Dropping Your "Nets" to Follow Jesus

As some of you know, I had the great blessing to step away from the parish for about a week to do a personal retreat in order to reflect and pray into the beautiful Gospel passage of the Beatitudes. The reading is so familiar to us from the Sermon on the Mount, but sometimes can become too familiar and we might miss the great richness of that message - to know that God desires to nourish us with His Word. I especially received that during the retreat in a new way. I want to take a moment to also thank Father Anil for his time with us this past month, which allowed for me to attend to my dad and have a little rest. Fr. Anil has been coming to Saint William the Abbot for about 15 summers; the past few summers were challenging with COVID and immigration hiccups delaying his arrival. The visa we prepared for August 2022 did not clear until November, and we jumped at the opportunity for him to come at Christmas to take time and share his gifts and talents with us. We are hoping that he will return with us in the summer of 2023!

This past week was filled with several great Catholic feast days: Saint Anthony of the Desert, Saint Sebastian, and of course our Diocesan patroness, Saint Agnes. The Gospel today speaks about how Jesus encounters people and meets them right where they are - their lives change, and they follow him. Saint Anthony came from a wealthy Egyptian family who had many material goods, homes, and social status. But he traded all that in so he could spend time fostering a deeper relationship with Jesus in the desert. People would come to him for spiritual direction and life guidance, and because he was away from so much of the distractions of the world, his insight and recommendations were transforming. Saint Sebastian was also from the same time period. He was a Roman soldier that was murdered around the year 300. It was, of course illegal to be a Christian and yet he came to know the Lord, and to follow him despite the risk of being persecuted and killed. He is famously depicted as being shot by arrows, and is known as the patron saint of soldiers, archers, and athletes. The final witness of Christian life is the patroness of the Diocese of Rockville Centre, Saint Agnes. Our Cathedral is named after this young saint who even as a young lady lived counterculturally and is heralded as the patron of young girls and survivors of sexual abuse. Her life was a living witness of virtue, charity, purity, and love for the Lord. A true model for our young women and men who strive for holiness and chastity in the world that often objectifies a very different way to live. These are all simple models of those who chose to follow Jesus when he called them.

As we enter this Ordinary Time period of the liturgical year, the scriptures move into a rhythm of unpacking Jesus' early ministry. It's an opportunity for us to put in right order our lives, and to follow Jesus' invitation to be a better Christian. If you were like me, even with the gift of the retreat, I find myself easily distracted by some of the tasks and responsibilities that I have. Instead of leaning into more quiet time and prayer, I will often grasp my phone, or aimlessly watch YouTube videos, or a Netflix series that more often than not numbs my mind. God desires more for us, and we can as a Parish community look at simple and ordinary ways to deepen our faith and strengthen our relationship with the Lord. Making quiet time, reading the Bible, praying the rosary, journaling, perhaps getting to daily Mass or coming to St. William's (or another church near school or work) to pray and light a candle. What appears to be so ordinary, can be extraordinary for our heart and soul.

My hope is to provide different opportunities for us in the next few weeks to do just that. Some of them will be here on the church campus, others might be small teachings, or social media posts to activate the faith muscles in our heart and brain. I would always recommend some of the great Catholic resources that are out there, like the Ascension Press publications The Bible in a Year, or The Catechism in a Year, or even simply reading or listening to the daily Gospel readings at www.usccb.org. I can be so quick to make excuses or fall into some old habits that prevent me from even taking the tiniest steps in my faith journey, but today's Gospel shows us a great example of how to hear Jesus more clearly. We are told that those first disciples "dropped their nets" and followed after Jesus. We all have different "nets" that keep us from hearing and seeing God. Those nets for us are usually distractions, disruptions, and even bad habits that the Lord is inviting us to leave behind and start anew. For this upcoming week, I am encouraging and challenging myself, and all of us to discern what are the nets or obstacles that prevent us from a better relationship with Jesus and the Church? When we do identify them, let's drop them, put them aside, and remove them, so we too can simply follow Christ.





Affordable Connectivity Program

This program has income eligibility requirements, but your household automatically qualifies if you currently receive SNAP, National School Lunch/Breakfast Program, Medicaid, SSI, WIC, Veterans Pension or Survivors Benefits. Saint Josephine Bakhita



They were kind to her so when they moved to Italy, she asked to join them. In Italy, she was a babysitter for a young girl and attended a Catholic school with her. As she grew up, she realized that slavery was illegal in Italy, so she was free! She became Catholic and joined a convent. She spent the rest of her life praying for others and showing her trust in God.
