End of the Year, End of Times

In the past few years, we have experienced a number of apocalyptic storms that have been alarming. The California wildfires, Hurricane Helene's devastation through Tennessee and the Carolinas, the tornado outbreak of the Mississippi Valley in the spring of 2025, and the Pacific tsunami that rocked Alaska and Hawaii! People often ask me, is this the end times of the Bible? Jesus puts forth a warning to His followers to be alert and ready. "When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; Nation will rise against nation, there will be powerful earthquakes, famines, and plagues from place to place; and awesome sights and mighty signs will come from the sky... but it will not immediately be the end." Not an easy topic to discuss, but are we ready?

As we gather this weekend to celebrate the Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, we find ourselves at the very threshold of the close of our liturgical year. As Catholics we are guided by a Church schedule of faith, prayer, and worship within the calendar year. The rest of the world has begun to prepare for Thanksgiving and Christmas, while we Catholics take these final weeks of the year to to pause, reflect, and spiritually look inside our hearts and minds. The rhythm of the liturgical calendar reminds us that every ending carries within it the promise of a new beginning. Ordinary time will lead to the season of Advent, which is filled with a spirit of waiting and hope in the Newborn King. But are we only preparing the exterior decorations and holiday trimmings?

This time of year can often feel like a "spiritual autumn," when the leaves of our faith life fall away to reveal what is truly lasting – a strong oak tree rooted deep in the ground. When we are set in that soil, we are not easily swayed by the storms we face from a broken and confused world. The Scriptures this weekend take on an End Times tone, not to frighten us, but to wake us up to the reality that everything of this world is passing. The prophet Malachi speaks of a blazing fire that will purify and consume all that is false, preparing the way for God's truth and justice. It is a stark image, but one that calls us to renewal - to prune away old habits, to clear away what no longer bears fruit, and to allow God to make us whole and fruitful again.

Jesus, in the Gospel, warns his disciples not to be distracted by the shiny stones and flashy gold-plated fixtures of the temple. He points beyond what glitters on the outside to the deeper truth that God desires for the temple of our hearts. As we continue the countdown of this Church year and calendar year, we are invited to face the truth that our own lives, too, have a limit. One day, each of us will stand before God to give an account - not of what we built or owned - but of how we loved, forgave, and served.

The apocalyptic readings remind us that the "end times" are not just a future event; they are a continual call to conversion here and now. We are asked to live each day as though it matters eternally, because it does. I have been somewhat distracted by the responsibility of hosting Thanksgiving this year. My family takes turns, and when you have sisters like I do, who may or may not express their opinions about how the celebration should be, well the pressure is on. As I was stressing over the menu, the appetizers, the place settings, and, of course, the dessert, some of our young parishioners reminded me of what a follower of Jesus must really be focused on. They reminded me of their family traditions of Thanksgiving Day Mass, how they have been generous to our outreach, and how they discuss how their families will support those who are less fortunate in our community - a not-so-gentle reminder and eye opener for me about what is really important at the end of the year.

So let us approach these closing weeks of the liturgical year and the calendar year with open hearts and honest reflection. May we prepare not only for the coming of Advent, but for the coming of Christ - into our hearts, our homes, and ultimately, at the end of time. The same Lord who will come to judge the living and the dead is the one who became flesh and walked, and ate, and healed, and loved others. Jesus journeys with us today as well – His words are challenging, they encourage us to take heed, to repent, transform our lives and to begin anew.

THE SACRED VESSELS

As devout Roman Catholics, the Eucharist – the true presence of Jesus Christ – Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity – deserves only the most sacred and dignified places of repose. Throughout the Church's

tradition, we have reserved the Blessed Sacrament in vessels crafted with reverence and beauty: the gold chalice holds His Precious Blood during the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass; the ciborium stores the consecrated hosts; the monstrance displays the Eucharist for adoration and benediction; and the tabernacle, often ornate and centrally placed, is the resting place of Christ in our churches.

Some may question why we use such elaborate materials, recalling Christ's humble life as a carpenter – but within the liturgy, we offer our very best, knowing that we are not honoring a man from Nazareth alone, but the Risen Lord, the King of Kings.

CHALICE

In a deeper sense, each of us is called to become a living tabernacle. At every Mass we are invited to receive Jesus into our very selves. Just as the sacred vessels are kept pure, clean, and set apart for a holy purpose, so too must our souls be prepared to welcome the Lord. Are we truly worthy

to receive Him? None of us are by our own merits – but through confession, prayer, humility, and a sincere desire to be in communion with God, we are made ready.

Let us never forget that Christ desires to dwell within us, and we must do our part to become vessels that reflect His glory with reverence, simplicity, and love!


