Advent Week 4 – Ask for a Sign

Well, my sisters and brothers, we are one step, and one week closer to the Birth of Christ. Christmas is always packed with awe and wonder – whether in our Catholic faith or in the secular world. This weekend's readings are no different, they are filled with wonder, signs, prophecies, and dreams. In the Fitzgerald house growing up we loved the TV Christmas specials, the classic records with music, and tales, and stories of long, long ago. But probably my favorite thing would be when my mom or dad would read to us bedtime Christmas stories. I did go to bed with sugar plums, and train tracks, and candy canes, and footballs, and full Christmas stockings dancing in my head. But at the end of all those stories mom and dad would pray with us and reset what Christmas was all about... the miraculous arrival of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

As we enter the Fourth Sunday of Advent, the Church has really gifted us with the full experience and long version of this season of preparation. We get to light ALL the candles and they have illuminated the hope of Christ's light to us all – and that is a good sign!!!

So often we are looking for signs – but we are not always aware – or paying attention to those happening right in front of us. I was able to experience beautiful moments of grace with some of our 8th Grade students at the Radio City Christmas Spectacular, as well as this week's St. Lucy candlelight Holy Hour. I have seen the subtle sign of God's presence in some of our catechists teaching faith formation week in and week out, and how some of our parishioners pause with their family before the creche in front of the rectory. We can get so caught up in the bad news being broadcast on the TV networks or look a little deeper and see how the Lord is trying to break through.

I think at different points in our lives we do ask God for signs either for direction, confirmation of things, or for a surety of his presence. I remember when I was thinking about becoming a priest I said, "God I'll do this, I'll give up everything and follow you, but you need to give me some sign and make this clear for me that this is what you want me to do." And He did in so many ways by random people affirming certain God-given gifts and talents and revealing how they could "see" me serving the Lord. Where have the signs been present in your life? Have you been so rushed that you have missed them – we have one week left before Christmas – how will God pierce through what has become an unbearably busy and distracting time? I encourage you to pause and ponder.

Saint Joseph gives us an example to follow and be inspired by. First, it's essential that we ponder the story as it happened and be inspired by God's individual plan by which He came to earth in the Incarnation and lived in a family – with Mary and Joseph. The "righteous carpenter" from Nazareth becomes an inspiration for our own callings in life. Joseph inspires us to face any and every mystery in life that we encounter with the utmost trust in God – always a tough one for me. But he shows us that God's ways are always far beyond our own vision and plans that we put forth. Very often in life, God will call us to walk an unknown and mysterious path – and we may question or doubt that movement in our hearts. Was that really God's voice and direction? Life does not always make perfect sense from a purely rational perspective. Very often, we must allow our human reason to be informed and led by God's supernatural plan – to discern and listen to the Spirit and respond with God's grace. For each of us, this mysterious path will be different, as it was for Mary, Elizabeth, John the Baptist, and the Wise Men. But if we are to walk by the same faith that Saint Joseph had, then we must always be willing to see the signs or dreams that the Lord may place on our hearts and allow God's revealing Word to clarify them.

My friends, as we begin the Fourth Week of Advent, we focus ever more directly upon the miracle that took place over 2,000 years ago. The scriptures present us with the familiar words of the angel of the Lord who spoke to Joseph in a dream: "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary your wife into your home. For it is through the Holy Spirit that this child has been conceived in her. She will bear a son and you are to name him Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." The Lord beckons us too – do not be afraid to take a step and grow in your faith – and more importantly to bring Jesus and the Holy Family into your own homes. It means that we are to strive to live as Holy Families – to live as a contradiction to the noise and distractions of the culture. To not be caught up in the commercialism of this time, but to make it a true season of light and hope centered around this Christ Child.

Saint Joseph recognized and read the signs, and simply responded "yes." Practically it did not make any sense – but his "yes" changed everything – in his heart, his family, and ultimately the world. Be attentive this week to the signs of God trying to enter and penetrate your heart with His love. I want to encourage you to be bold and ask for a sign from God, but then - be docile, ponder the signs, and when the Lord presents Himself – simply make room for Jesus and the Holy Family to enter into your home!

HEAP is the Home Energy Assistance Program, which helps low-income individuals and families pay for the cost of heating their homes. Eligibility and benefits are based on multiple criteria such as income, household size and heating source. If you are eligible, you may receive one regular HEAP benefit per program year. You could also be eligible for emergency HEAP benefits if you are in danger of running out of fuel or having your utility service shut off. Christmas 2022

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

Merry Christmas to you and your families!

In union with our Holy Father Pope Francis, and in a non-judgmental spirit of mercy, humility and charity, I invite everyone who will be present at our Christmas Masses, or watching our Christmas Masses via the Catholic Faith Network or CBS, or not present at all: If your life has been far from the Catholic Mass and the Eucharist, I invite you with Pope Francis to return.

