Before Christmas – Make an Advent List

This weekend we enter the holy season of Advent with the purple cloths, the lighting of the Advent wreath, the scaled back music, and almost penitential environment of the Church building. Something is different, it catches our attention. The scriptures also attempt to rouse our senses and greet us with a bold and urgent invitation and challenge: "Stay awake!" Jesus reminds us that the He may return at any moment, and the question we must all wrestle with is simple yet profound - are we ready?

Advent readiness goes far deeper than the perfect Christmas light display, the beautifully decorated tree, or even the most thoughtfully wrapped gift. Those things are fine and good, but they are not the heart of what we as Catholic Christians are preparing for. What truly matters is whether the people we love - and we ourselves - actually know the Lord in an intimate and personal way; NOT just know 'about' Jesus – His Mother's name, the town he was born in, or that he had a cousin named John the Baptist. The beauty of Advent is that it becomes our yearly reset, a sacred opportunity to refocus our hearts and remember that the One we prepare for is Christ.

We have the potential to make this the best Advent yet, not by adding more busyness, but by choosing practices and devotions that help us encounter the living God. Would you consider adding Scripture readings to your daily routine, or setting aside a moment of quiet prayer before the rest of your house wakes up? Try offering small, intentional acts of kindness - time spent with a family member who needs you, a visit or meal for a neighbor who is struggling. Lessen your screen time, or even skip a Starbucks run or two, and direct those resources to SWA Parish Outreach or someone in need. And please, make a plan to come to Confession before Christmas Day, put it on your Advent list! The grace of God works powerfully when we slow down, simplify, and open our hearts.

For many of us, Advent calls for a new attitude - one that resists the constant pressure to be swallowed up by consumerism. Think if we adjusted just a little time away from scrolling for Black Friday Sales and Cyber Monday Deals and thought about the greatest gift we all received from our families – the gift of our Catholic faith. This season cannot be just about the latest gadgets, fashion items, or appliances, but an opportunity to intentionally prepare for the coming of Jesus into our hearts, our homes, and our world.

I do recognize the temptation to be pulled into the whirlwind of our time. Our schedules are precious, and if we are not attentive, we will become people who prepare for the celebration of being a shopper - on Amazon, at Target, Macy's, or Toys "R" Us (with rewards status) - rather than preparing for the birth of our Savior in Bethlehem. Jesus comes quietly, humbly, and patiently. He desires to enter into the busyness of our lives, not only our shopping carts. Wake up. Be attentive. See before you a God who is pursuing you, loving you, guiding you - and He so often does this through the people we cherish most. Wake up! As we enter Week One of Advent in this Jubilee Year of Hope, let us fix our eyes on the Hope that Christ brings to the world.

Think about this, in the scriptures, the Magi - the Three Wise Men - have already started their journey to Bethlehem. They followed a guide - the star - which was their GPS leading them to the Hope of God. They had a list of the route, the stops, supplies, provisions, and gifts. Yes, the Magi brought gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh for Jesus, but what are we bringing to him? As you make your lists of food, presents, and decorations that don the externals of our homes — what about a spiritual list for our souls? Make our gift be that we are bearers of light and hope which will pierce the darkness. Let us remind others by the way we practice our faith that God is faithful to His promises, and that He is already here at work in our midst.

My friends, I pray that Advent 2025 will be a season that will renew us, challenge us, and draw us closer to the Heart of Jesus. Know of my prayers for you and your families as we begin this sacred journey together.

The First Week of Advent: Hope



The Beginning of Advent

The origin of "Advent" comes from the Latin word "adventus," meaning "coming" or "arrival," and it is a season of expectant preparation in the Christian church. Early origins in the 4th and 5th centuries involved preparing new Christians for baptism at Epiphany. By the 6th century, Roman Christians linked it to the coming of Christ, and it became more explicitly tied to Christmas during the Middle Ages, evolving into the four-week season of anticipation we recognize today.

Many families mark the passing weeks of Advent by lighting an Advent Wreath together, using one candle for each week of the season, or by opening the doors of an Advent Calendar to countdown to Christmas Day.

Our Advent season also includes two Holy Days of Obligation. On Monday, December 8th we will celebrate the Immaculate Conception. On this day, we celebrate Mary's conception by her parents and our belief that she was preserved from original sin and redeemed by God's grace from that moment. Mary is indeed "full of grace."

The second Holy Day of Obligation is the Nativity of Our Lord. Catholics around the world celebrate the birth of our Jesus by attending Mass on either Christmas Eve or Christmas Day.
