Blessed Feast of the Holy Family and Happy New Year

In the Fitzgerald family, we have a little inside joke/wise crack as the whole family gathers for Christmas and other large celebrations referencing John Lennon's legendary song "Happy Christmas", which contains the line "so, this is Christmas". It usually comes when someone makes a "master of the obvious" statement like "look, the tree is decorated", or someone courageously wears a "creative" Christmas outfit that most would not seriously consider wearing, or there is a little culinary mishap in the kitchen preparing the holiday meal. In unison we call out "so, this is Christmas". When we first started saying it, my mom thought it was fun and that we were honoring the legendary Beatle's talent. Eventually she figured out that we were reminding ourselves of the humanity and the messiness of our family — which I would not trade for anything. When it comes to family, the challenge is not much different than the Innkeeper from last week's Gospel - we don't always get to choose the people who will show up at our door at Christmas time.

Sometimes in our families we can be all on the same page, but more often than not, people show up with very different perspectives and ideas. A family, just like a parish community, gathers around a table with common hopes and dreams at the holiday celebrations. We desire a deeper love and friendship, peace in our hearts and our world, and the promise that next year may be just a little better for all of us. You have heard me say the beauty of this feast we celebrate today is that we call it the Holy Family, not the perfect family. We as a parish are far from perfect (beginning with me as your pastor), but we are striving towards holiness, cooperating with God's grace, and embracing opportunities to encounter the Lord at the liturgy and among each other.

We do not always get to choose the people we love, but they are presented to us, or really given to us, by God as a gift for our own sanctification and holiness. There was great wisdom in the Heavenly Father to have His son, Jesus, be born into a family of a simple peasant girl, a caring manual laborer, and to what would appear to be not such an ideal situation. Maybe we can identify in our own families the flaws, dysfunctions, and brokenness that make us who we are as well. The beauty is that we shine in those moments when we all come together and we reflect the light of Christ to others. That was so clearly experienced and witnessed here at St. William the Abbot parish last weekend.

To see the cooperation of our pastoral staff, parish ministries, and clergy coming together for an incredible celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ was also a gift. Thank you to all you faithful parishioners who are with us week-in and week-out, and those who visited and prayed with us for the first time at Christmas. I want to again acknowledge and thank our ministries - ushers, lectors, choir, sacristans, altar servers, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, the Deacons, and brother priests for creating a prayer and worship experience to remember for many years. I thank Jennifer Lynde and Paul Cartier for coordinating the music, Kathy Cain and Bob Moulder for organizing the liturgies and greeting those who entered the church, our maintenance team - John Grymes, Jim Rubenstein, and Mike Reiderscheid - and Kate Walsh for captaining the whole Advent and Christmas effort. Amazing!

May Our Lord Jesus, Our Blessed Mother Mary, and Saint Joseph guide, protect, and lead us as we enter into 2024 - and so... this is another Merry Christmas and Happy New Year as we journey towards holiness as a parish family.



Fr. Michael Explains...

Why do we ring the bells during the Eucharistic Prayer?

In the Most Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, the bread and wine become the Sacramental Body and Blood of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. When do the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ? During the Consecration. What do we call the change of the bread and wine into the Body and Blood? Transubstantiation. There are many ways of experiencing the Mass. We at St. William's, as well as most Catholics, experience the Ordinary Form of Mass or the Novus Ordo (Roman Rite Mass of 1970).

During Mass here at our parish, we normally hear bells rung at three different times after the Holy, Holy, Holy is sung or recited, we hear the bells when the priest, calling down the Holy Spirit, extends his hands over the bread and wine on the altar which are to become the Body and Blood of Jesus (1st time). We hear the bells next when the Holy Spirit, through the unworthy priest acting in the person of Christ, consecrates the bread into the Body of Christ (2nd time). And we hear the bells again when, through the words and actions of the priest, the Holy Spirit



consecrates the wine into the Blood of Christ (3rd time). Before 1970, the Catholic Mass was in the Latin language in most of the world. Except for those following the Missal, the congregation did not understand or even hear what the priest was saying. Thus, when the bells were rung the congregation was made aware that the Consecration was happening.

As Jesus came down to save us, he comes to us again at every Mass. Normally, the second and third times we hear the bells are the times when the bread and wine become the Body (2nd time) and Blood (3rd time) of our Lord Jesus Christ. When the bells are rung, at that moment, we should adore the Lord who is really, truly, and substantially present in his Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity. Ideally our adoration at the moment of Consecration should be in reverent stillness and silence, whether we are looking at the newly consecrated Body and Blood, keeping our head down, or keeping our eyes closed.

Today, although the Eucharistic Prayer is in English and said loud enough for all to hear, it is still easy for us to become distracted and lose sight of the miracle that is happening at the Consecration. During Mass, the ringing of the bells continue to draw our attention to the fact that Jesus' Body and Blood are now present on the altar. It is as if everyday is Christmas (Christ's Mass), since Jesus sacramentally comes down to be with us and save us, provided that we are open to His salvation in faith and love.







A VIRTUS training session specifically for parishioners of St. William the Abbot has been scheduled for Thursday, January 25th at 7pm in The Abbey.

This training is required for all volunteers of any ministry within the parish and for all volunteers of SWS and the Faith Formation program.

Please note that space is limited and you must register online (no calls, please) prior to the class by using the instructions below provided by the Diocese of Rockville Centre.

For Volunteers in the Diocese of Rockville Centre

A person wishing to volunteer in any parish or organization in the Diocese of Rockville Centre must first complete three requirements:

- 1. Attend Protecting God's Children (Virtus)
- 2. Sign the Codes of Conduct
- 3. Complete a background screening application. (Background screening is conducted on all volunteers and employees every 5 years.)

Directions to Complete the 3 Requirements:

- 1. Sign up to attend a *Protecting God's Children* class by visiting www.virtus.org.
- When you log on to the Virtus website, you will create a Virtus account.
 - a. If you have not attended a Virtus class, you are a first time registrant.
 - b. The first screen will ask the name of your organization-from the drop down list, please select Rockville Centre-Safe Environment.
 - c. Follow all directions on the next screens.
 - d. One screen will have the Codes of Conduct. Please acknowledge the Codes of Conduct.
 - e. Continue with the registration process and select the class you will attend.
 - f. After selecting the class, you will be instructed to complete the background screening application.
- 2. Background Screening Application:
 - a. Sterling Volunteers is the company providing the background screening.
 - b. Follow all the directions to complete the background screening application. DO NOT STOP ONCE YOU BEGIN THE APPLICATION! If you stop-you are locked out of the process due to security procedures.
 - c. You will need to provide your Social Security Number (if you do not provide a Social Security number, you will be charged a fee)
 - d. After completing the application, hit the 'Submit Button'

Consider Automated Giving

Automated giving provides a steady stream of support. It is a great way to manage your Sunday Offerings without the worry of missing a payment and the worry of forgetting your weekly envelope.

We are able to offer the ability of having Sunday Offerings deposited directly from your checking or savings account into the St. William's account. This would apply only to weekly collections, not to any second collections, such as Holy Days, Catholic Relief Services, etc.
