This Sunday's Gospel (Luke 12:49-53) is one of those moments when Jesus stops us in our tracks. We often picture Him as the Good Shepherd, the Prince of Peace — gentle, comforting, and reassuring. Yet here, He says something that feels out of character: "No, I tell you, I come not to bring peace, but division." At first, it doesn't sound like the Jesus we think we know. But He is telling us that choosing to follow Him is not always easy or universally welcomed. It will sometimes cause strain in our families, our friendships, and even our own hearts. Many of us know the pain of seeing loved ones drift from the Church, speak critically about our faith, or, perhaps worst of all, treat it with indifference.

And yet, the Lord never calls us to a journey without hope. As many of you know, I am currently on pilgrimage in Spain, walking the Camino de Santiago toward the tomb of St. James the Apostle in the west of the country. I began in León last week and have been steadily making my way towards the sunsets - step by step. Along the way, I have been encouraged by the faith of so many pilgrims from all over the world — young and old, families, friends, and those walking alone. Their presence has reminded me that we are never truly alone in our journey of faith. We are, as the Letter to the Hebrews says in this week's second reading, "surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses." I have prayed with fellow pilgrims, celebrated Mass, and even heard a few confessions on this legendary Christian passage that is still so relevant.

I have carried you all as well, the people of St. William's, in my prayers in every step and at every stop. As I pass through tiny villages and ancient churches, I have prayed for our families, for our school, for our ministries, and our future. My hope is that we may have the courage to witness to the truth of Jesus even when it costs us comfort, even when it makes things complicated. Following Christ is not about taking the path of least resistance; it's about taking the path of greatest love, even when that love demands sacrifice.

I find myself thinking about this almost 2000 year old pilgrimage and who has walked it throughout its history celebrities, leaders of nations, deacons, priests, religious and faithful lay pilgrims. I think you know that our own patron, St. William the Abbot, made this very pilgrimage 900 years ago. He, too, would have faced challenges and discomforts, yet he pressed on toward the goal. That same perseverance is what Jesus is asking of us in this Sunday's Gospel — to stay faithful, to stay committed, and to remember that division in the short term may lead to eternal unity in heaven. For me, The Camino has been not only a walk through Spain, but a walk deeper into trust in the Lord's plan for me and for the parish. As I look back over the past six years, there have been times of great harmony in the parish family, but also broken division. Yet I believe more than ever God is calling us to a greater unity - in Him.

One fascinating unifier for all the pilgrims, no matter where they are from on this earth or what language they speak is the universal sign that helps direct the way. Throughout the countryside of Spain, there are these yellow arrows placed with the scallop shell pointing the way to the ultimate destination, which is to St. James' tomb. It is a universal sign that you are on pilgrimage. The common greeting along the way, whether by the locals, or any person on the trail is "Buen Camino", or "good way/walk". I think that's what we want for all of us - and for our family members, our loved ones, our friends - that we are all going the good way, on a good walk and journey. It's when we're not paying attention to the clear directions that we can veer off track. We only have to look for that beautiful sign of the cross, on the top of so many churches, above our beautiful sanctuary, and around the neck of the people that we love. The cross, which was so difficult for Jesus, shows us the way to happiness and eternal life. It becomes the great unifier.



Please continue to keep me in your prayers as I finish this part of the journey and know that I am lifting up each of you — your joys, your struggles, and your hopes — as I walk toward Santiago. May we all be strengthened by the example of the saints, the faith of fellow pilgrims, and the unshakable promise that Jesus is with us every step of the way. I cannot wait to get back home to Seaford and tell you all about it.






PARKING LOT MAINTENANCE




