATING HISTORIC EVENT

On September 11 residents of Everglades City experienced the fury of Hurricane Irma. Winds gusted over 140 mph and in some areas the storm surge rose above 8 feet. The morning after saw a flooded town, as shown below, with water levels above the knee deep in the streets and over the docks. The photo below left shows resident Ron Ouellette and Mayor Pro Tem Howie Grimm assessing damage in the DuPont area. Irma will forever be remembered with pictures and personal stories to be shared for generations to come.

("A Heart for Alligators" (continued from page 1) "A Heart for Alligators - a retrospective of the art of Jurg "George" Furrer celebrates the works of the artist who passed away in 2014. A popular illustrator and syndicated cartoonist in his home country of Switzerland, George was a familiar face in Everglades City for many years, visiting on an annual basis and making many lifelong friendships. George brought his appreciation for the region's unique flora and fauna home with him. He seamlessly incorporated much of what he experienced in Everglades City into his art. In 1994, he published a book of cartoons with Everglades themes: "Ein Herz fur Alligatoren" ("A Heart for Alligators") from which this exhibit takes its name and included preservation and restoration in the area. Many of the places he captured in his artwork on display were badly damaged or completely destroyed by the recent storm. This exhibit, which began as a celebration of George's work has now become a tribute to our region's most colorful locations -"many of them now sadly lost forever, " said the Museum of the Everglades Manager Thomas Lockyear.

In honor of George Furrer's appreciation for the Everglades we invite you to visit this heartfelt exhibit. Within this retrospective is a selection of original prints as well as copies of his books and other objects emblazoned with his distinctive alligator images.

This exhibit is timely in the context of Everglades City's current challenge to recover from the devastation of Hurricane Irma. George Furor was instrumental in the effort to restore the historic City Hall following its damage by Hurricane Wilma in 2005. Still he remained a staunch proponent of preserving historic memories and artifacts.

Manager's Report by Thomas Lockyear

The phones are still down and the Museum of the Everglades remains temporarily closed as the damage done by Hurricane Irma continues to be assessed. Please direct all calls to me at the museum: (239) 695- 0008.

The 14th Annual Marjory Stoneman Douglas Festival WILL take place as planned and more information will be forthcoming via the Friends website and Facebook page.

Residents of Everglades City experienced the fury of Hurricane Irma. Winds gusted over 140 mph and in some areas the storm surge rose above 8 feet. Fortunately the Museum of the Everglades incurred no structural damage from the storm despite floodwaters which rose close to five feet. Because of the museum building's elevation more than 8 inches of water came pouring in covering the historic heart of pine floorboards. One of the saddest sights was the broken sign shown in the picture below center taken by Kent Daniels.

On the third day following the storm I was able to enter the building (picture above right). With shovel in hand and protection from mold, it was scary to see the floors covered with ¾ of an inch of slimy mud brought in with the surge. Since the storm surge of Hurricane Wilma in 2005, the dense Dade County Pine had been dry as a bone for over a decade. Wilma's surge immersed the floorboards with seawater causing them to swell to half again their size. The floor buckled in half a dozen spots.

Sensitive artifacts had been removed prior to Irma's arrival We have since removed everything from fixtures to furniture from the building as cleaning, repair and restoration takes place. Mold and moisture mitigation through the structure was also addressed and the building was given a clean bill of health. Currently we are working with historic restoration experts to preserve as much of the damaged floor as possible. It is our goal to preserve the integrity of this building.

Like many residents of Everglades City, MOE assistant Martha Hutcheson's home was hit hard by Hurricane Irma and she spent the first couple weeks literally digging out from the mud left behind by the storm surge. She has been quick with her familiar smile and kept her sense of humor throughout the ordeal—a testament to her strength and resilience. Martha is currently assisting Jennifer Perry at the Marco Island Historical Museum while Museum Assistant Jessica Patel is out on maternity leave. We are anxious to have Martha back at Museum of the Everglades when we open again, but grateful that she is available to help out at one of Collier County's other great museums.

We appreciate your patience and determination as we navigate the rough waters ahead!

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A Call for Volunteers **Support Collier County Museums**

A message from Grant Matthews, Volunteer Coordinator, Collier County Museums

The Old Florida Festival, our flagship event, is a celebration of 500+ years of Florida history as told through historical redactors, demonstrators, craft workers, music, food, dance and art. The two-day event will take place at the Collier Museum at Government Center (main museum in East Naples) on Saturday and Sunday, November 18th and 19th from 10 am - 5 pm each day.

This is one of our largest events in the museum system and we typically bring in several thousand visitors. That being said, the volunteer needs are immense. Helping out with arts and crafts, greeting visitors with maps and information, aiding as a floating docent, helping to deliver food and water to the reenactors, pouring beer and serving food, and helping with the general set-up and breakdown of the event are just a few of the examples of what you can expect a volunteer role to be at the Festival.

We are going to need the assistance of well over 40 volunteers (a concrete number and schedule will come in the follow weeks) to help us put on this event. Most of the volunteer duties will be split up between morning and afternoon shifts each day. Of course you can choose whichever shift(s) you want. There is no minimum or maximum number of hours to volunteer at the event – all help is welcome. We will do our best to assign you to a volunteer role that most suits your interests. Volunteers must be at least 15 years old, and all volunteers under the age of 18 must have a permission slip/agreement that we will provide for their parent or guardian to sign. This is a great way to get hours for school requirements before the end of the semester!

If any of you have an interest in helping us out, please let me know as soon as possible so that we can start assigning roles. This is a big event and we are going to need all the help we can get.