I invite you to experience the power and liberation of Christ's mercy and forgiveness in the Sacrament of Penance and to cross the bridge into the full practice of your Catholic Faith through a radical fidelity to the Sunday Mass and an ever-deepening love for the Holy Eucharist.

Perhaps you are not a Catholic and yet have some mysterious attraction to the Catholic Mass and the Eucharist.

You are not alone! Many saints – I think of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, the pioneering American Catholic educator and convert – had the same experience and were drawn to enter the Church through their intuitive experience of the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist in our parish churches! Be open to the Eucharistic movement of the Holy Spirit in your life!

Our celebration of Christmas 2022 occurs this year as every Catholic diocese, every Catholic parish, every Catholic hospital, university, and institution in the United States is engaged in an evangelizing ***Eucharistic Revival***.

What do we mean by the phrase “Eucharistic Revival” and why is it so important for our celebration of Christmas?

What does a love for the Eucharist and an openness to being a 21st Century Eucharistic missionary have to do with our celebration of Christmas 2022?

Pope Francis points out the relationship between the Birth of Christ and the Holy Eucharist and the Mass. The very word Bethlehem means “house of Bread.”

Pope Francis states: “Bethlehem is the turning point that alters the course of history. There God, in the *house of bread*, is born in a *manger*. It is as if he wanted to say: ‘Here I am, as your food.’ He does not take, but gives us to eat; he does not give us a mere thing, but his very self. In Bethlehem, we discover that God does not take life, but gives it. To us, who from birth are used to taking and eating, Jesus begins to say: ‘Take and eat. This is my body.’ (Matthew 26:26) The tiny body of the Child of Bethlehem speaks to us of a new way to live our lives: not by devouring and hoarding, but by sharing and giving. God makes himself small so that he can be our food. By feeding on him, the bread of life,

we can be *reborn in love*, and break the spiral of grasping and greed. From the 'house of bread,' Jesus brings us back home, so that we can become God's family, brothers and sisters to our neighbors. Standing before the manger, we understand that the food of life is not material riches but love, not gluttony but charity, not ostentation but simplicity. The Lord knows that we need to be fed daily. That is why he offered himself to us every day of his life: from the manger in Bethlehem to the Upper Room in Jerusalem. Today too, on the altar, he becomes bread broken for us; he knocks at our door, to enter and eat with us (cf. Revelation 3:20). At Christmas, we on earth receive Jesus, the bread from heaven. It is a bread that never grows stale, but enables us even now to have a foretaste of eternal life."¹

Eucharistic Revival, in the words of Pope St. John Paul II, is a rediscovery of "Eucharistic Amazement" and Eucharistic Devotion.

Eucharistic Revival means that we understand deeply that every Mass has a cosmic significance, and every Mass is celebrated on the Altar of the world – the Altar of Ukraine and every war torn and injustice-ridden area of our world.

Eucharistic Revival is an effective catechesis of the theology and spirituality of the Catholic Mass that moves the hearts, minds, souls and imaginations of the People of God.

Eucharistic Revival in our Catholic schools means the cultivation of a radical fidelity to the Sunday Catholic Mass on the part of our teachers, our staff and our families.

Eucharistic Revival is a rekindling of Pope Benedict XVI's insight that every period of Church reform and effective Catholic evangelization and mission throughout history can be traced to a rediscovery of the Real Presence of Jesus Christ, Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity in the Holy Eucharist.²


As we celebrate the birth of Christ and his rebirth in our hearts and families at Christmas, we pray for a renewal of our faith in Christ's Eucharistic presence.

We pray that each of us could be Divine Mercy instruments of bringing many, many people back to a full fidelity to the Eucharist and the Catholic Mass.

As we celebrate Christmas, we are being called to be intentional, compassionate, understanding and listening Eucharistic missionaries.

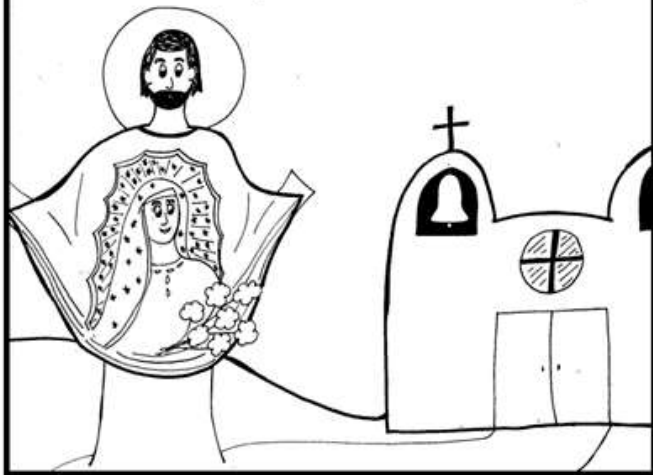
