#### "Strive to enter through the narrow gate"

A few years ago, I wrote a bulletin letter to our parish young folks who were heading off to college, small reminders to keep God and their Catholic faith a part of their life. It was following COVID, and many of the students (and their parents and grandparents) were grateful for it. As I sat somewhat delayed in Northwest Spain because of wildfires, waiting to get back to Madrid, I began to rework that letter in the hope that it can benefit all of us as the summer winds down to renew and reset our priorities, and to place God and our faith in focus.

"In all your ways be mindful of God, and He will make straight your path."

The above verse from Proverbs (3:6) has always been special to me, particularly at this time of year as we finish last-minute projects to make sure the school building is ready for the new year, welcome new families into our school community, finalize class lists for the Faith Formation program, and look forward to re-engaging ministries in the fall. As the summer winds down and we start to get back into a more regular flow in our schedules, it is a great time to reflect on how we can bring Jesus into our everyday life. And especially for those of you who are beginning a new season – transitioning into new grades, new schools, new living situations, new jobs – know that the Lord is accompanying you at every step, but it's up to us to decide how we can make room in our life and heart for Him.

The practice of your faith is essential as the foundation upon which you can build your future success and personal fulfillment; it is the harbor that will always be there to welcome you home whenever you encounter the turbulent storms. Your faith is the bridge that will keep you connected to Jesus, so it's important that you pray, go to Mass, receive the sacraments, keep the Commandments, and serve others with compassion and understanding. Live the joy of the Gospel and share it with others! I encourage you to boldly display your Bible on your bookshelf or your desk so you can reach for inspiration and support at challenging moments. You may go to a public school, or be in a secular workplace, but you can gently wear and display the Crucifix your godmother gave you or the Miraculous Medal of the Blessed Mother that your grandparents had blessed by a priest. These treasures help to reveal who you are and answer the question of who Jesus is to you and your family, but they also remind you that you are seen, known, and loved by God.

That reality comes alive in Psalm 139 where we hear "Lord you search me, you know me... you formed me and knit me in my mother's womb." The Heavenly Father sees you – always. Stay alive in your faith and go against the tide of the culture – it will be challenging but so worth it to confidently be a unique masterpiece and not a carbon copy of "what everyone else is doing." Look away from your screens - experience community and be a part of the solution! Weigh in on the challenges of the world and share your unique God-given gifts with others. There are 168 hours in a week, give God at least 2 hours of that - 1 hour on Sunday, and 10 minutes of prayer for the other 6 days - and 1 hour to serve others, the needy, the poor, the elderly, or the young. You will not be disappointed!

All of us are on a never-ending faith journey, striving to make a little space for God, permitting Him to enter in for a few minutes each day. What do we really want from the Lord? Who do we say that He is? Do we believe with our whole heart that the Lord is in charge and we are not? Sure, we all have concerns and worries about our world, but they are quickly soothed by the One who can calm the seas, who can heal the sick, and who can raise the dead. It is Jesus who is Lord – let us place our hope and trust in Him.

As September and Labor Day approach, let us all recommit and refocus through the lens of our faith. While you are making your fall calendars, can I encourage you to make Sunday Mass, daily prayer, and family meals our top priorities followed then by practice schedules, training sessions, work projects, and tutoring? Your effort will not go unrewarded by God and you will definitely see and experience the difference.

Enjoy these last few weeks of summer, and be hopeful, be grateful, be joyful, be faithful, and be blessed!

### Volunteers in the Diocese of Rockville Centre

Prior to volunteering in any parish or organization in the Diocese of Rockville Centre, the Diocese requires the following:

- 1. Attend Protecting God's Children (Virtus)
- 2. Sign the Codes of Conduct
- 3. Complete a background screening application.

(Background screening is conducted on active volunteers and employees every 5 years.)

#### Directions to Complete the 3 Requirements:

- 1. Sign up to attend a Protecting God's Children class: www.Virtus.org. When you log on to the Virtus website, you will create a Virtus account.
- a. If you have not attended a Virtus class, you are a first time registrant.
- b. On the first screen, select Rockville Centre-Safe Environment as the name of your organization.
- c. Follow all directions, provide the required information on each screen.
- d. Please be specific about your role/title. (Volunteer is not a role/title. List your role Coach, Catechist, Lector, EM, etc.)
- e. Read and Electronically acknowledge the Codes of Conduct.
- f. From the schedule, select the class you will attend. When you attend the class, be sure to sign the attendance sheet.
- g. After selecting the class, you will be instructed to complete the background screening application.

#### **Background Screening Application:**

- a. Sterling Volunteers/First Advantage is the company providing background screening.
- b. Follow all the directions to complete the background screening application. DO NOT STOP ONCE YOU BEGIN THE APPLICATION! For security purposes, if you do not complete the process you will be locked out of the system.
- c. You will be asked to provide your Social Security Number. If you do not provide a SSN you will be charged a S95.00 fee to process your application. This fee will be collected during the application process and is payable with a credit/debit card.

## LITURGICAL COLORS

Have you noticed the clergy's vestments and other elements in the sanctuary change at different times of the year or for different liturgies? These colors help to convey the mood and theme of the liturgy, guiding the faithful in their understanding of the Church's calendar and the liturgical celebrations taking place.

#### GREEN

Used and worn during "Ordinary Time" (the periods between Christmas and Lent and Easter and Advent)

Symbolizes: Hope



#### RED

Used and worn on Good Friday, Palm Sunday, Pentecost, Confirmation, and the feast days of martyrs

Symbolizes: Sacrifice

#### WHITE/GOLD

Used and worn during celebrations of Christmas and Easter, teasts of Our Lord and Blessed Mother, feasts of saints, funerals, and weddings

Symbolizes: Joy, Purity, & Glory





#### ROSE

Used and worn on Gaudete Sunday (Advent) and Laetere Sunday (Lent)

Symbolizes: Joy & Hope

#### PURPLE

Used and worn during the seasons of Advent and Lent

Symbolizes: Penance & Preparation

## **ABOUT OUR PROGRAM**


- Our program is on developing a life-long relationship between your family and Jesus through Christ-centered lessons and in the communal celebration of the Eucharist each week

# Stop Physician-Assisted Suicide in New York

New York is on the brink of legalizing physician-assisted suicide. Bill A136 has already passed the Senate and Assembly. The only thing standing in its way is Governor Hochul's veto — and she needs to hear from you.

This bill would allow doctors to prescribe lethal medication with the sole purpose of ending a patient's life. It puts the most vulnerable among us — the elderly, people with disabilities, and those facing emotional or financial despair — at even greater risk. **Suicide is not healthcare.** 

We must speak out to protect the dignity of every human life. Assisted suicide is a dangerous and deadly path — one we must not go down.

Saint Maximilian Kolbe was a martyr.




