The Museum of the Everglades is proud to present "A Heart for Alligators – a retrospective of the art of Jurg 'George' Furrer," who passed away in 2014. A popular illustrator and syndicated cartoonist in his home country of Switzerland, George was a familiar face in Everglades City for many years, visiting on an annual basis and making many lifelong friendships. George brought his appreciation for the region's unique flora and fauna home with him, incorporating many of the things he experienced here into his art. In 1994 he published a book of cartoons with Everglades themes: "Ein Herz fur Alligatoren" ("A Heart for Alligators") from which this exhibit takes its name. Included in this retrospective at the Museum of the Everglades will be a selection of original prints as well as copies of his books and other objects emblazoned with his distinctive alligator images.



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Manager's Report by Thomas Lockyear

When I assumed the duties of Manager at the Museum of the Everglades in January, the traveling exhibit of Everglades City native Rob Storter's folk art had not been displayed for over three years. When our Friends group expressed to me that they would like to see it travel again, I began working toward making this goal a reality.

My colleague Brad Bertelli, curator of the Florida Keys History & Discovery Center, was immediately interested and we began making the necessary arrangements. After navigating the reams of red tape such collaborative efforts between cultural institutions inevitably entail, the exhibit - "Never No More: Storter's Southwest Florida" - went on public display in the upstairs gallery at that museum in mid-July.

I recently made a day trip to Islamorada to see the exhibit in its new temporary home and to give a presentation coinciding with the exhibit's opening. My talk, titled "Just Across the Gulf - the Historic Connections Between Everglades City and the Florida Keys", explored the relationship between the Keys and the 10,000 Islands region dating back to the time of the Civil War. I told the stories of pioneering families including John J. Weeks, William Smith Allen (former mayor of Key West) and the Storter family.

A large portion of the audience was comprised of board members and museum docents - most of whom were unfamiliar with the history of our region and its symbiotic relationship with the Keys. I was able to provide them with background information about Rob Storter for their tours while building a greater appreciation for the unique culture and heritage of Everglades City. The Storter exhibit will be on display in Islamorada through October.

Many of those in attendance were inspired to visit our museum and even inquired about group tours. We look forward to welcoming them and sharing more of our history when they visit.
