God's Standards Are Not Like Our Worldly Standards

I once heard that to hold on to a grudge, or even worse, to enact revenge, is like drinking poison with the expectation that the other person would get sick. We live in a world where human beings hurt one another, sometimes intentionally and at other times unintentionally without knowledge. The world is quick to respond to "Defcon 5" with a reaction to strike, or hurt, very often without much thought. We watch senseless acts being committed against victims on the news, on TV shows, and YouTube - horrible events being "liked" on social media and replayed by millions of viewers. Even the buildup on the Ukrainian border of Russian soldiers over a dispute from 30 years ago when the USSR collapsed, and those historical tensions developed decades before that. The rest of the world comments - chooses sides, and in some cases stirs the pot causing more confusion and fighting.

We once again find ourselves reading Jesus' very challenging teaching on forgiveness and pardon. Scripture scholars often speak about how the Gospel of Luke presents the limitless generosity of God; we only have to think of the story of the Prodigal Son. If we were to be honest, this is the truest meaning of Christian love, an overwhelming, never ending, pursuit of a Father for his children. We also know that sin, and our human failures cloud the vision for us as we look upon others, especially those closest to us. How many of us have family stories where a relative (or we ourselves) have done or said something causing a rift or division in the family? "We used to celebrate Thanksgiving with them, but "so and so" did "such and such" and we don't talk to them anymore!" The Gospels have so many examples of Jesus challenging his followers – "although the rest of the world does certain things that they consider to be acceptable, it cannot be that way with you!"

As Catholics, we are called to be different - to be set apart, other than; we are called to be HOLY. Holiness is not perfection, it is grappling and struggling with the things of this world as we journey towards God's Kingdom in heaven. I believe it was Gandhi who once said, "I have read the Gospels, I am moved by the teachings of the Christ, the Messiah, but what prevents me from investigating further is not Christianity, but those who profess to be Christians, but do not live like Christ." A very telling statement. If we are made in the image and likeness of God, then what do people see when they see us? Jesus says in John's Gospel "this is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." So, what do they see? Kindness? Forgiveness? What are the fruits of our life as a disciple of Jesus Christ?

The readings today are extremely challenging - an enemy is pursuing King David, trying to kill him. Throughout this reading we hear that David honors Saul and refuses to kill him, simply because of the dignity bestowed upon Saul from God. Jesus amps up this directive by telling us to love our enemies. If you are like me, to be honest it can be difficult to love those closest to us, and now he expects us to love enemies? Who are our enemies? There can be many "labels" used for those we disagree with or consider enemies and we just fill in the blank. In government and politics, is it the Independents, Democrats, or Republicans? Culturally is it women, or men, homeless or transient, boater or non-boaters? Is it because a person has the same-sex attraction, or they are separated and divorced? Maybe it's based on race, or religion – Black, White, Hispanic, Jewish, Muslim, Protestant – or native born, immigrant, or undocumented? Perhaps because a person openly supports abortion, or is Pro-Life? At one time in our world and culture there were true diplomats and negotiators who were able to be on the polar opposite ends of an issue but had enough respect and honor for the contrary position to engage the other side in civil debate and conversation. We now live in a world and culture where cowards attack with anonymous posts on social media and even old-fashioned letter writing. And Jesus reminds us – to Love them as well.

Each of us has a role to play in this powerful and hopeful message of God's love. You and I may not be called to be on the front lines of diplomacy at the border of Ukraine and Russia, but the peacekeeping and bridgebuilding may happen at your dining room table on Christmas Eve, or in a fourth period algebra class, or the boardroom or break room at work. Are we able to pray for and bless those who hate us, mistreat us, curse us? The rest of the world makes an all-out character assault if we disagree with them on the halftime show of the Super Bowl, or who wears/does not wear a mask, who we vote for, whether we display an America Flag or not, if we "like" a social media post, Coke or Pepsi, Country or Classic Rock, Pope Francis or Pope Benedict, and countless other menial and important issues. The point is, we as Catholic Christians have to be different than the rest of the world – this week we can begin with ourselves, our family, and our parish. Let's be patient, kind, and forgiving, let's work towards peace, calm, and most importantly look through the lens of LOVE. Remember, "the measure with which you measure, will in return be measured out to you."



Ash Wednesday, March 2nd, is not a Holy Day of Obligation and we are not obliged to attend Mass, or to receive ashes.

The reception of blessed ashes by the Catholic faithful as the hallmark of the beginning of the season of Lent remains very important.

We will administer ashes to the faithful by sprinkling the blessed ashes on the top of the head of the recipient. Those receiving ashes are asked to bow slightly to facilitate the sprinkling.

This is the traditional practice of the Roman Rite, and is currently observed in Rome, throughout Europe, and in various other parts of the world. This method, rooted in the scriptural tradition, will allow for ashes to be given easily without making physical contact. Interesting to note is that the Holy Father, Pope Francis, always receives his ashes on Ash Wednesday in this manner!

Mass will be celebrated at: 7:00 AM, 9:00 AM and 7:00 PM.

There will be no Services on Ash Wednesday this year. The church will be open from 10:00 AM to 6:00 PM and a Priest or Deacon will be in church to distribute ashes.




