Come Away by Yourselves

Although I would not categorize myself as an avid fan of soccer in the same way that Father James would be as a hockey and NY Islander fan, I did find myself drawn to watching the European Championship Finals match last weekend. Italy and England played to a 1-1 draw and then into penalty kicks. It was pretty exciting! It appeared that many people showed some interest, and in the spirit of sport, and the universal affect that soccer has (probably the world's most popular sport), it drew millions of people into watching it with excitement whether they were from those two countries or not. That fervor comes around every 4 years and will probably be no different when the Olympic Games begin next Friday. Even if people are not necessarily "sports fans" they do seem to rally around their home country for the Olympics.

I was blessed and fortunate to represent the United States of America 25 years ago in the Olympic Games in Atlanta, Georgia. In the past few weeks I have been in contact with some of my teammates and friends to reminisce about that amazing experience. Walking into Opening Ceremonies, the Olympic Village, interacting with so many of the athletes from other countries, and even the story of the bombing that took place in Centennial Olympic Park – so many vivid memories.

With the recent adjustments and protocols of COVID in Japan there is the likelihood of limiting and possibly eliminating the experience of spectators at the games. It is going to be a very different type of Olympics for these athletes. I remember all our matches, but especially the one against Russia. It was very close, and the venue we played in was rocking with energy; about 80% of the fanbase was cheering for us. USA! USA! I still get chills thinking about it, and although we lost that game, when we came off the court, we were escorted by supporters who were high-fiving and acknowledging our effort! Most of them wearing the red, white and blue paint on their face and USA T-shirts – we knew we were lifted up by their noise, and presence. At the end of the Olympics, our team finished in 9th place for the tournament (out of about 130 teams in the world), but it was the human connection and interaction that was so powerful and made the event so incredible.

Over the past few weeks and months, our return to regular Mass attendance has shown the same desire to be together to support a common team and goal. As followers of Jesus, our ultimate destination is to be united as a family of faith around the Heavenly throne with God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We get a glimpse of that eternal experience when we come together around the altar here in Seaford. We may not be chanting USA, but we are usually in unison with our prayer, songs, and responses. We are also united in bringing forth the challenges and emotions of the past year which has shown wear and tear on our hearts, our family, and our community. With the masks coming off, and the presence at Mass growing, St. William the Abbot is returning to the spiritual and emotional center of support it always has been in this town. Although we have experienced some difficult moments, we are moving into a new season of strength and restoration. And we do that together - United in Faith.

In the spirit of gathering in faith and fellowship united around the Eucharistic altar, I wanted you to be aware of some upcoming opportunities to "come away by ourselves" - together. Please consider attending some of these upcoming opportunities in the parish:

Light a Prayer Candle

Lighting candles has long been a sacred ritual in all traditions, creating precious moments in our own and other people's lives where we pray for loved ones, friends, and ask for or give support.



Fellowship Tent of Meeting

In Exodus 33:7-11, the intimate prayer of Moses with God is described. A designated place for prayer, a "tent of meeting," was set up outside of the Israelite camp. As Moses would enter this tent, a "column of cloud" would descend upon it, signaling the presence of the Lord, to whom Moses would then speak "face to face, as one man speaks to another." With their intercessor standing before God, the Israelites would then begin to pray "at the entrance of their own tents."

We will begin to extend the opportunity to come together after selected Masses each weekend just as the Israelites did with a Fellowship Meeting Tent to start on the weekend of July 17, with the Saturday 5pm Mass being the first one. The Fellowship Meeting Tent will take place at two selected Masses each weekend. The selected Masses will be announced in future bulletins and our social media. Each week the tent will feature refreshments.

General Dispensation Update

When the Pandemic began, Bishop Barres allowed for a dispensation for the faithful from physically attending Mass. So many of you "attended" Mass virtually through Facebook Live Masses until we were able to establish the YouTube channel providing Mass each day. We also made available Communion on Sundays following the 12 noon live-streamed Mass outside in the parking lot near the Abbey entrance. Please know that as of August 15th, 2021, that dispensation from physically attending Sunday Mass will no longer be granted, and we will no longer provide Communion after the 12 noon Sunday Mass. Obviously, if you are not well and are unable to attend, for your safety and health, and for the rest of the community, please stay home and watch. We can also identify a priest, deacon, or an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion to bring Communion to your home.

Next week will be my last Sunday at St. Williams, so for the last official topic of my summer assignment, I'd like to discuss something that I am very familiar with: sports. I see the relationship between sports and religion as massively opportunistic. Being fresh off a long career of athletics, I can confidently say that there are many parallels between sports and worshipping God, and several of them I am sure you are familiar with. The consistencies I have noticed between Christianity and baseball in particular are striking and I would not be who I am today without developing (still to this day) these abilities I am about to list. Interacting with others on the same path as me, taking responsibility for my actions, working consistently and vigorously to achieve a goal, putting others before myself, being obedient to the coach's wishes, learning how to fail with dignity and learning how to succeed with humility are some of the things I have learned in my 15 years of playing baseball. One of my favorite things I have heard throughout the years is "You better play for the name on the front of the jersey, not the one on the back!" There is so much truth to that!

