# Be still and know that I am God

At the submission of this letter, we still have not heard the announcement of who won the US Presidential Election. For many of us, that has caused a bit of concern or worry. In my humanity, the desire to control so much of my life. I want things clear and in order. There is an old Yiddish proverb - "we plan, and God laughs!" It helps turn to scripture and the above verse from Psalm 46 - where God lovingly speaks to us, saying: "Be still and know that I am God." I thought that I would share some of the incredible and honest conversations I have had over the past few weeks and even a few days with parishioners and friends who sit on different sides of the aisle in the physical Church and the political arena.

Let's begin with the fact that the Lord already knows the election's outcome and what is in store for us as a nation, a parish, and the larger Catholic Church. Some of you have expressed "worry" if one candidate or another was to regain or gain control of the Office and how that would affect the Church. In a recent conversation with brother priests, we spoke of our history - the Church has experienced both support and persecution from world leadership since it was established almost 2000 years ago. There are names like Constantine, Louis of France, and Stephen of Hungary, and there are names like Nero, Valerian, and Marcus Aurelius. For the sake of clarity, I am not necessarily associating President Trump or Vice President Biden with these leaders and their policies. But more so looking at how the Church has remained strong and lasted even when political leadership was more or less favorable to followers of Jesus Christ. Remember the promise of Jesus when he established and built the Church on the rock of Peter, "the gates of the netherworld will not prevail against it!" The Church will continue to grow and thrive regardless of who is President.

So, let us pray with confidence and trust that the Lord will walk us through even this time of the unknown - the waiting is genuinely always the most challenging part. In that waiting, we can pray more and trust that Our God is faithful and will show up. God Bless America.

Last week, I used this weekly bulletin format to answer questions and concerns, even suggestions and recommendations sent in from you over the past few weeks and months. I will continue with that this week.

# Fr. Joe, I miss the Sunday Pew Missals. What can we do to follow along with the readings and songs? In Florida, we go to a parish with these big video screens with words and lyrics. How about doing that?

Since the Corona Virus protocols were given to us back in March, the Diocese's recommendation was for the parishes to remove any material that remains in the church pews or tables. For example, devotional books, missals, offertory cards, etc. because of the physical contact. We will continue to do that. You may have noticed in the past few weeks; we have created a link on the website where you can view the readings and lyrics for each mass. That is why some parishioners have been looking at their phones or iPads during the liturgy. Having spent a great deal of time in Atlanta, Georgia, I saw those types of wall screens that have helped get the words and lyrics out to the congregation. It is so helpful for those of us who sometimes have difficulty hearing and those who prefer to sing during mass. I certainly can bring that possibility to the Pastoral Council and Congregation, in general, to see if that's an option as we look at potential structural adjustments for the 95th anniversary and eventual 100th anniversary of the parish.

#### I have noticed a "white noise" sound in the morning during Adoration and before the 5 PM Saturday Mass.

Before the 8:30 daily mass and the 5 PM Saturday Vigil Mass, we have Confessions, and a few parishioners noticed that you could hear the voices of the priest or penitent. Not the content of what was being said, but just enough that it became distracting. Several parishes use these sound machines to filter out the voices, and it protects the sanctity of the Confessional.

# You have spoken about the Formation of the Faithful as one of the three pillars we will be focusing on as a parish – How is the school doing right now? What was the response to Faith Formation? And are there any Bible Studies/Endow Sessions/Fr. Collins or Fr. James Classes coming up in the near future?

St. William the Abbot School is in a good place despite the Corona Virus. We have students 420 who are in school FIVE days a week, with masks and desk barriers. There were initially about 30 students that participated virtually, and we are less than 15 right now, with almost all instruction occurring in person. The school is strong and in a good place, but because the school is so full, there is before and aftercare for the students, limiting the building's use at other times – which has affected in person Faith Formation. We currently have 852 students who are doing the majority of instruction at home and online, except once a month when we have sessions in the Church with parents and the children. As of this week, we still had a few families sign up with ongoing registration. I hope to provide opportunities for virtual (and some in-person) Adult Faith Formation at the start of 2021. More information to come.

Please continue to send your questions to me **priests@stwilliam.org** or the pastoral council **pastoralcouncil@stwilliam.org** so we can address your questions and ideas. I am so grateful for your faith and witness. Let us keep each other, our parish, and nation in prayer. For all of us, be at peace, be still, and know that HE is God." As always, thank you for your commitment to the parish, your presence, and generosity.


The following are a few examples of the Student's Spiritual Role Models:


