As I prepare for the upcoming Bible Study on the Book of Psalms, I thought it would be appropriate to use the Psalm for this Sunday – "If today you hear His voice, harden not your hearts!" During life's trials and joys, the Lord is trying to pierce through that noise to connect with us - to speak to us - assuring us that He is near to guide and protect us. The past year has been a challenge for us as a parish, and for me personally, navigating a parish and school community through a global pandemic, adjusting to priestly ministry with the loss of Father Collins and Father James, attending to my father's illness, and discovering the theft of parish finances by an employee, forcing me to rely even greater on the Lord, and to listen to His voice for comfort and direction. As I look back at how we as a parish community responded to all those experiences, the Lord continues to gift us with an overabundance of grace and blessings. Due to your presence and generosity, we have not only survived, but thrived.

In August I had announced from the pulpit that when I had new information regarding the case pertaining to the arrest and grand larceny charges of our former employee, I would update you. At the submission of this article, the Assistant District Attorney informed me that the case has been postponed to a later date, and we are facing three possible outcomes: 1) another possible postponement; 2) a plea of guilty; or 3) if there is no resolution, the case may go the grand jury. When I know more, I will inform you.

Please know we have made significant adjustments in our operations for the parish and school offices following this investigation and we have updated and added levels of checks and balances on our processes and procedures. After working with an independent forensic accountant, we will also have the added oversight of the Diocesan Parish Services for a time to be sure all the procedures have been properly implemented. This, of course, was discussed and approved by our Parish Trustees and Finance Committee. Our claim to recover the loss from the theft has been submitted to our insurance company, and the Diocesan Office of Risk Management has also assisted in moving the claim forward. Again, as I receive more information, I will bring you all up to speed pertaining to these matters.

Lastly, in a spirit of transparency, I share this: in the past three years you have heard me say that when it comes to showing the success or blessings of a parish community, I believe that it is revealed by motivated disciples, on fire with the faith. Pastors are required by Canon Law to display the parish's financials once a year in the bulletin and to discuss from the pulpit in "the state of the union," which I have done, and will continue to do, each year. Shortly after I arrived, I removed certain figures displayed in the bulletin that Father Bob implemented in his time, and a few other local parishes reveal in their bulletins as well - benchmarks like weekly attendance, collection figures, or other assets. After discovering the theft in the Spring, I discussed with the Trustees and Finance Council displaying those figures once again for a time, and their recommendation was to start when the new fiscal year began in September.

At the beginning of each month, I will display a snapshot of the previous month's financials compared to a few previous years (2014, 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021) to give you a sense of where we are and where we were. I ask you to take note of a few things in this study - in 2014 and 2018 there were 4 priests here under the leadership of Fr. Bob, and in September of 2019, we had only 3 priests. The pandemic hit in March 2020, and we reduced the number of weekend masses from 7 down to 5. Also, in 2018 and 2019 there were 5 weekend masses instead of the usual 4 weekends – all these factors impacted the direction and movement of St. William's parish and the figures on the next page.

The generosity of St. William the Abbot has always extended beyond the physical boundaries of the parish, and in a particular way the support of the Diocesan programs and ministries. The Catholic Ministries Appeal is a support system which financially assists individuals and programs such as the Seminarians, Catholic Charities, college campus ministry, and food and housing for our senior citizens. I have also listed our parish totals for CMA over the past few years – and you can see in the rubric how we have responded. Each year a number is established as a goal for St. William's to meet – through the years that figure has grown as the needs of the Diocese has grown. In 2014 our goal was \$132,700, our parishioners pledged \$182,158, and we actually paid out \$171,628. But there is also a category for "rebate" because when the parish reaches a certain percentage of our goal, we receive money back to benefit our own ministry programs – in 2014, for example, \$57,682 was returned to us. You will notice the # of donors has dropped significantly over the past few years and we have not reached the goal set for us. The pandemic, the effects of the priest scandal, and the major drop off in church attendance have all played a part in this.

As a parish community we have been so blessed for 95 years - we are a community on fire with faith in Christ and the Church. As we come through this difficult year, the Fall always brings back a sense of reconnecting. School starts up, ministries reopen, family faith formation drop-offs and pick-ups begin, it is like we reconnect and remember God and our faith as a priority following the summer months. As you look back on how the parish has been present for you and your family over the past year, I would ask that you consider maintaining or slightly increasing your weekly/monthly support of the mission entrusted to us. I encourage you to discern making a gift to the 2022 Catholic Ministries Appeal to support those programs beyond the immediate boundaries of the parish that have benefitted us – especially the Seminarians studying for the priesthood.

Our God has remained faithful to us, and clearly by the results revealed on the next page, you have remained faithful to Him and the parish. Thank you for that. I pray the Our Lord and Our Lady will continue to bless and shower us with graces. God Bless you.

The Truth About **Abortion**en's lives. & **Women's Health**

Abortion does not save women's lives.

Abortion is the **direct** and **intentional** killing of a child in the womb.

Abortion is never medically necessary. It does not treat or solve any pregnancy-related complication.

Outlawing abortion will not affect treatment for miscarriage.

Treatment for miscarriage and abortion is not the same thing.

There is a complete moral and legal difference between losing a child through miscarriage and intentionally taking the life of a child.

In the tragic case of miscarriage, surgery may be necessary—and is an ethical treatment—to remove the remains of an unborn child who has already died.

While the same surgery is done to perform an abortion, abortions impose this procedure on a <u>living</u> <u>child</u> with the **intention** of ending his or her life.

Women can get the lifesaving treatments they need—without abortion.

In rare cases, and in the absence of better alternatives, life-threatening maternal health conditions may require interventions that **indirectly** and **unintentionally** lead to the death of an unborn child. **Abortion restrictions will not prevent women from receiving these treatments.**

When the lives of mother and child are in immediate danger, the goal is to fight to save both patients. Effective treatments exist that seek to save the life of the mother and never to intentionally harm her unborn child.

When a woman's life is at risk in pregnancy, preterm delivery may be used as a lifesaving medical intervention to preserve the life of both mother and child.¹

Ectopic pregnancies

result when an embryo implants outside the uterus—often in the fallopian tube. Sadly, such embryos cannot survive and this condition can pose serious risks to the mother. While ectopic pregnancies sometimes resolve naturally, interventions are often necessary.

When done ethically, treatment for an ectopic pregnancy is not abortion. Ethical interventions include the removal of the damaged fallopian tube containing the embryo or, if embryo death has already occurred, medication can be used to resolve the ectopic pregnancy.

Bottom line: Abortion restrictions never prevent women from receiving life-saving treatment.²

New Guidelines for Child Care Assistance!

Many people who were not able to get assistance paying for childcare in the past may now be eligible to receive it! The childcare subsidy can help pay for before and after school programs, and even pay family members for childcare in some cases (they must register as providers). Starting 8/1/22, households with income up to 300% of the State Income Standard are eligible for this subsidy. For example, a family of 4 with household income of up to \$83k can apply for childcare assistance. Applications can be submitted through Nassau or Suffolk Department of Social Services, or by mail. October Evening Group Sessions: Understanding Alzbeimer's and Dementia




Refer a Friend in Need

Donation Spotlight - Seaford Memorare Knights of Columbus


