The Month of May: Mary - Mother's Day - Mercy

It's funny, May 2021 looks very different than May 2020, I don't need to remind you that St. William the Abbot church was only open for a few hours a day last year, and we were live-streaming Masses on Facebook, and celebrating confessions in the parking lot. 'Funerals' were prayer services on Jackson Ave., and our main focus was outreach to so many who were isolated and home bound. The experience of faith, community, and ministry shifted drastically because of the pandemic and certain safety protocols from the Diocese and government - we had to think and act differently. Most of it was horrible, but there were some things we were able to take from that experience and look into the future to make significant adjustments on how we evangelize and bring the Good News. It is really hard for anyone to say: "I don't do computers, or email" anymore, especially when updates on vaccines, health codes, school delays, and even parish news is communicated so quickly and easily. The world has changed.

For us as a community of faith, this is a reality too - we are journeying through a season of change. We are coming up on our 95th anniversary of existence as a parish, and St. William's has been a safe haven and center for the Sacraments, the formation/education of the faithful, and the "Outstretched Hand" of Jesus to the most vulnerable in our community and society. But the world is different today than when we begin as a parish. Although those foundational values remain at the center of who we are as a parish community, they are not necessarily at the center of every "registered" parish family. The reality is there are many other Sunday options, distractions, and new priorities for many of our families. We are all aware of how sports have taken centerstage, the need to take on a second job over the weekend, and of course for others, schoolwork has been stressed. It can be somewhat disheartening to think that we are a community with close to 5000 families, and we are certainly not getting that many people coming to worship each Sunday.

But I am hopeful, especially in this month of May, the month of Mary, First Holy Communion's, Mother's Day, and even the celebrations of Confirmation and Pentecost coming up at the end of May. These become opportunities when some of the more regular parishioners will enter the church building. I believe that they will encounter a beautiful and powerful experience of worship, and welcome, reconnecting them to that original experience of faith. My hope is that not only will they want to return, but I also put the challenge out to all of you who are regularly here. I think this is the way that we can subtly, or not so subtly, encourage and invite back our kids and grandkids. What a gift to return for Mother's Day - not that we do not want our loved ones to get items for the garden, or a gift certificate to the spa or a delicious dinner, but just like Mary, the mother of God, it is important for us to lead our loved ones into a relationship with God. Or maybe it is coming to the May Crowning of Mary on Tuesday May 11th or praying the rosary with your children or grandchildren during the month.

There are so many traditional Catholic moments that bring us to a place of fond memories and joy. I have recently showed the First Holy Communicants and their families 'MY' First Holy Communion banner, dated May 5, 1979. The number of conversations I had with many of the parents as they too remembered religious education classes, certain apostolic service opportunities, their dress or suit from First Holy Communion, a set of rosaries, or a necklace and cross that was blessed by a previous pastor. The smile and glow on their faces was beautiful and powerful, even moving some to tears as they now looked at their own children taking another step on the family faith journey. The gift of our Catholic Faith is it allows us to return to those memories, and to look forward with great hope for our future and what is to come. But in order for the future to grow, it will take all of us to make an intentional effort to invite people back home, back into a deeper relationship with a GOD who has never left. The month of May is the month of Mary – of Mother's Day – of Mercy – and of Hope.

Blessings to all our First Holy Communicants and their families – we pray that the Mantle of Our Blessed Mother Mary's protection may be upon all of us and the parish.

Faith Formation

Dispensation from Mass

While attending Mass during this difficult time


- · Please sanitize your hands

Safety Protocols

As more of you are returning back to in-person Mass, we want to reemphasize that all of our safety protocols are still in place.

Please allow the ushers to seat you they have been carefully trained in our seating arrangement that will enable us to get the maximum number of worshippers seated in the Sanctuary while maintaining social distancing.



Communion by Car Line for High-Risk Individuals

Please consider virtual Mass if you are high risk of severe illness due to COVID-19.

Weather permitting, we will continue to offer outdoor Communion (via car line) on Sundays at 1 PM, following the live-streamed Mass at 12 PM.

Holy Communion

Because of concerns regarding the coronavirus, we request that those who choose to receive on the tongue wait at the end of the line. Please present themselves to the priest only to receive Holy Communion, and are asked to open their mouth and extend their tongue so the host can be placed on it without the priest's hand making contact with the recipient.

If you choose to receive in the hand, please place your hand out very straight and flat to allow the priest or minister to place the Eucharist safely in order to avoid contact with your hand. We also kindly remind everyone to please remove your mask before receiving Holy Communion, whether you choose to receive on the tongue or in the hand. Please put it back on after you have consumed the host.

Holy Communion



When it is time to receive Holy Communion, please practice social distancing as you walk in the communion line. On the way back to your pew please maintain spacing. Everyone will come down the center aisles to receive communion. Please do not rush back to your seats.

Arrive Early & Wear Your Mask



We do ask that everyone arrive early so that we can seat everyone before the start of Mass. We ask that all parishioners wear their mask covering their nose and mouth at all times while inside the church.

Sacristy

For the safety of our Priests, we ask that parishioners refrain from entering the Sacristy. Please do not hand offering envelopes, letters etc. to the Priests. Please drop them off in the Rectory Mail Slot.

Stump the Priest

WHERE DO OUR PETS GO WHEN THEY DIE?







The Bible does not present any definitive clue about the fate of animals after death and consequently theological discourses on this subject have also been speculative.

We know animals are an integral part of the created order; God created them for diverse purposes and the Psalmist, in Psalm 8, makes us realize how they exist to manifest the greatness and glory of God.

We must also note that between animals and human beings there is somethings in common and something different. One common thing is the animating or life-giving principle in all of us. Hence animals also have souls just as human beings.

The difference lies in the fact that the souls of human beings have a rational aspect to it. This rational faculty added to the human soul makes us able to recognize or judge between right and wrong. We read from the creation account in Genesis that, of all created things, only human beings were created in the image and likeness of God and then were given the power of oversight responsibility over the rest of creation. (cf. Gen. 1:26-28; 2:15)With this responsibility would come therefore the accounting for our stewardship.

Again, human beings have a moral law to live with based on this same rational faculty of our souls; to recognize the good and follow it and then to stay away from the bad. From the moral law flow all the many commandments, decrees, rules, regulations, principles, norms, and guidelines for our human existence. All of these have been given to human beings to follow and we are judged, even on this earth, according to them. So we see human beings go to jail but not so in the case of animals.

Consequently we can say that there is nothing like hell or heaven for animals since we know that only creatures that face judgement go to either heaven or hell. It is best and safe however to be honest and say we don't know but also to think (albeit without certain knowledge) that when animals die they just cease to exist.

In answering this same question on May 29, 2017 Garett Kell concluded, and rightly so, that: "If it will bring God more glory and help us to enjoy him forever, then God will reunite us with our pets. God knows what good gifts to give us both now and forever. We must guard or hearts not to allow love for pets or animals diminish or affection for God." In addition, Msgr. Charles Pope, Pastor of Holy Comforter-St Cyprian in Washington, D.C., also warns that: "We must not reduce heaven's joys to having earthly things. Heaven is far greater than anything we can imagine, be it pets or any earthly joy."