Sports fans, especially us New Yorkers, know how intense and fanatical (pun intended) it can be rooting for our teams. But I often wonder, where does that energy go once we enter a church? The answer is, it shouldn't leave; it should only change into something else. There is nothing wrong with going crazy for a team ... as long as we do the same with God. Of course, I don't expect everyone to jump up and down and cheer during Mass, but there should be a certain stirring, an excitement, a desire to be united with your team, with your Church, with your God. That excitement and anticipation typically manifests itself in our attentiveness, reverence, fervor, prayer, and thanksgiving during Mass, but also every other moment of our day.

I will end with this: if we intently watch a pitcher deliver a big pitch in the bottom of the 9th inning, why don't we intently listen to the words of the priest during Mass? If we love seeing home runs and touchdowns, why don't we love seeing what Jesus did for us in the Most Holy Eucharist? Is God less important than sports? I would hope we don't live that way, but I must confess that, at times, I certainly did. We are sinners, but with Jesus and Mary, there is always hope to become a great saint. Don't get me wrong - sports are a great opportunity for unity, comradery, and fun, so enjoy what the summer has to offer. Lastly, go Yankees! If we're being honest, they need our prayers to make the playoffs this year.

WHERE IS IT IN THE BIBLE?

It has become necessary to answer this question because a series of questions coming in have been seeking to find biblical basis or references for some of our Catholic beliefs and practices. So to answer this question we need to, first of all, look at background issues on how the Bible came to be in the form in which it exists today. This will give us a good ground for understanding all other questions that seek references from the Bible. Just call it unravelling the Mystery surrounding the Bible.

The Bible is not a single book as it looks but rather a collection of books. It has resulted from the accumulation of a whole library of books, composed by many authors over a span of more than a thousand years. So the English term Bible actually has its root in the Greek word Ta Biblia which means The Books. The books of the Bible are of different genres or styles of writing- some are Historical accounts, others poetry, some prophecies, and still others Prose or stories. There are also proverbs, songs or psalms and the like. The books that make up the Bible took a long process to be compiled. Before the compilation, some criteria were put in place and used as a measure for including or excluding a particular book. So there are actually some books that did not qualify to be among the collection or the library of books we call Bible today.

The Bible is made up of two sections- the Old Testament and the New Testament. The Old Testament is essentially the recordings or God's dealings with his chosen nation Israel. The New Testament, on the other hand, is partly the recordings of the life and ministry, the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ and then partly the activities, practices and teachings of the apostles and the early disciples. At the time of Jesus, what we call the Old Testament was already in existence for reading and instruction in the synagogues. It is more accurately known as the Hebrew Bible, the Holy Scriptures of Judaism. To this original Hebrew Bible, Christians added what is called the New Testament. So it was only when the "New" came that the pre-existent one began to be referred to as the "Old".

Let us as at this point now turn all focus unto how the "New" came to be formed.

The New Testament comprises the four narratives about Jesus' life and ministry (Gospels), a Historical theological account of the early Church (The Acts of the Apostles), the twenty-one letters, and the Apocalypse or Revelation.

Jesus himself did not write for us any of his teachings or his autobiography. All that we have about him were written later on (the earliest of them being at least 50years later) by such apostles as Matthew, Paul, Peter, James, John and Jude as well as by their companions like Mark and Luke. It should be borne in mind that the authors of the books making the New Testament were not following Jesus with a pen and paper or a tape recorder to pick up the teachings of Jesus word for word as and when he uttered them. As a matter of fact they didn't think it was necessary to put anything down until 50 years after the ascension of Jesus. The reasons for this lapse were that oral transmission of the word was the commonest and cheapest means of passing on knowledge. Besides, literacy was not widespread and writing materials were either hard to come by or expensive. Furthermore, the early disciples expected the coming back of Jesus as something to happen soon and as long as the eyewitnesses (the Apostles) were still alive to pass on the teachings orally, there was no need to write down anything.

However, it later on became necessary to write something down on account of the following factors: In the first place, the coming back of Jesus was not happening as "soon" as was expected.

In addition, the Apostles serving as living witnesses were beginning to die; and with them, critical information about Christianity would be lost. Also, upon the preaching of the Apostles and disciples, the communities of believers were expanding beyond Jerusalem. So letters became the necessary means of reaching out to address their needs, concerns and problems. This is what underlies the letters of Paul particularly as the one Apostle who travelled farthest and widest. He wrote his letters to keep in touch with the communities formed out of his preaching even sometimes from prison.

Furthermore, new converts to Christianity needed to be taught the basics of the faith they were embracing.

Another factor was that Christians were facing persecution from emperors and they needed a recording of what Jesus had said, done, gone through himself, or had promised to those who follow. This would be a way of encouraging and motivating them to keep holding on to the faith even in the midst of persecutions.

All of these factors made it imperative for the books or letters of the New Testament to be written down. TO BE CONTINUED...


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
