Be Attentive to the Word of God

"If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts." This is a familiar verse from the Scriptures, and we will hear it as the selected Psalm sung this weekend at Mass. The gift of God's Word is offered to us each day, and especially on Sunday when we gather as a community of faith to celebrate the Resurrection of the Lord here at St. William the Abbot. The Scriptures fill and sustain us as they reveal the story of our salvation through the life and love of Jesus Christ. The Heavenly Father is inviting us into a deeper relationship and desires to speak directly to our hearts, but are we aware of His prompting, His Beckoning us? We know that now more than ever the world presents so many distractions that can keep us away from connecting with one another, and with God. We have to intentionally make space to hear the Lord.

We are in this interesting time between the heightened awareness of God in our lives that comes during the Christmas season and the beginning of the Lenten season. There seems to be a natural drop-off in our attentiveness when we enter into "ordinary time." The busyness of life gets in the way. We start to see adjustments in the activity schedule of our children and grandchildren, as well as in our own lives. We see some of the cultural high points in things like the Super Bowl, or our favorite sports teams starting to play, or the children beginning their own sports. As more people receive the COVID Vaccine, and the weather begins to improve our lives will once again be forced to jump on the treadmill of keeping up with what the world and culture think is important. It can be overwhelming – and this makes it even harder to "hear HIS voice."

I would like to make a few suggestions that can help us individually, in our families, and as a parish in general to connect. February 17th is Ash Wednesday; you will see that that experience will be very different in the midst of a Global Pandemic 2021. But since we have a sense that things will be different, perhaps we can prepare ourselves in a new way, and especially break open the Word of God in the next few weeks, to hear God better.

A. **Dust off your family Bible** – Some of us rarely take out the "Family Bible." It is more of an antique that sits on a coffee table as opposed to a way for the family to pray together. If you do not currently have one, you can easily go to the Advent Shop in Massapequa and they will show many options. Read it!

B. **Catholic Daily Missal** – You can purchase the Sunday Missal at the rectory or order a Daily Missal online. There are resources such as the Magnificat, The Word Among Us, Give Us This Day – both in hard copy version and online which allows you to read God's Word every day.

C. There are countless other Apps and Daily Devotions you can subscribe to that will keep you connected to the Lord and His Word.

D. My strongest recommendation would be to the download the App by Ascension Press, "**The Bible in a Year: with Fr. Mike Schmitz**". This has led to so many conversations in the rectory, and with so many of you who have been following along since January 1. It is clear, concise, flows well, and has solid explanations of even the most challenging scriptures. Each episode is a very manageable 15-20 minutes with strong catechesis that can be easily listened to during morning quiet time, your commute to work, or even while preparing a meal. My hope is to not only create intergenerational parish conversations from breaking open the Word, but hopefully developing Small Group Bible Studies in the next few weeks and months.

The past few Sundays the Scriptures have revealed how God calls different disciples to follow and serve Him - Mary, Elizabeth, John the Baptist, Anna and Simeon, Jonah, Peter, James, and John. Their hearts were open, and docile, and they responded to His voice and changed the world. Now, it is our turn. The question for us is not so much if we hear His voice, but will we allow time and space for that to occur. Yes, in this extraordinary time – let's make listening, hearing, and responding to God – ordinary!

STUMP THE PRIEST !



What happens after death; do we go straight to heaven or we wait somewhere until the end time?

Answer :

Immediately after death, what is called particular judgment takes place. This means that by a Divine Sentence of judgment, the eternal fate of the deceased person is decided. Traditional Catholic teaching holds that a particular judgment of the individual takes place at death.

The Union Councils of Lyon and of Florence declared that the souls of the just, free from all sin and punishment, are immediately assumed into Heaven, and that the souls of those who die in mortal sin descend immediately into hell.

The good receive their reward; and the evil, their punishment immediately after death.

For example in the story of the Richman and Lazarus we read that Lazarus died and was carried into the bosom of Abraham where he enjoyed a blissful life while the Richman also died and was buried being tormented in Hades. (LK 16:22-24)

However a general judgment of all the living and dead is expected to take place at the end of time when Christ the King will come again as judge to separate the sheep from the goat . (Mt. 25:31-46) For this general judgment, there is no known day date or time. Christ Himself said he didn't know.

This means that we should all live our lives in constant readiness either for our particular judgment at the hour of our death or for the general judgment at the second coming of Christ.


HEAP Benefits -

What is RCIA?

RCIA stands for the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, and it is the process by which unbaptized adults become Catholic. It is also the way those baptized in other Christian faiths to enter into full communion with the Church by receiving Communion and Confirmation, or for baptized Catholics to complete these sacraments if they haven't already.

How long does it take to become Catholic?

There is not a one size fits all answer to that question. Adult baptisms for Catechumens usually take place at the Easter Vigil, the night before Easter Sunday. Ideally the process would last most of a year or longer depending on the situation. For a baptized Christian of another faith community, the process could proceed rather quickly, only a few months, or longer depending on their own formation and participation in their present faith community. For Catholics who are missing sacraments the process can take a few months or longer.

Why is it important for a baptized Catholic to complete their sacraments?

