Pentecost 2021 – A Spirit of Renewal

When Jesus ascended to heaven, His disciples were anxiously awaiting what to do next – the Lord promised the sending of the Advocate, the Holy Spirit to assist them – but what would that look like? What would the community look like? How would Jesus' teachings continue? Would it be safe for them to gather? Both the government and religious leadership of the time suppressed them, and persecuted them, there were in hiding, staying in their homes. This newly formed group of believers were experimenting with worship, community, and past traditions in order to move forward in how to Glorify God and tell others about it. They were experiencing a New Spirit and New Mission away from the Jewish Temple.

In 2021 we find ourselves in a very similar experience. The world has changed, the Church is adapting to serving others through a Global Pandemic with greater needs and demands. We are discerning what that looks like today – not pre-Pandemic, but in a world and Church where Zoom Pre-Cana, Live-Streamed Mass, Social Distanced Baptisms, and online school has become the norm. Each year at Pentecost we are given the opportunity to move with the Holy Spirit in a Spirit of renewal, of revival, of transformation. This year is no different. The Lord allows us to look back to the early Church and the missionary zeal and responsibility entrusted to those first disciples to not turn in on ourselves but to "Go out to the Nations," to the ends of the earth to Proclaim the Good News. For St. William's in this season of our history, it is our turn to be creative, to think outside the box of maintenance mode and be a parish that thrives and grows as Missionary Disciples re-discovering the Sacred.

It is not necessary for us to go to far off lands to fulfill our Baptismal call. We need only to look here in Seaford, Massapequa, and Wantagh. Pope Saint John Paul II introduced a re-evangelization or New Evangelization of the secularized world where so many have lost a living sense of the faith, or even no longer consider themselves members of the Church. We can all think of family members and friends who have lived here, in some cases went, or sent their family to Catholic School but really have no faith. This need for re-evangelization still does not take away the primary role of all of us to proclaim Jesus Christ to peoples who have not yet heard the Good News – but we are going to strengthen the experience here at St. Williams. The Holy Spirit will guide us and lead us to advance the Church's missionary life. We will begin with prayer. You have seen the recent experiences of Parish Holy Hours, focusing our attention on listening to the Lord each morning and during evenings of prayer for women, men, and our youth. The scriptures tell us in the Acts of the Apostles how the "community prayed boldly, and the ground shook." We must do the same – praying for the now and the future.

In order to go forward with a new evangelization in Seaford, all parishioners must be inspired with the same courage that inspired the missionaries of the past, and the same readiness to listen to the voice of the Spirit. There is no doubt we can be given a revelation or inspiration from God at Seamans Neck Park watching a ball game, or on the bike path riding to Jones Beach (or sitting on the beach), or working in our yards for many hours, or even sitting in our living room watching a Netflix series, FOX/CNN or other news, but we also have to make space to gather as "one" in front of THE ONE. I appreciate the suggestions or recommendations that come over social media and emails – but some of them are from people who have not actually regularly been in the Church through the Pandemic. It is those who are with me and the other priests each morning in adoration or worshipping on Sunday who have been listening to the promptings of the Spirit that will help move the Pastoral strategy God is leading us to. And the Spirit is moving.

On Wednesday, in the wake of Pentecost, we will celebrate Confirmation for 150 teenagers who will be sealed with the Holy Spirit and given the same mission as the first disciples. There are many factors working against our young people today, and in a very confusing world, I pray for the gift of courage, wisdom, and understanding to take hold to help them. But I have seen real signs of hope already from this group of young disciples, little things that stand out which I would like to share with you. Some of them took the time to send me a thank you note for their recent Confirmation retreat last month, some of them have come to the rectory for me to bless their new crucifixes, rosaries, lacrosse stick, and "fat tire" bike; and this past week in the morning several of them came to adoration and confession before school started. I do not know if all 150 and their families will come next Sunday for mass, but I am confident that in the 20 months I have gotten to know them, despite a Global Pandemic – they were given many opportunities to encounter God. Laura Walsh and our Faith Formation team provided them with a curriculum that was challenging and engaging, and more importantly it is their parents who are the primary teachers and examples they will learn from. So goes the family, so goes our culture and world.

Pentecost 2021 is bringing a Spirit of Renewal in our parish and we are not called to stand on the sidelines or even remain on the field after the game. We are called to go and proclaim the Good News that has been entrusted to us, and so we ask the Lord to bless us — Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit and they shall be created. And You shall renew the face of the earth.


The Holy Father, Pope Francis, has named Reverend Monsignor William E. Koenig, the 10th Bishop of the Diocese of Wilmington (Delaware).



Dispensation from Mass

While attending Mass during this difficult time


- · Please sanitize your hands

Safety Protocols

As more of you are returning back to in-person Mass, we want to reemphasize that all of our safety protocols are still in place.

Please allow the ushers to seat you - they have been carefully trained in our seating arrangement that will enable us to get the maximum number of worshippers seated in the Sanctuary while maintaining social distancing.



Communion by Car Line for High-Risk Individuals

Please consider virtual Mass if you are high risk of severe illness due to COVID-19.

Weather permitting, we will continue to offer outdoor Communion (via car line) on Sundays at 1 PM, following the live-streamed Mass at 12 PM.

Holy Communion

Because of concerns regarding the coronavirus, we request that those who choose to receive on the tongue wait at the end of the line. Please present themselves to the priest only to receive Holy Communion, and are asked to open their mouth and extend their tongue so the host can be placed on it without the priest's hand making contact with the recipient.

If you choose to receive in the hand, please place your hand out very straight and flat to allow the priest or minister to place the Eucharist safely in order to avoid contact with your hand. We also kindly remind everyone to please remove your mask before receiving Holy Communion, whether you choose to receive on the tongue or in the hand. Please put it back on after you have consumed the host.

Holy Communion



When it is time to receive Holy Communion, please practice social distancing as you walk in the communion line. On the way back to your pew please maintain spacing. Everyone will come down the center aisles to receive communion. Please do not rush back to your seats.

Arrive Early & Wear Your Mask



We do ask that everyone arrive early so that we can seat everyone before the start of Mass. We ask that all parishioners wear their mask covering their nose and mouth at all times while inside the church.

Sacristy



For the safety of our Priests, we ask that parishioners refrain from entering the Sacristy. Please do not hand offering envelopes, letters etc. to the Priests. Please drop them off in the Rectory Mail Slot.

Faith Formation



Emergency Broadband Benefits (EBB)

The Emergency Broadband Benefit program is a temporary FCC program to help households struggling to afford internet service during the pandemic. Eligible enrollees can receive up to \$50 monthly toward broadband service and a one-time discount for up to \$100 to purchase an internet accessible device. Eligibility criteria is broad. If you are on SNAP, Medicaid, or receive free/reduced school lunch you are eligible. If you have experienced a substantial loss of income due to job loss or furlough since 2/29/2020, you may be eligible based on income criteria. Providers such as AT&T, Comcast, T-Mobile, Verizon and Optimum all participate in this program!


