Advent Week Three - Gaudete Sunday - Rejoice

The Gospel this Sunday once again features Saint John the Baptist, the cousin of Jesus, the forerunner of the Messiah, and one of the most interesting figures in the Bible. From the beginning of his life, he was being formed and trained to be a priest and prophet, under the guidance of his own father Zechariah, who was in the priestly line of Abijah. The Abijah priests would be kind of like a special order, like the Franciscans, or the Jesuits, or the Dominicans – and just like in today's time, priests are blessed with different gifts and talents. Some are excellent confessors, others strong administrators, others celebrate Mass with such reverence and respect, and others are able to proclaim the Gospel and preach beautifully. The priests in the line of Abijah were given the charism to boldly speak the truth, but also to help in identifying the unblemished lambs that would be used at the altar of sacrifice in the temple of Jerusalem. They would often stand near the stables and pens close to the Jerusalem Temple that would hold these animals, and as they were brought forward, they had the keen eye to look upon them and determine if they were suitable to be sacrificed or rejected and sent back to the fields.

John was an effective preacher, but we also know that he was the one who identified Jesus as "the Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world!" Due to his honest and direct proclamation of the Truth, he was eventually imprisoned. While in prison he began to wonder if Jesus was really 'the one,' and not much different than for the rest of us as we try to remain faithful and hopeful in this, at times, crazy world. Although our culture and society, and even sometimes our closest family members seem to push away the Truth and teachings of the Catholic faith - we do our best to hold out and point in anticipation to the coming of Jesus.

In the Gospel today, we hear that the faithfulness of John has let him into prison, and as strong as he is, he is also worn down by the challenges of his life and situation. Although he initially saw the great ministry and work of Jesus, and certainly heard about it from others, it seems that his faith was wavering a bit. I have to say, when I read this, it gives me a bit of comfort to know that when I might struggle in my faith journey, I am in good company with great saints like John the Baptist and many of you out there in our parish.

The scriptures reveal that John sent his own disciples to ask Jesus if he was the one, the Messiah, that the people of God have been waiting for. What is interesting is that Jesus references the first reading today from the Book of Isaiah, where the prophet 600 years before the coming of Christ revealed that the Messiah would restore what humanity had lost through sin in division. The world had experienced a dryness of faith, the spirit of confusion, fear, injustice, and wickedness, as well as sin, and debauchery. And so, Jesus directs the disciples to go back and tell John what they see Jesus doing. He has begun the process of restoration - he brings sight to the blind, hearing to the deaf, life to the dead. Jesus teaches us and shows us how to love those who are difficult to love, and to extend a hand to others that have been rejected and have never received love from anyone. Enemies are not only speaking to one another, but they are embracing and working towards communion, forgiveness, and healing.

Well unfortunately, it is now 2000 years later, and there is still brokenness in our world. Jesus has come, and this season allows us as Christians of faith to prepare for the second coming of Christ. As we enter into these last few weeks of Advent, we are once again given the great privilege to make some adjustments in our own lives. To choose to live as a beacon of light and be the change in the areas where we have a little bit of influence. It begins in our families, at the workplace, in the school, on the practice fields, and of course right here in the parish. My sisters and brothers, it is up to us to be justice, mercy, and forgiveness to others. We can bring blooms of a rich harvest of kindness and love where there has been a dry desert of self-centeredness, rudeness, and disrespect.

The Third Sunday of Advent is called Gaudete Sunday – a time to rejoice because we can see the end is near. The third candle is pink/rose showing us that Jesus, the Lord of Light is coming – but also that we have a responsibility to be bearers of that light. The fruit of Christ's Light in us is JOY – do others see joy when they see you? Or are you one of those miserable folks out there - a Grinch, a Scrooge, a Scut Farkus, a Mr. Potter, an Abominable Snowman, or an Angry Elf? We say it each week at the beginning of Mass, "Rejoice, Rejoice Emmanuel – has come to thee O Israel!" There is still a little time left, be the light your family, this parish, and our world needs!

May God's Peace and joy dwell in you.




