

Let your 'Yes' mean 'Yes' and your 'No' mean 'No'

As we gather this weekend for the Sixth Week of Ordinary Time, we once again find ourselves listening to Jesus in Matthew's Gospel, in the heart of the Sermon on the Mount. Jesus speaks clearly and lovingly about the Law and the Prophets, reminding us that His coming does not abolish them, nor does it change or erase even the smallest letter or punctuation mark. Instead, He fulfills them. What we hear is not a rigid list of rules, but a revelation of God's deepest desire: a living relationship with His people, rooted in love, faithfulness, and trust.

Jesus takes us deeper than external observance and invites us into the interior life of His Sacred Heart. He speaks to the dignity of every human life and the sacredness of our relationships - with parents, siblings, and within the family of faith. He challenges us to honor marriage, to resist sins of lust, adultery, and divorce, and to recognize that these commandments are not heavy burdens placed on our shoulders, but protections for love. Jesus speaks of a God who longs for intimacy with us - a loving Father who wants our hearts, not just simple "rule followers" who check all the religious boxes.

The Lord also speaks powerfully about the integrity of our word. "Let your yes mean yes, and your no mean no." In a world where truth can be bent or blurred, Jesus calls us to be disciples who are honest, clear, and trustworthy. Our words matter because they flow from the core of who we are – a follower of Christ. When our lives are rooted in God, our speech and actions reflect His truth, and we become credible witnesses to the Gospel.

This upcoming week we begin the holy season of Lent with the celebration of Ash Wednesday. The Church invites us into the sacred disciplines of prayer, fasting, and abstinence. On Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all Fridays of Lent, we abstain from meat as a way of uniting our sacrifices with Jesus' forty days in the desert and His ultimate sacrifice on the Cross. These practices are not meant to punish us, but to draw us closer to the Lord by simplifying our lives and sharpening our focus on what truly matters. Since the Catholic Church began almost 2000 years ago, holy women and men have prepared a religious game plan to help them remove external distractions and live holier lives especially during Lent. We are encouraged to do the same in 2026.

Interestingly enough, we have just begun our 99th year of existence as a Roman Catholic parish community. I often think of the clergy, religious, and lay faithful who have gone before us and laid the foundation and enhanced our identity. Throughout our history, St. William the Abbot has been a beacon of faith and hope on the south shore of Long Island inspiring so many to embrace the Holy Disciplines and to love and serve the Lord. This year will be no different.

During this Lenten season, our parish will place an emphasis and focus on the Gospel image of the Good Shepherd - the one who leaves the "99" to search for the "one" lost sheep. Each of us is invited to prayerfully consider who that "one" might be in our own lives: a family member, a friend, a neighbor who has drifted away. Lent is a beautiful opportunity to invite them back - perhaps to Ash Wednesday, the Stations of the Cross, Palm Sunday, or Easter Sunday Mass.

Some of our loved ones and friends may have experienced the Church only as a place of rules and regulations that correct and limit them. It is helpful to remember the wonderful image of the Church as a "field hospital" that Pope Francis gave to us. As wounded sinners ourselves, we have the responsibility to go out to others, and to receive and welcome people who come to our parish community who are also tired, wounded sinners. But we know the remedy to healing and freedom only comes from God. The laws and expectations of the Church are gifts that help keep us close to the Lord, guiding us home again. May this Lent be a season of return, renewal, and rediscovered joy in walking with Christ and His Church. Have a great Lent!

The Pillars of Lent

Prayer

Prayer is the action that helps us form a relationship with God. By taking the time to turn away from the distractions of the world, we turn to God to contemplate, to talk, and to listen to Him. During Lent, we can do this by joining a Hallow prayer challenge, reading the "Little Black Book", or devoting a few minutes before bed each night to pray as a family.

Fasting

Fasting is when we give up things - good and bad - to help deepen our awareness of Jesus' suffering and also bring us closer to God. Traditionally, people "give up" something like sweets or rich foods, but we can also give up actions like gossiping or scrolling time on our phones. We also abstain from eating meat on Fridays during Lent.

Almsgiving

Almsgiving is charitable acts to serve as a witness to God's love for us and our love for others. It can mean that you increase your donation to the parish or Catholic Ministries Appeal or other organization, but it can also mean incorporating acts of service into your life in other ways like volunteering your time or donating food or other items to those in need.





"Then Jesus told them this parable: 'Suppose one of you has a hundred sheep and loses one of them. Doesn't he leave the ninety-nine in the open country and go after the lost sheep until he finds it? 
