The Eucharistic Body of Christ!

As we gather this weekend to celebrate the great Feast of Corpus Christi, we are drawn into the heart of our Catholic faith - the real presence of Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. This Solemnity is not simply a remembrance; it is a profound act of reverence and love for the Body and Blood of our Lord. Here at St. William's, we honor this sacred gift through our commitment to celebrating the Mass with intentionality, offering times for Eucharistic Adoration, and bringing Holy Communion to the sick and homebound to name a few. These are not peripheral activities - they are essential expressions of our identity as a Eucharistic people.

Over the past year, we have taken intentional steps to deepen Eucharistic devotion within our parish. From expanding daily Mass opportunities during Lent, to monthly evenings of Adoration, rosary, and praise, as well as identifying and commissioning more extraordinary ministers for homebound visits. We are striving to make Christ in the Eucharist more accessible to every heart in Seaford. But our efforts cannot stop there. The Feast of Corpus Christi is not just a celebration; it is a call to action – this was especially evident in the recent procession down Sunrise Highway during the preparation for the Eucharistic Congress. We are being called to renew our faith, to draw others into it, and to boldly proclaim the sacredness of what, and WHO we receive.

Recent circumstances have motivated me to revisit a need to re-catechize some of the basics of our understanding and reverence of Communion. Since May 3rd (our First Holy Communions), - I have found 10 Eucharistic hosts in our church - discarded on the floor, hidden in the pages of the pew missal, and one in the visitor's donation envelope. To be honest, I have had a mix of feelings since these recent discoveries of horror, shock, anger, and a deep sadness for this intentional or unintentional disrespect of our Eucharistic Lord.

One of the great gifts of our parish is that we have been a safe haven of welcome and hospitality to many people who have been away from the Church, or who at times have felt rejected by the Church, and for many who are not Catholic yet want to learn more about our faith and devotions. So often you have heard me speak about my own sinfulness as I stand in awe of the Eucharist and realize that even as a priest I am unworthy to receive Jesus. I recently read an article reflecting on the National Eucharistic Revival and our Church's need to return to first principles. It cited not only the spiritual hunger of our time, but also the confusion. A Pew Survey confirmed that a staggering percentage of Catholics in America do not believe in the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. Only about 31% affirm that the Eucharist is truly His Body and Blood. This should trouble us, yes, but even more, it should ignite in us a desire to be witnesses of belief, reverence, transformation, and evangelization.

It is clear this trend must not continue. You will be hearing from me and other clergy before Mass and during our preaching simple reminders of the protocols for reception of Holy Communion. These gentle - and possibly not so gentle reminders - are only the start. But there are few other simple ways we can all be more humble and reverent regarding this great gift. That reverence begins in how we attend Mass - in how we dress for Mass, how we approach the altar, and how we teach our children to do the same. If we truly believe Jesus is present our entire demeanor should reflect that. The message needs to get out to all who come here to worship from our weekly Mass attendees to those who occasionally come and to those who are new to the faith. We should also model this devotion outside of the church walls; do others know that your Sunday revolves around the altar, not "just" the game, practice, dance, and activity schedule?

The Eucharist is not a symbol. It is not a ritual. It is Jesus Christ - alive and present, given to you and me out of love. Let us approach and receive Him with awe, serve Him with joy, and share Him with conviction. May our parish be a shining example of Eucharistic reverence for all who pass through our doors.

Jesus in the Eucharist is the source and summit of our faith - may He also be the center of our lives. More to come!

For Children Entering 1st - 8th Grade

Registration is now open through our website – Payment will be accepted via credit/debit cards, Apple Pay, Google Pay, Cash App, and checking account



- Our program is on developing a life-long relationship between your family and Jesus through Christcentered lessons and in the communal celebration of the Eucharist each week
- Sacramental preparation are two-year programs: children must complete Levels 1 and 2 before receiving First Holy Communion and Levels 7 and 8 before receiving Confirmation
- All children are required to attend 75% of Sunday/Holy Days of Obligation Masses between September and May and check-in using the QR codes in the church in order to complete their grade level and receive sacraments
- Program discount is available for parent volunteers

BEHOLD

To ensure that the Eucharist is received with reverence, the Church has given us clear guidelines. These are in place to direct both our inner disposition as well as our external actions as we approach the altar.



INNER DISPOSITION

In addition to being a baptized Catholic, we are required to:


- 1. Observe the Eucharistic fast You are required to fast for at least 1 hour prior to the reception of Communion.
- 2. Be in the state of grace this means that you are not aware of any mortal sin on your soul. If you are aware of having committed a mortal sin, you must go to Confession before you receive communion.
- 3. Believe what the Eucharist is When the priest or extraordinary minister (EM) says "The body of Christ," and you respond "Amen," you affirm that you believe you are receiving Jesus' actual Body and Blood.

EXTERNAL ACTIONS

As the person immediately in front of you is receiving – make a gesture of reverence: pause and gently bow. You may receive Communion on the tongue or on your hands, we ask that you distinctly hold your hands up and away from your body so the priest or EM knows how you will be receiving. When the priest or EM says, "The Body of Christ," respond "Amen."

If you choose to receive Communion in your hands, make a flat throne surface of your hands by placing one hand over the hand. After receiving Jesus on your hand, *immediately* consume the host, step to the side, and make the sign of the cross. If you choose to receive on the tongue, tilt your head back slightly and stick your tongue out. Wait for the priest or EM to place Communion on your tongue before closing your mouth and making the sign of the cross.

Return to your seat, join in the hymn, or pray in your heart.


















Stop Physician-Assisted Suicide in New York

New York is on the brink of legalizing physician-assisted suicide. Bill A136 has already passed the Senate and Assembly. The only thing standing in its way is Governor Hochul's veto — and she needs to hear from you.

This bill would allow doctors to prescribe lethal medication with the sole purpose of ending a patient's life. It puts the most vulnerable among us — the elderly, people with disabilities, and those facing emotional or financial despair — at even greater risk. **Suicide is not healthcare.**

Summer EBT Benefits for Children

To supplement the loss of free school meals during the summer break, your child may be eligible for a onetime summer EBT benefit of \$120 to help cover the cost of food. If you currently receive SNAP or Temporary Assistance, or if you are currently certified for free school lunch, you should be automatically enrolled in this program. If you do not meet these requirements, you can still apply for this benefit online. Applications will be reviewed to ensure they comply with the program's income thresholds.
