“Adeste, Fideles”

“O Come, All Ye Faithful!” Not many songs move me so powerfully as this song at Christmas time. To walk into a liturgy, and to see you all, the faithful of our church, beloved sons, and daughters of God, taking a moment to come and worship. And what do we come to? We come to the source of all we are looking for, for ourselves and our loved ones. It is the baby in Bethlehem who becomes the light and hope of the nations. And so, in 2021, what do we desire? So many things: for ourselves and for our families, for our country and for our world. But there are many things that are pulling at our hearts and for our attention. The coronavirus allowed for us to remove some of those distractions, and many of us found ourselves making just a little bit more time for God.

So, as we enter 2021, where will our focus go to? Are we to return to the same old thing? Those divisions, distractions, the ride schedules, and practice schedules that cut into our family time, and our time with God? We have the opportunity to put up good clear boundaries for our family, to rally around and protect them, but also to schedule a little time for God - each day, and each week. The invitation to “come all ye faithful” is not only for December 25 - will you allow for just a little time for God? And will you allow God to find you?

I ask that you take a few of these things into your personal prayer, and I offer you just a few gentle reminders as we continue in these very strange times. In case you forgot, we continue to experience a “global pandemic” that has affected all our lives, and the way we do things publicly, including entering the house of worship, our beautiful church St. William the Abbot. For public safety, we continue to wear masks at Mass, remain socially distanced, and we ask that you assist us in wiping down the pew area where you sit. In order for us to get the maximum amount of people inside the church, we ask you to fill in the transept first. Please be attentive to the direction of our ushers and volunteers. Here are a few other reminders:

- We are still dispensed from the obligation of attending Sunday Mass. As a parish we provide live-stream Mass on Sunday (12:00 N) and during the week (8:30 AM) in order to experience spiritual Communion.
- Our Mass schedule has changed since last March, and we will continue with that schedule of 8:30 AM daily Mass, 5:00 PM Saturday Vigil Mass, and Sunday Mass at 7:30 AM, 9:00 AM, 10:30 AM, and 12:00 N.
- On Sundays, we will continue to offer Eucharist to be distributed following the 12:00 N Mass near the Abbey steps in the back parking lot.
- Daily Adoration and Confessions will be available Monday through Saturday at 7:30 AM.
- The parish ministries of Usher and Lector at Mass have been reinstated. All other ministries remain postponed and suspended until further notice.

St. William the Abbot school continues to thrive. I would ask you to pray for our school, and to discern if Catholic school may be a fit your family moving into the future.

Keep in mind these Anniversaries are approaching - the Parish's 95th (2023) and 100th (2028), and the 20th Anniversary of 9/11. How is the Lord calling us to Glorify Him with those events?

Ask yourself these questions - how can we as a parish grow in 2021? What ministries do we currently not have, that God may be opening the door for in 2021? Who are people (you) who may be able to serve the Mission of the parish and the Gospel who have not stepped forward in the past?

Please keep our Seminarians Herley Mendez and Joe Lettieri in your prayers as they prepare to return to Seminary school for their next semester in the journey to the priesthood. Pray for Fr Collins who will have the opportunity to return home to Ghana to visit his parents and family for about one month. He will also be able to manage some of his Visa and immigration paperwork before coming back in February. Continued Merry Christmas and Happy New Year - we are so ready for 2021.

Safety Protocols

As more of you are returning back to in-person Mass, we want to re-emphasize that all of our safety protocols are still in place. For those who must avoid gluten in their diet, the parish has low-gluten hosts available for Holy Communion. If you wish to receive such a host, please arrive prior to Mass and inform the priest and he will place your host in a oyx.

Faith Formation

Healthy Happy New Year!! Things seem to be winding down. Maybe you took the Christmas Tree down, or most of the Christmas decorations were put away and there is less hustle and bustle. It is now the Epiphany of Jesus.

Epiphany in Greek means to reveal. Mary and Joseph showed Jesus to the Three Wise Men who journeyed to the Stable, so that they can see the miracle of Jesus' birth. King Herod had told the Three Wise Men, days before they arrived at the Stable, that a King was going to be born and he ordered them to bring the baby to him, for he did not want anyone else to be a King, but him alone. The Three Wise Men did not know or feel this is the correct thing to do, but they were forced to listen to the King. The Three Wise Men studied the skies and they saw a very bright star and they followed it and when they arrived and saw such a beautiful baby and then Mary, and Joseph, they knew they could do no harm. They immediately felt so much love, and such a calming feeling inside. They knew that this is the son of God. They decided not to go back to King Herod and traveled elsewhere for they felt this child is special.

Sometimes we are pressured to do something, and do not feel comfortable to do it. That is when you need to pray and ask for direction and to speak to Jesus and he will always lead you in any situation. Just like the Three Wise Men were on a journey to bring back Jesus to King Herod, they felt immediately this is wrong, God gave them guidance by the love of Jesus pouring into them. Jesus is here for all of us, especially in times of need you just have to ask for help.

STUMP THE PRIEST !



Question:

Since Jesus is fully God, why did he submit himself to the Father?

Answer:

Yes, indeed Jesus is fully God, the second person of the Blessed Trinity, and the Son of God the Father. The answer to why he submitted to God the Father is what St. Paul puts beautifully in the letter to the Philippians:

“...Though he was in the form of God, Jesus did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, he emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness, and found in human form, he humbled himself, becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross.” (Phil. 2:6-8).

From the quote, we know that he submitted himself to the Father in order to become a human being and die for the salvation of humanity. This is what we call the Incarnation-God becoming flesh and dwelling among us. (cf. Jn 1:14). Such is the great example of humility laid down by Christ for the imitation of all who believe and follow him.

So we can sum up the whole idea in this way: God the Father wanted to show incredible love to the world so he decided to send his only begotten Son for the salvation of the world. (cf Jn 3:16-17). Out of humility and obedience to the Father, Jesus the Son also accepted to come down on earth to incorporate our human nature into his divine nature so that he could redeem(in other words rescue) our fallen human nature and restore it to its original dignity. Like rescue operators do, he entered into our fallen state (without himself falling) in order to lead us out of our sinful state. This is what is called atoning death (to die for the sins of the other). It is important to note particularly that the Father's sending of the Son as well as the Son's humble and obedient submission all flow from love of humanity. Both the Father and the Son loved the world and hence, in Union with the Holy Spirit, wrought the salvation of mankind.

This is the great mystery we celebrate at Christmas. Therefore we should celebrate Christmas with great gratitude to the Trinity for the love shown to us while imitating the virtues of love, self-sacrifice, obedience and humility in our dealings with one another. Thank you.
