Lent 2024: Be Made Clean

Question: What do Taylor Swift, Patrick Mahomes, and Roman Numerals all have in common? Answer: After this week's Super Bowl Sunday game, we won't hear about or see them for a while! My sisters and brothers, on Wednesday we embark on the Holy season of Lent, a time for spiritual reflection and transformation. Once again Jesus beckons us to follow Him in this Lenten season which begins with ashes and ends with a cross. A reminder of our death, "we are dust and to dust we shall return," with the ashes, and the reality that we will experience struggle and suffering in this life, the passion of the cross.

The scriptures this Sunday remind us that we are never alone when we go to and walk with the Lord. The disease of leprosy was horrible, not only for its physical consequences, but also because the leper was disconnected and isolated from the community. Leprosy was extremely contagious, and when a person contracted it, they were considered spiritually and physically unclean. In our modern times, when we think of those in our life who have experienced sickness and disease, what a blessing when there is a network of support that can come around them and assist them with care, doctor's appointments, rides to treatment, and picking up prescriptions from the pharmacy. How difficult the experience is when there is a small support team, or no support at all. Those people are driven into a place of isolation and loneliness. The leper in the Gospel risked everything to meet Jesus the "Great Physician." And Jesus was moved to meet him right in the sickness and disease.

The Lord sees us also in our woundedness - and on a spiritual level, He desires to enter in and cure the leprosy of sin that dwells in us. But are we willing to go to Jesus? Do we have the courage to ask Him to make us clean? If we were to be fully honest with ourselves, some of our sins have isolated us from family, the community, the Church, and God. When we embrace sin or fail to act with Christian Charity, we are like a contagious leper passing on a disease that only has one cure – Jesus. Jesus is looking for us – He is coming for us, and the beauty of the Lenten Season is that it allows a time and space to reflect and remember. But we, like the leper in the Gospel must do our part, to make a conscious effort to make God a priority.

I often hear from many of our parish families that because of so many activities and distractions, God can be placed lower on the priority list. Let's think about the amount of time, effort, and energy that will be put into this Super Bowl weekend - parties, menus, pregame, postgame, halftime show, football betting pools, slow roasting the brisket in the green egg and BBQ pit. In all of that - we did not even mention the game or the teams who will actually be playing on Sunday. The strategies by the offensive and defensive coordinators, the Special Teams tactics, 2-minute offense, and overtime game plan (if necessary) in order to win the Big Game. Are our Souls not worth even a fraction of that time and energy?

The holiness strategy for us as Catholics is laid out in the Lenten Marks of Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving. I invite you to pray about and discern a Spiritual Plan that will help you prepare for Easter – and Be Made Clean. Here are a few possible suggestions.

SWA Prayer – Mass, perhaps add a daily morning Mass during the week, Saturday morning, or the Tuesday night guest priest celebrations. Adoration, Rosary, the Little Black Book, Confession, Stations of the Cross, St. Peregrine, Saturday Morning Men's Group or one of many the many Catholic digital apps online. Pray well!

SWA Fasting – During Lent we give things up to remind us to remove things in our lives that get in the way of our relationship with God. In 2024 what is really preventing us? Probably screens – too much political commentary, game shows, Amazon Prime and QVC, social media scrolling, another Netflix/Amazon/Apple TV series. Compare your daily time with God, and your last notification of screen time.

SWA Almsgiving – Most of us will either be hosting or a guest for a Super Bowl party and spread this weekend - look at the receipts for just tonight's celebration. For one meal, snacks, beverages, apps, dinner, dessert. Think about how much a thirty-second commercial costs (\$7 million). I encourage you to discern how you may make a few adjustments to assist the needy and poor in our parish, perhaps with generosity to Parish Outreach, or your weekly/monthly offering, or the Catholic Ministries Appeal, or St. Vincent de Paul. How is God prompting you?

Jesus is inviting us – Be Made Clean, whether you are moved to do one or all these suggestions, it is important to pause, take your time, and to discern God's voice and direction. That is the beauty of Lent – we strip away the extra to hit the core of restoration and renewal. The healing of the leper restored his body to physical strength, but also restored him to the community. No more isolation, no more alone. If you allow Him, Jesus will reach out, and touch, and heal you too!

Access to Home Program

Do you or someone you know need home improvements such as ramps, grab bars, bathroom renovations, stair glides, doorway expansions, etc.? Community Development Center of Long Island has notified us that they have funding available in their Access to Home Program. This program targets individuals living with a physical disability or having substantial difficulty with daily living activities due to aging. It provides income eligible households with the resources (up to 25k) to make



necessary repairs and modifications to sustain one's safety and independence in the household and make the home more accessible. Some program spots are specifically reserved for Veterans and Medicaid recipients! If you are interested, please contact the Social Ministry office for more information and an application.



Senior Care Through the Office for the Aging

Did you know that the Nassau County Office for the Aging offers case managers for seniors? Their case management program provides the support for older adults to remain in their homes for as long as possible. They assist in providing in-home services for seniors through the Expanded In-home Services for the Elderly Program (EISEP). There are two types of in-home services offered, Level 1 which is housekeeping and chore services, and Level II which adds on personal care






