Anything but Ordinary Time - Here I Am Lord

Ordinary Time is a liturgical season in the Catholic Church that allows for a more regular, familiar rhythm, with not too many high or low Feast Days or celebrations. Certain seasons, or times of the year call for fasting or feasting. Times like Lent, Advent, Easter, Christmas, the Immaculate Conception, St. Patrick's Day, St. Joseph's Day, or our own Feast Day, St. William's Day. Rightly so, we celebrate them by 'amping' up with joyful music, flowers and decorating, or we pull back and strip down the environment of the church and our own bodies, especially during Lent.

Recently I have heard people say, I can't wait to go back to "normal," let's go back to the way things used to be. My friends I would ask you to look at that desire from a very different lens, meaning not just yours and my eyes, but on the whole parish level, even the whole diocesan level of Rockville Center. There is no doubt that the Corona Virus has caused some families to discern their physical presence on the parish campus, especially at the Sacraments, (Mass, Baptisms, Communions). I ask you to look at your own life, and family. Perhaps you were involved in many ministries Pre-COVID, or you as a family come to Mass or watch each week. But we only need to look at pre-pandemic times to see a trend that is quite normal and ordinary in many families in our parish. Disengagement/ Disconnecting. Believe it or not, we celebrated 30 COVID weddings this year, but when I arrived as Pastor, there were only 27 originally scheduled for 2020. This week, the Bulletin is filled with many graphs, charts, and statistics for us to read over as a parish, our finances, attendance, and sacramental celebrations. The results are mixed, some favorable to growth in the parish, and others a bit concerning. But remember, we are a People, and a Parish of Hope!

The Mission of Jesus does not change – it is to go and MAKE Disciples!!! Not to make more clubs, committees, and organizations. But that can only happen when we slow down and make a little room, and time for God. We know that an "active disciple" is someone who attends Mass on Sundays, the Holy Days, and is committed to stewardship, offering our time, talent, and blessings to the parish and those that we serve. That is and has always been the bedrock of St. William the Abbot parish, that is who we are, and why I am so hopeful for what is to come.

Although some of the declining numbers can bring us concern, let us not forget we have the Good News. Jesus is on our Team! The challenge is that in some ways, the language and how we present the Good News to those who do not "ordinarily" come has changed significantly. It is like when Mass modified from Latin to English, there was a time for adjustment and understanding. I realize that for some people in our community, our Catholic Faith and involvement at St. William's is just one more thing among many that occupies their time. Going to Flag Football, piano lessons, lacrosse, karate, dance, and math tutoring, are all on the same level as an encounter with Jesus. Even the shift to screens, school, gaming, and counseling, most communication in general has moved away from "in-person." Deep down we desire to return to a simpler time, attending Mass together, gathering for breakfast at home or at the diner after Mass, saying our prayers before meals or at the bedside as a family, and even the family fun events that happen at SWA. I get that in most cases, those other non-Church activities and experiences can be more fun and presented in a "flashy" or more professional way. But our mission is not to make church "more fun or flashy." It is to enhance the experience of the sacraments, formation/education of the faithful, and outreach to the poor. That when we come here or bring Jesus to the world there is an imprint on hearts. We want that to be the "Ordinary" experience.

In my almost two years here at SWA, I certainly have seen those ordinary trends, but we as a parish are anything but ordinary. The response of these past 10 months to our Baptismal Call has been amazing – generosity of time, talent, and treasure. As we enter this new season, my hope is to discern well with our Pastoral Team and so many of you on how to expand the Gospel in this moment of our history. To be missionary, and evangelize beyond the walls of the Church, to grow in more opportunities for all the parishioners, young and old, the most active, and those who have not participated in many years, or ever. To build off the well-established/long time ministries, and to incorporate new ones that have not even been thought of yet.

I am asking for the intercession and the protection of the Holy Family, Jesus, Mary and St. Joseph, to give us the wisdom and guidance to move the parish forward – they too were an Ordinary Family, that lived their faith in an extraordinary way. Thank you for your presence and generosity.