Baptism is the entryway into life with Christ, but no one is fully initiated until they receive Confirmation and Eucharist. Confirmation is also needed in order to become a Godparent or Confirmation sponsor, or for marriage to another Catholic with a few exceptions. Eucharist is the summit and source of our faith, and if we can't receive it we are missing out on the graces we receive through Holy Communion.

Are their tests or homework?

The simple answer is no! However we encourage Catechumens and Candidates to read and explore things on their own, to keep a journal of their thoughts, insights and questions, and to talk things over with sponsors. Of course we expect them to attend Sunday Mass with the parish community and get involved.

Can you become Catholic if you are divorced?

Yes, but with caveats. It depends on the situation of the previous marriage, and that of the current spouse, if there is one. Some marriage situations are easy to rectify and some take a bit longer. Marriage situations do not preclude candidates from attending sessions to prepare to enter the Church. One of our priests will assist the candidate in this regard.

What are these rituals?

There are a number of rituals that occur at a Sunday Mass. These are steps, so to speak, to enter the Church. They are public rites, and the parish community prays with the Catechumens and candidates at this time. For those who will be baptized at Easter, they will come together.

How much does all this cost?

One of the best things about RCIA is that it is FREE!

BECOMING CATHOLIC -DID YOU KNOW

I am already Catholic, why should I know about RCIA?

We all may know family members or friends who are not Catholic but may have shown some interest in our faith, or those who have not completed their sacraments. As Catholics we are called, by Christ, to share the Good News with others. This might mean making suggestions to others that they explore Catholicism. If you know about RCIA you can let them know about it and how to go about getting started.

What does Catechumen mean?

There are a lot of churchy words in RCIA. A Catechumen is a person preparing for Baptism. It is an ancient term meaning one who receives instruction by word of mouth. A candidate is someone from another Christian faith or a Catholic preparing for Confirmation. There are other words that are learned as the person goes along in the process.

What do RCIA sessions look like?

Sessions are usually held once a month on Sunday after Mass. We meet, discuss the Sunday scriptures, and then have a presentation on Catholic teachings. Sessions are informal and are not classes but faith sharing and exploration of our relationship with Christ, always striving to go deeper into that relationship with God and the Parish community. Our textbook is the Bible, videos, and other materials exploring the Catholic faith.

What is a sponsor?

A sponsor is someone who accompanies a person on their RCIA journey. Sponsors are usually from the parish community, but sponsors may be chosen by the person if the sponsor is a practicing Catholic who has received all their sacraments of Initiation and is in good standing with the Church. A Catechumen may also choose Godparents in addition to a sponsor.

Can children be in RCIA?

RCIA sessions are geared for adults. However children do take part in certain rituals that are part of the process. They are usually catechized through the parish school or faith formation. In cases with older children or teens, there may be specific sessions set up for them and their parents.

Can I accompany someone to RCIA sessions?

Of course! Many Catholics who join a relative or friend at sessions find that they learn things about the Catholic faith that they did not know before. It also gives the Catechumen or Candidate someone else to discuss things with after the sessions.

How does someone get started in RCIA?

Go to our website at **stwilliam.org/rcia**. Fill out the registration form and the Inquiry form and email it back to **rcia@stwilliam.org**. You will be contacted by our coordinator regarding starting sessions.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Beginning Sunday, January 31, 2021 and continuing through February 6, 2021, the 35 Catholic elementary schools in the Diocese of Rockville Centre will participate in the annual national celebration of Catholic education: Catholic Schools Week.

The theme for National Catholic Schools Week 2021 is "Catholic Schools: Faith. Excellence. Service." Schools typically observe the week with Masses, open houses and other activities for students, families, parishioners, and community members. Through these events, schools focus on the value Catholic education provides young people and its contributions to our church, our communities, and our nation.

This year, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Catholic Schools Week will look a bit different. In lieu of the traditional open houses our schools have held in the past to meet with prospective families, the schools will be offering virtual open houses and one-to-one meetings with principals that will allow prospective families to 'visit' the Catholic school(s) of their choice from the safety and comfort of their homes.

This year, in spite of the pandemic, we have made significant progress transforming our schools through the Morning Star Initiative (MSI). Many elements of the Morning Star Initiative are already in place, like key academic improvements in mathematics, reading, and religious studies, which are helping students reach new potential. I am so grateful for the tireless dedication of the MSI team.

Working with the MSI team, Long Island's Catholic elementary school faculty and staff continue to put the needs of the 11,626 students (nursery-8th grade) and their families first. From maintaining the continuity of instruction during remote learning when the Covid-19 pandemic hit back in March, to taking all of the necessary precautions to welcome students back into a safe school environment this fall, I am extremely grateful for the grit and determination demonstrated by our school community to address the academic, spiritual and social needs of our students.

Earlier this month, on January 4, 2021, we celebrated the 200th anniversary of the death of Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton (1774-1821), one of the great native-born American Evangelizers and champions of Catholic Education. Please join me in praying that Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton and Mary, Star of Evangelization continue to intercede for each of us, for our Morning Star and Department of Education teams, and for our principals, teachers, and staff.
