God Is Slowing Us Down

In this weekend's Gospel, Simon Peter's mother-in-law is stricken with a fever, and her regular rhythm of life comes to a halt until she can recover. So many of us can identify with her frustration and desire to serve and help others, and when we cannot, it can be so frustrating. We all have seen a major slowdown in the parish due to the pandemic, and even more so this past week with the snowstorm. We can make all the plans we want, but when Mother Nature rears her head, we are forced to stop. Perspective helps us to look at the experience of a snowstorm as both a terrible inconvenience, and also a gift that God can send us. The pause button is hit. In the Gospel, Jesus gives us the example of pulling away, slowing down, and going into dialogue and prayer with the Heavenly Father. That time alone with God is what actually drives Jesus' pastoral strategy and planning. He listens to the Father and then decides to move on to other places to do the ministry and work he was sent to do.

In many ways, I am so done with the coronavirus and the limitations it has placed on us to drive the Gospel message through our amazing ministries. But this strange time has also been a blessing. We have been able to focus and refocus what the core of our mission is. There have been great conversations with so many of you about our current ministries, and those that will come to the parish as we emerge from this pandemic.

My guess is for many of us, whether because we are football fans or just culturally connected, we recognize this Sunday as Super Bowl Sunday. It has grown to be so much more than a football game; fashion, entertainment, halftime performances, political statements, indulgence (or overindulgence) of food and drink, and the post-game discussion about which commercial was the best. We will fill our plates with wings and nachos, hero sandwiches and those famous homemade dips. The beverages will be flowing, and we will all wake up with a tummy ache and go to work on Monday. Do I have your attention?

I would like to challenge us to look a little further into February to another important date approaching - February 17th, which is Ash Wednesday. In the past we could have used the excuse that there was so much happening in our lives and we were not ready for Lent. That Lent snuck up on us. But just like Jesus in the Gospel, who is extremely busy with preaching, relating, healing, and so many other pastoral and ministerial things, he intentionally pulled away from the noise and prayed. It was in that time that he clearly heard the direction from the Heavenly Father, and we are told it was revealed to him his mission, the purpose that he came to earth.

And what about us? Is it all about driving the kids to another practice, or tutoring session, or play date; or is it about leading our family, and loving them into heaven? We have been given the opportunity to provide space and time for contemplation and preparation for this upcoming Holy Season. God has paved the way for this to be the "best Lent ever." We know that Brady and Mahomes, their teammates, and their coaches prepared a strategy and game plan to get to the Super Bowl - what are we willing to do to get our family into the great arena and stadium of heaven?

Thanks be to God the tough work has already been done by Jesus as he suffered and died on the cross for you and me. He went through the grueling pre-season of the Passion, and actually won the game for us on the cross; now we just have to show up. Not just to sit on the sidelines or being a couch-potato, but to get in the game. God has allowed this pause; we just need to open our hearts and be docile to the Holy Spirit in the direction that will lead us into a deeper and more intimate relationship with God. That does not happen without our willingness and preparation. We have been given the game plan of Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving which help to combat the opponents of laziness, over activity, distraction, and "busy"-ness. I want to encourage you to keep an eye out for the many opportunities for spiritual growth and encounter we will provide this Lent. Some will be done in traditional ways here on campus, others will be through the gift of technology, but most importantly, it will be done in the quiet places in your own homes.

God is allowing us to slow down not to be annoying or to frustrate us, but so we can hear Him more clearly. Remember with Peter's mother-in-law, after the Lord touched her, and healed her she rose and was able to return to serving Jesus and others. That is our mission as disciples as well. In the next few weeks, allow yourself to slow down, pray, prepare, listen, and then respond. The Lord is beckoning us and inviting us to more!


Faith Formation

Ash Wednesday - February 17, 2021



Ash Wednesday is not a Holy Day of Obligation and we are not obliged to attend Mass, or to receive ashes.

The reception of blessed ashes by the Catholic faithful as the hallmark of the beginning of the season of Lent remains very important. However, in the time of the pandemic, the imposition of ashes in the usual manner is not possible.

This year, in the Diocese of Rockville Centre, it is not permitted to impose ashes on the forehead of a member of the faithful with the thumb of the hand, even if that hand is gloved. Hands and gloves would be considered "contaminated" after each imposition of ashes if physical contact were made.

Instead, we will administer ashes to the faithful by sprinkling the blessed ashes on the top of the head of the recipient. Both the priest and the person receiving ashes should wear masks. Those receiving ashes are asked to bow slightly to facilitate the sprinkling. This is the traditional practice of the Roman Rite, and is currently observed in Rome, throughout Europe, and in various other parts of the world. This method, rooted in the scriptural tradition, will allow for ashes to be given easily without making physical contact. Interesting to note is that the Holy Father, Pope Francis, always receives his ashes on Ash Wednesday in this manner!

Mass will be celebrated at: 7:00 AM, 9:00 AM and 7:00 PM.

There will be no Services on Ash Wednesday this year. The church will be open from 10:00 AM to 6:00 PM and a Priest or Deacon will be in church to distribute ashes.

What is the meaning of Purgatory; Why is it that only the Catholic Church believes in Purgatory?

In simplest terms, the doctrine of Purgatory has its basis on God's justice. In God's justice, the souls who die in his grace but with imperfections in their lives to let them go straight or immediately into the joy of heaven will not suffer the safe fate as those who die not believing at all and let alone try living any saintly lives. It is simply inconceivable in accordance with the justice of God.

Consequently, Purgatory is believed to be a state of purification for those who die in God's friendship but still have the stain of venial sins. Unlike heaven, or Hell, Purgatory is a temporary state that permits these souls to undergo a purification after death so they can achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy Heaven. The suffering souls in Purgatory exist in a state of grace and are assured of Heaven but they must endure the inability to see God completely for a time in order to be freed from their sins and earthly attachments.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church has it that:

"All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation but after death they undergo purification so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven "(CCC #1030)

The holy souls in Purgatory experience the love of God, a desire to see him, and the joy of knowing the will have that desire fulfilled. Their suffering consists primarily in having to wait to experience the vision of God's glory along with the purification that is required of them. Their suffering, though real, is in no way comparable to that endured by the souls in Hell. The state of purgatory is temporary and will end when the last souls leave to enter heaven.

It is not only the Catholic Church that believes in Purgatory. Other Christian denominations like the Anglicans, the Lutherans, the Methodists, and the Eastern Orthodox churches also hold the same belief and therefore pray for their departed brethren.

The belief in Purgatory does not have any direct reference from the scriptures. However, like the doctrine of the Trinity, it could be inferred from some passages in the Bible. For instance

In 1 Corinthians 3:12-14, Paul states that all saints must pass through fiery judgement in which each man's work will be manifest. This is clearly not a reference to the fires of hell, for he is speaking of the judgement of saints. This certainly sounds like undergoing purification so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter heaven.

Fire is a symbol for purification. So by referring to a person being saved "through fire" after being judged for his or her life's work, St. Paul seemed to be indicating that, for some, there is a purification process that takes place after death, and this is Purgatory.


Novena Devotions will be held on Saturday's at 8:15 AM.