Faith Formation

Faith Formation is continuing this week with our 2nd Parent/Child session. Mrs. Walsh, Ms. Atanasio and Fr. Joe continued with their talk about Church. We are the Church. We are living stones that make up the Church. God gives each one of us a gift and wants us to share it and in doing so we build up the Church. When you look at a mosaic, a piece of colored stone, each individual stone is beautiful but looking at it when all the stones are combined, makes quite a statement of beauty.

We learned why priests wear certain color vestments at different times (green is for Ordinary Time, purple is for Lent and Advent). It was also explained why we genuflect when entering the Church. It is for humility, service and love for our Lord. We were taught that all Churches have relics beneath the altars. Relics can be teeth, bones hair or fabrics of Saints. St. William's has not 1 but 4 relics underneath our altar. They are: St. Bernadette of Lourdes, St. John Vianney, St. John Neumann and St. William the Abbot. The Saints teach us to live virtuous lives by their examples.

STUMP THE PRIEST!







If you were to walk into your home and the lights began to flicker on and off and the windows and doors began to slam open and shut – but no one was there, how would you feel? Or say you were cooking in the kitchen and a pot hanging on the shelf suddenly flew across the room, but you are the only person home – what comes to mind? If you are like me, you would be horrified because you would think there is a ghost in the house. Things do not move by themselves!

So ponder this: The universe is expanding into outer space and seems to have a starting point about 13.8 billion years ago. The Big Bang Theory describes a singular point before which time and space "lose meaning." What caused the initial expansion? How did the universe begin to "move?" Or why did anything come into existence at all? What are the starting materials of this universe and where did they come from?

This example that I love teaching to students comes from St. Thomas Aquinas' 5 Proofs for the Existence of God. The argument from motion, simply put, goes like this:

- Things do not move by themselves
- Therefore things that are in motion are moved by something else
- The sequence of motion cannot extend into infinity
- Therefore it is necessary to arrive at a first mover

St. Thomas' second argument is called the argument from efficient cause and helps answer the question about why is there something rather than nothing. Simply put again, there cannot be an infinite regression of causes. There has to be a starting point that is itself the cause of all other causes – the first efficient cause.

I am obviously leaving out a number of the steps in Thomas' arguments for the sake of space. I highly recommend the simple Google Search: Thomas Aquinas' 5 Proofs for the Existence of God. You'll be busy for hours!

Looking beyond Thomas' proofs, I found the recently published book, Steadfast in Faith: Catholicism and the Challenges of Secularism, by David G. Bonagura, Jr. rather enlightening. Bonaguara examines five ways of knowing God and showing His existence developed by the late Avery Cardinal Dulles. I recommend the book and will again quickly summarize the five ways:

- 1. Contingency
- 2. Design
- 3. Conscience
- 4. Natural restlessness of the human heart
- 5. Religious experience

From Contingency: or dependency – everything we encounter in our daily lives has been made by something prior. There cannot be infinite regression. Something in the chain of things has to be different – one thing has to be self-sufficient – a "Necessary Being."

From design: or order – "Every natural object and living thing is an enormously complex entity whose component parts are so delicately ordered that they suggest a prior designer, an intelligent planner..."

From conscience: this is our inner voice that communicates the "unconditional moral imperative" to do good and to avoid evil. Contemplating this argument, we recognize some standard that goes beyond ourselves – a "higher authority" to which we are subjected.

From the restlessness of the human heart: humans have the ability to think abstractly about the past, present, and future; we have the facilities to "choose actions that run counter to our instincts." We can thus freely choose to love, to serve, to sacrifice, and to worship and it is this ability that points us towards something outside of ourselves – thus restlessness.

From religious encounter: your faith experience is shared by millions of others – even other dominations and religions – there is credibility in YOUR EXPIERENCE! All of us gathered in faith cannot be a "mere coincidence."

In conclusion, it is reasonable to believe in God! What we have discussed reflects metaphysical knowledge, not scientific knowledge. This pursuit of knowledge transcends scientific knowledge because it seeks the "why" of how things work, not simply the "how." God cannot be measure under a microscope. I'll leave you with a quote from Robert Jastrow, an American astronomer and planetary physicist:

"For the scientist who has lived by his faith in the power of reason, the story ends like a bad dream. He has scaled the mountains of ignorance, he is about to conquer the highest peak; as he pulls himself over the final rock, he is greeted by a band of theologians who have been sitting there for centuries."








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
