

## "He Sat Down and Began to Teach Them"

As we enter into Catholic Schools week as one of the few parishes in our Diocese that still has a school, we reflect on Jesus the Teacher. Jesus "did" many things during His time on earth - His actions became a model of how to live, not just a way among many, but "The Way, The Truth, and The Life"! As Christians we are not only called to live like Him but to literally BE Christ in the world. Jesus did not only give us the model, but today in the Gospel, He gives us the directions, the manual, the full road map of how to live our lives on earth and how to get to Heaven. The Beatitudes (Matthew's Gospel Chapter 5) are the opening section of the Sermon on the Mount - Jesus' longest homily. The Sermon is really the essential teaching and pathway to holiness describing what it takes to mature as a human and a Christian disciple.

The Sermon was given to people who gathered that day from all over, but especially to many lifelong practicing Jews. A first century Jew would not have missed the significance of how Jesus was on a mountain and reveals these directives - very much as Moses would have presented the 10 Commandments. The Beatitudes are presented to us in order to live and love in greater freedom - NOT as an overbearing set of rules and regulations to restrict us. To journey down this road will actually allow for a liberation of our world, our culture, our families, and our own hearts. Pope Francis is often quoted pointing to the Beatitudes as the only solution to authentic personal happiness but also the only way we can rebuild our culture and society. Words like poverty, mourning, meekness, hunger, persecution, and purity have become curse words to be mocked in the modern world. As humans we always want to win and conquer but look at where we are because of that. International conflicts, political gridlock and inefficiency, the hectic pulse on our roadways or subway and LIRR platforms, impractical demands of the neighborhood restaurants and business owners, and we are still feeling the effects of school and education coming off of the Covid Pandemic for students and educators. Our expectations and demands can be combative and unrealistic. We often can begin our conversations with "I demand" instead of "good morning" or "how are doing today?"

Even in 2023 Jesus' words are offering a new way - He breaks into our world and our lives, and invites us to calm down, to sit down, and to listen. The Beatitudes are just as relevant and important in this time as it was to the first century audience Jesus was speaking to. When we hear words like the poor in spirit, in many ways, we do not want anything that's less than, or poor. But we know with all the excess that we have in our life, to declutter lessens the burdens on our hearts and minds. So today are we willing to look inside and listen to how these eight directives allow for us to gaze into the heart of God. They become windows for us to see the world a different way. To not just learn a set of theological or religious tenets, but to discover in a more profound way what it means to be human.

Here at St. William's over the next few weeks and months my hope is for us to do a bit of a refresher in some of the 'what's and the why's' we do certain things as faithful Catholics and followers of Jesus. Some things are so ingrained in our habits, but we have either lost the understanding or never really knew why we did them in the first place. When Jesus gave us the Beatitudes, they were to serve to bring joy and happiness in our lives now, but also to bring us to eternal joy in heaven. The celebration of the Mass, devotions, prayers, liturgical movements, postures, and service to others assist us in getting to that place. My encouragement this week would be take out your family Bible, or look online (https://bible.usccb.org/bible) and read the whole Sermon on the Mount – Matthew - Chapters 5,6,7. It will probably take you about 30 minutes if you read it straight through, but take your time and try not to only read with your eyes, but read and listen with your heart. The Lord is teaching us right now, are we willing to learn and listen?


## 2024 Memorializations

## Feast of St. Blaise

According to tradition, Blaise was of noble birth, became a physician, was educated in the Catholic faith and eventually became bishop of Sebastia, a city in Turkey. Blaise was martyred in 316 AD for the crime of being a Christian. The Feast of Saint Blaise is observed on February 3.

We know more about the devotion to Saint Blaise than we know about the saint himself. He was known to be a very holy priest. Legend has it that a mother came to Blaise with her young son, who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. Through Blaise's prayers, the child was able to cough up the bone. Thereafter, St. Blaise became the patron for the cure of throat illnesses. Many Catholics have long sought the annual Saint Blaise blessing of their throats.





## Lowering your Energy Costs

There are currently multiple programs available to help families lower their energy costs. Check out the programs below and call the Social Ministry office if you have any questions or need assistance! Programs are income based and require application to the relevant agency.



• Heating Costs: To help with your home heating costs the state offers HEAP (Home Energy Assistance Program) and Emergency HEAP, which help low-income individuals and families pay for the cost of heating their homes. In addition, Project Warmth is available through the United Way to help with fuel costs once your HEAP benefits have been exhausted.

• Heating Equipment: If you need help with your heating equipment, the Office of Temporary & Disability Assistance (OTDA) offers repair or replacement benefits to low-income households facing no-heat situations. You can apply for up to \$4k for repairs or \$8k for replacement of a furnace, boiler or other heating equipment. The Weatherization Assistance Program through NYS Homes and Community Renewal (HCR) can provide a home energy audit and free services to rectify weatherization issues for those eligible. To apply with OTDA, reach out to your local Department of Social Services. To apply with HCR visit https://hcr.ny.gov.

• **PSEG Overdue Bills:** PSEG offers payment plans and assistance programs for those struggling to pay their bill. PSEG advocates will guide customers through the eligibility requirements and application processes for these programs. Anyone currently part of the PSEG Household Assistance Program or the Emergency Rental Assistance Program may be eligible for a credit of up to \$2k toward a bill in arrears accrued before May 1, 2022. 


