Setting Our Hands to the Plow!

It is hard for me to believe that three years ago today at 12:00 N I moved into the parish as the NEW Pastor of Saint William the Abbot Church. Four priests who were serving here at that time moved out of the rectory, and three of us moved in... and my heart was filled with promise and hope. Only God could have known some of the challenges that would face us that first summer and year – school roof, Global Pandemic, and public Mass and worship shut down. And yet, all were part of God's plan. So often we want to look back at our life's experiences and pick and choose those high point moments and sometimes we can dwell there. The Scriptures challenge and remind us that we are called to always move forward, focus on the Lord and to know that in everything HE is with us. There is no doubt we are called to learn and grow from our past experiences and to set our hands to the plow and to move forward. Today, June 2022, three years into this incredible experience I am still filled with unbelievable hope in the promise of where God is leading us.

Yesterday we celebrated the patronal Feast Day of Saint William the Abbott and rejoice in a time that ties together some of our traditions of the past and yet has allowed us to leave room for newness for the parish and school community. The Pandemic has forced us to evaluate and reevaluate so many aspects of the parish, especially how we gather. This summer we will have a few projects happening on campus in the church, school, and convents that will hopefully assist us in moving the parish forward and not only helping us to sustain what has been here - but more importantly to grow and thrive. Your generosity has allowed us to do that.

We live in a consumer culture that is driven by a high expectation and demand for quality and 'radical' hospitality. When we look at other hospitality and service industries that draw large groups of people, COVID has significantly adjusted their "processes." Movie theaters, gyms, restaurants, retail stores and supermarkets have had to close or adjust because they have had difficulty in finding workers, or the 'consumers' have gone elsewhere for their needs - Amazon, online shopping, Zoom, Peapod, Peloton/Tonal/Bowflex. Many of you have shared with me how your employment and workday has shifted away from in-person/in-office to remote workstations. Travel and business meetings that at one time were so essential have been eliminated or become online computer screen "meetings." The world has changed.

I can say that Mass and the church experience has also shifted pretty significantly. However, this past week I was able to be at the bedside of a number of parishioners to anoint and pray with the sick and dying, and their families. Technology and screens have been a blessing, but it is the human experience and encounter that Jesus chose to enter into. The church exists to proclaim the Gospel, to attend to the needy and most vulnerable, and bring freedom to the captives and healing to the sick. That is still the mission moving into the future for us as well, but will it look differently? A parishioner recently said to me, "Fr. Joe, growing up here at SWA there were always six or seven priests living in the rectory and you could always find a Mass to go to, now there's just you." It is Jesus in the Gospel who says, "the harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few, so ask the Master of the harvest for laborers." I have no doubt that God will provide for us what is needed for HIS mission to continue here in the school and the parish, and I petition him every day to send the right people.

On this Feast Day of Saint William the Abbot, as we move forward into the next 100 years, I also encourage you to discern how the Lord may be calling you in this season of your life, and of our church history to serve Him. To put your hands on the plow and to help move the parish forward. God Bless you!

Patrick O'Brien's Seminarian Snippet: St. William the Abbot and Asking the Saints for Help

This weekend, we celebrate the Feast of Saint William the Abbot, the patron of our parish! Saint William was an Italian monk who spent years spreading the faith in France and Denmark but spent most of his years as the head of his religious community in Italy. 

Cooling Assistance Needed

Applications for HEAP Cooling Assistance are now being accepted. HEAP is the Home Energy Assistance Program, which helps low-income individuals and families pay for

the cost of heating or cooling their homes. You can apply for cooling assistance in order to buy and install an air conditioner or fan for your home, max price \$800 with installation. To be eligible you must have a documented medical condition that is aggravated by heat, and you must meet certain income guidelines. For more information or to apply, visit https://otda.ny.gov/programs/heap/ or call 1-800-342-3009.

Affordable Connectivity Program

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) is offering an Affordable Connectivity Program which provides a \$30/month subsidy to pay for broadband internet services. This subsidy can be used for any internet service provider. In addition, 20 internet service providers have committed to offer discounted service plans for those using the subsidy. This program has income eligibility requirements, but your household automatically qualifies if you currently receive SNAP, National School Lunch/Breakfast Program, Medicaid, SSI, WIC, Veterans Pension or Survivors Benefits. 
