

# "You Are Witnesses to These Things"

Happy Easter! We continue to say that throughout this season that will lead us to Pentecost and the coming of the Holy Spirit. We continue to bask in the Easter joy, God's Divine Mercy, and the hope of the resurrection that is the center of our faith. Jesus is truly risen! My heart has been full as I look back on the beginning of this year, 2021 and see the great things God has done. I recognize that sometimes I, and maybe all of us, can miss the incredible Glory of God, and the amazing things He is doing to and for us because of a few of minor hiccups we experience, or even complaints. Some of the "things" that the Lord is doing here at St. William the Abbot are no less than miraculous. So much of that comes from our incredible staff and volunteers who so selflessly give to the Lord and this community. I would just like to acknowledge and thank them for their dedication and Christian service. But also, the docility and openness of all of you - the People of God who trust us and allow yourselves to be led.

The past week has been a challenge personally as my family and I move into a new season with my dad and his illness. Thank you for your notes, emails, and well wishes for him. But I want to thank you also for the way so many of you have lived the Gospel theme of this 3rd weekend of Easter, by expressing to so many the awe and wonder of God working in your life. You have become the witnesses of the great things that God is doing – seeds that were planted early on this year. I am mindful of the thousands of people who came through the church on Ash Wednesday to receive ashes, went to confession, or simply lit a candle in silent prayer. How the availability of daily, weekend, and Mondays of Mercy confession times allow you and your family to celebrate that powerful sacrament. The growth in attendance of masses each weekend, but especially the overflow on Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday, and the many who came to the Easter Triduum liturgies both outside and inside. The overwhelming generosity to Outreach and the food pantry led by Allison Marro and her team. The family conversations that have been stirred up by one of Fr. Collins' homilies, or Fr. James's podcast, the social media inspirational prayer posts and quotes, the Faith Formation assignments, the prayer opportunities for our school children and their parents, the beauty of the music, environment, and liturgies for Holy Week. I even received a call-in thanksgiving about the dedication of our maintenance staff and all they did to make the campus and buildings ready for Easter.

There will always be places to improve - and together we will strive for that. Logistical and practical improvements will always be necessary, but I was thinking about the reading from the Acts of the Apostles this week, Acts 4:31: As they prayed, the place where they were gathered shook, and they were all filled with the holy Spirit and continued to speak the word of God with boldness.

That is my hope for us as a community, that we will boldly proclaim the truth of the Gospel in this parish and beyond and filled with the Holy Spirit as we pray; the ground will shake. I pray that we will always be a place for people to come and feel welcome, that they will come to know the Lord, and then be motivated to tell others about what they have experienced. We are so in need of strong witnesses to the Catholic faith. I remember early on being somewhat disappointed that in a parish with close to 6000 registered families our mass attendance only shows about 15 to 20% as active. But if we look deeper, I believe God is communicating to us to be less concerned about getting 100% attendance in the church building, but to allow for "God Encounters" one family at a time. That only happens when we tell of the "great things" that God has done to us and our families. And so, I challenge and encourage you to be like those first disciples, those bold witnesses to the faith, and to tell others what God is doing in your heart, in your family, and here at the parish.

Let us pray that Lord bestows on our parish a "new springtime" of blessings and inspires motivated disciples willing to build His Kingdom – one brick, one heart, one family at a time.



# Stump the Priest







## Why can't a Catholic Wedding take place at a favorite place, home or beach?

A Catholic wedding is a sacrament and the most favorite place for the sacrament of Holy Matrimony to take place is within the Church.

There are many beautiful places where a couple may want to celebrate their wedding. Some of these places may even have a special meaning to the couple. Maybe that's the place where they met, or maybe that's the place where they dreamed of going together as a married couple. Whatever the reasons why the couple may want to celebrate their wedding at a place that is not a Catholic church, it is important for the couple to know that a wedding ceremony has so many spiritual, theological and ecclesiastical implications that tend to be forgotten when we focus our attention in the beauty of the physical space, such as the floral arrangements or the decorations of the "wedding." In other words, a couple needs to maintain focus on the Sacrament of Marriage, not just the physical details of the wedding ceremony.

Let us remember that a Catholic wedding is the ritual through which a Sacrament takes place; the Sacrament of Marriage. This is the reason why the Church requires that the ceremony be held in a proper space; a Catholic parish. Christ, who honored the wedding at Cana with his presence, is also present in the Eucharist when the wedding ceremony takes place inside the church. Bishops are very reluctant to grant authorization for outdoor weddings by a Catholic parish, because they are concerned with maintaining a sense of the sacred, which is precisely what happens at a Catholic wedding ceremony — it is a sacred sacramental occasion.

The reasons why a local bishop may grant authorization for a catholic wedding to be celebrated elsewhere include political, cultural or even for safety reasons. One example may be when a church building planned for hosting the wedding ceremony has suffered structural damage, due to earthquakes or other natural disasters. However, these circumstances are highly unusual. A wedding is a special moment in the life of the new family that is beginning. Therefore prospective couples are encouraged to focus all of your attention and efforts in making it a memorable event that will emphasize the sacredness of the occasion through the exchange of the promises that will make this an everlasting covenant.

# While attending Mass during this difficult time


- · Please sanitize your hands

# **Safety Protocols**

As more of you are returning back to in-person Mass, we want to reemphasize that all of our safety protocols are still in place.

Please allow the ushers to seat you they have been carefully trained in our seating arrangement that will enable us to get the maximum number of worshippers seated in the Sanctuary while maintaining social distancing.



# Communion by Car Line for High-Risk Individuals

Please consider virtual Mass if you are high risk of severe illness due to COVID-19.

Weather permitting, we will continue to offer outdoor Communion (via car line) on Sundays at 1 PM, following the live-streamed Mass at 12 PM.

# **Holy Communion**

Because of concerns regarding the coronavirus, we request that those who choose to receive on the tongue wait at the end of the line. Please present themselves to the priest only to receive Holy Communion, and are asked to open their mouth and extend their tongue so the host can be placed on it without the priest's hand making contact with the recipient.

If you choose to receive in the hand, please place your hand out very straight and flat to allow the priest or minister to place the Eucharist safely in order to avoid contact with your hand. We also kindly remind everyone to please remove your mask before receiving Holy Communion, whether you choose to receive on the tongue or in the hand. Please put it back on after you have consumed the host.

# **Holy Communion**



When it is time to receive Holy Communion, please practice social distancing as you walk in the communion line. On the way back to your pew please maintain spacing. Everyone will come down the center aisles to receive communion. Please do not rush back to your seats.

# **Arrive Early & Wear Your Mask**



We do ask that everyone arrive early so that we can seat everyone before the start of Mass. We ask that all parishioners wear their mask covering their nose and mouth at all times while inside the church.

# **Sacristy**



For the safety of our Priests, we ask that parishioners refrain from entering the Sacristy. Please do not hand offering envelopes, letters etc. to the Priests. Please drop them off in the Rectory Mail Slot.
