It has been a privilege to have Vicky Wells involved with the Museum of the Everglades as her family's heritage is well connected to our town. Vicky's early years were spent in Southwest Florida where she attended the Tommy Barfield Elementary School on Marco Island and later the Everglades City Public School. It was a fish house owned by her aunt and uncle.

Her hands-on approach continues to serve the museum. 

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Meet Mama Dot

The picture of Helen Bryan and Mama Dot (page 1) taken at the Museum's birthday party last month inspired some research. It didn't take long to find an article on the internet that was posted 40 years ago in the News Press in Fort Myers January 7, 1977. It is copied below:

A commercial fisherman's widow, Mama Dot has lived in Everglades City for 32 years, "and I wouldn't move away for anything. I like it just the way it is." When you leave the restaurant, you might explore the adjacent treasury known as Everglades Sundries. Between its high ceilings and hardwood floors you'll find an inventory ranging from stick candy to fan belts. Then head out on foot down Broadway to the columned City Hall (once the county offices), and to the recreation grounds where on Feb. 5 the town will host a hoped-for 10,000 guests for its third annual Seafood Festival. But the thought of such a gathering is as alien to everyday Everglades as a highrise garage and traffic lights. Here a dog can cross a street in safety, and even stop for a scratch along the way. . "You ever see this place at night? The street lights are on, and there's no traffic," said Marty Bowen. "I tell the Yankees it's the only lit-up cemetery in Florida." Bowen was seated in a leather chair in the stern, dim lobby of the nearby Rod and Gun Resort Lodge. Once a gathering-place for royalty, Presidents and millionaires, the lodge has had a bittersweet past. "We've been almost bankrupt twice, but things are doing better," said Bowen, who has owned and operated the lodge for four years. Adjacent to the lobby is the dining room and the screened porch which looks out on the canal that many of the lodge's guests arrive on. You may find that with meals (\$7-\$8 range for dinner; \$4-\$5 for lunch) you're paying more for this atmosphere than for service or food, but a mid-afternoon refreshment break at the lodge shouldn't be missed. And if you take Mama Dot's advice you'll soon make tracks south on State Road 29 from the mid-town circle for the five-minute trip to the little island known as Chokoloskee. On the way, however, take note of two more attractions you might want to enjoy. Look for the Everglades Airport, where you can take a flight above these thumbnail communities, the sprawling Everglades, and the edge of the Ten Thousand Islands, all courtesy of Harold "Happy Harry" Enquist.
