# "From the beginning ..." Matthew 19:8

We began our journey last week opening the discussion of Christian sacramental marriage. We recognize that at the Wedding Feast at Cana, Jesus raised the dignity of marriage to a sacrament. For this discussion and always, we want to begin our conversations with the presentation of God's original intent – "from the beginning" - how God presented marriage with Adam and Eve before the Fall. At the same time, we live in a world that is wounded and in constant need of conversion and transformation. We know that through Jesus Christ and His church the relationship with God and our neighbor is enhanced and can thrive. It is through the holy Sacraments that we encounter God in these sacred and ritualistic moments, God is truly made present. A sacrament is never private or individualized, it always comes forth in the context of the community witnessed by God, our loved ones, and a member of the clergy. There is present ritualistic forms, guidelines, and laws that have made the sacraments sustain a relevancy for 2000 years all based on the foundation of Love, Sacrificial Love expressed most perfectly on the cross. Because we are discussing Canon Law, at times there are "churchy" or technical words that are used, but we are always discussing souls, beloved daughters, and sons of God - invited and freely offered a relationship.

As we continue to address marriage, we want to acknowledge that some of us are experiencing in our personal lives directly or with people that we love situations that do not fit perfectly into the mold that Jesus and the Church present to us as the ideal which leads us to happiness and heaven. There is no one statement (or magic arrow) that clears up any confusion or misinformation presented to us, or our loved ones from the past. God is calling us to a deeper relationship, and to look at our lives and journey to sainthood recognizing we are not there yet. We are imperfect people, living in an imperfect world, imperfectly. These weekly letters are hopefully going to allow for conversations that can bring ourselves or our loved ones closer to peace, unity, and when necessary, reconciliation.

In this letter I will address the form and marriage process between a catholic and non-Catholic (unbaptized or other Christian denomination). My hope is to first present what the Church teaches as the correct form and ideal means to the sacrament and journey to heaven. In a world that sees almost 50% of all marriages ending in divorce, revealing how challenging this state of life can be without God's grace and mercy, or being on the same page of practicing the faith. The hope is to invite God in as the center and source of the vocation and journey to heaven. Next week I will bring forth the experiences of marriages that end in civil divorce, separation, non-sacramental marriage, and how that affects us as baptized Catholics, and if /how that affects our practice of faith, or results in any possible consequences.

When a Catholic and a baptized Christian (or even if they're a non-Catholic) enter into marriage, it can still be a valid marriage, according to the Canon Law of the Church, provided that the couple is free to be married (i.e., no prior valid marriages), they understand the nature of Catholic marriage, and the Catholic spouse obtains from his/her bishop a formal "permission" for the marriage. If the wedding is celebrated at a non-Catholic church, the Catholic spouse must obtain a "dispensation from canonical form" (i.e., a waiver of the formal requirements that the wedding occur in a Catholic Church, the use of the ordinary marriage rite, witnessed by a Catholic priest, deacon, or bishop) from his/her bishop.

If the wedding is celebrated in the Catholic Church, the priest presides, and a non-Catholic minister can offer prayers and ask a blessing on the couple. If the wedding takes place in a non-Catholic church, the minister presides, and a priest/deacon may be present to offer a prayer and blessing. The Catholic spouse is also under a serious obligation to ensure that their children are raised within the Catholic faith, making a formal promise and the other spouse is made aware of that promise. Holiness is always the goal, and a married couple with religious differences can get there — and be joyfully married as well — by helping and supporting each other.

A wedding between a Catholic and a non-Christian can be a valid bond if the couple obtains from the Catholic spouse's bishop a "Dispensation." The wedding can take place at a religious building other than a Catholic church (for instance, at a synagogue), but a "Dispensation from Canonical form" is needed with the same requirements and expectations as listed above in raising the children in the faith.

In addition, the Catholic spouse is also under a serious obligation to ensure that their children are raised within the Catholic faith — indeed, during one of your interviews with the priest/deacon or parish staff who is overseeing your marriage preparation, the Catholic spouse must make a formal promise to that effect, and the other spouse must be made aware of that promise. The Sacrament of Marriage is a sacred event for both the couple and for the Church as a whole, and spiritually, the Church itself is present at every wedding. With rare exceptions, all the sacred events in the life of the Catholic people are celebrated at a Church — at the sacred place that is the center of our life as a faith community. Think of how your heart warms as you enter St. William the Abbot – the cross, the statues of Mary and Joseph, St. Angela, the stained-glass windows. We know. This place is where Jesus Himself is really present in the Eucharist in our tabernacle. The church building is also the place where past and future generations have and will worship — so when we gather at SWA, we act in solidarity with our parish family present, past, and future.

Essentially, location has meaning, just as the words of the marriage vows have meaning. Sacred events belong in sacred places, and secular events belong in secular locations. The requirement of Canon Law reminds us of the sacred nature of marriage, the special participation of God and His Church, and the place of every marriage in the life of the Church. A catering hall/restaurant, the gazebo at Seaman's Neck Park, Jones Beach, or city hall, are not sacred places, however nice they may be — they are certainly not places where the Catholic people ordinarily come together to worship God in the presence of Jesus and each other. Thus, the right place for your sacred exchange of wedding vows is a sacred place — in a church.

Now that we have established the form of Catholic sacramental marriage, some of you reading this may be thinking that these scenarios are not how you or one of your loved one's have experienced marriage. I am hoping this may allow for a conversation to address and possibly bring others to a greater understanding and if necessary to the celebration of the sacrament of Holy Matrimony. Please do not hesitate to reach out to me or one of the other priests to walk you through any questions or concerns.

## **Fellowship Tent of Meeting**

In Exodus 33:7-11, the intimate prayer of Moses with God is described. A designated place for prayer, a "tent of meeting," was set up outside of the Israelite camp. As Moses would enter this tent, a "column of cloud" would descend upon it, signaling the presence of the Lord, to whom Moses would then speak "face to face, as one man speaks to another." With their intercessor standing before God, the Israelites would then begin to pray "at the entrance of their own tents."

## Overdue gas and/or electric account?

HEAP is offering a one-time benefit available to their eligible households that have an electric/gas account in arrears. This benefit is called "RAS" (Regular Arrears Supplement) and is available from September 22, 2021 through September 30, 2022 or until funds are exhausted. Applicants must meet HEAP requirements and have a past-due utility bill in active collections or facing termination of service. 
