100% Healed, but only 10% Grateful

One of the sayings I always remember hearing from my parents as a child, and as I grew up - when I or others received a gift was - "What do you say?" Of course, I would then respond, "Thank you!" It was a helpful reminder to say or send a thank you for the kindness offered. Today we hear of this interesting account of 10 lepers who met Jesus as he walked the border between Galilee and Samaria – a No-Man's land – away from any altar or temple. A dangerous place where robbers and outcasts hid out, but in the readings today it is a place where a miracle occurs. Interestingly enough, the lepers were initially indistinct – no names or labels but unclean, broken, and castaway into their own sickness and misery. Any potential relief from those passing by to bring news of the world, a few coins, or leave a blanket, coat, or old sandals was anxiously requested and received.

But this encounter was different – they heard about this rabbi from Nazareth and called Him by name and recognized His strength. Jesus said, "Have yourselves examined!" He sends the group – united in their common suffering to go to the local health inspector – a priest who will likely poke and prod them and determine the next season of their lives. If they will be once again banished – or so desperate to see their families, to embrace their wives and children. To lay in a bed, in a house, to eat like human beings again, to be whole, and part of the community. But they did not even make it that far, because on the way, they see that spots and scales and sores have vanished. With great joy and relief, they rush off, except for one – the outcast, the alien, the foreigner – the Samaritan. Perhaps he knew – that his companions during the time of difficulty – would now reject him in their restoration.

No Jewish Temple priest would welcome him – or examine him or clear him back into society – he was a Samaritan. But maybe Jesus would. The Samaritan leper returned to Jesus glorifying God and offered his thanks to the Lord. He trusted and believed that Jesus would heal him – his faith saved him. Jesus continues to go beyond the borders of what divides us in our humanity and sinfulness to get to the core of where we are really hurting. In some cases, it is a physical ailment, in others it is mental, or spiritual. But if we open ourselves to the Lord's healing power and grace – we too will be made whole, reconciled, restored, and free.

Where are the places in our hearts and lives where we have not acknowledged the Lord's help and healing? When have we been like the 9 Lepers who were too busy, distracted, or even selfish to take time to return to simply say "thank you?" The word Eucharist translates to thanksgiving in Greek. That means at every Mass, every celebration of the Eucharist we have the opportunity to pause in the busyness of our life and simply say to God – 'thank you.'

If we were to pause and think of our track record in the recent past when we have received a birthday or anniversary card or gift, or maybe you were shown an act of kindness like a meal getting dropped off, or someone picked the kids up from school or practice. Do we ever get the sense of — "I deserve" or "I did it for them last time?" Or do we slow down and acknowledge in our hearts and minds a spirit of gratitude? A simple note or card can go a long way to acknowledge the generosity and hospitality of heart that another person shows to us. It is the same for God; however, the benefit of gratitude really benefits us. How can we be more grateful? To pause, pray, and give thanks!

One last note on gratitude. I heard from our Seminarians – Joe and Herley (officially from SWA) and Greg Marino (summer of 2021) and Patrick O'Brien (summer of 2022). They are all into the full swing of the semester - prayer, classes, apostolic work, and healthy recreation, and have reported to me that they are all doing well. My hope is they will return later in the next few weeks when they have a weekend off. And pray that the Lord will continue to provide us with priestly help in the Fall – thank you Fr. Dave, my classmates Fr. Lee and Fr. Kuroly (from Brooklyn), our neighbors Fr. Jason and the priests of Maria Regina, and Fr. Jeff and the priests of St. Barnabas. And this weekend, Welcome Home to Fr. Fasano!

As always, I am so grateful for your faithful presence and generosity.



Property Tax Exemption Program - Updated!

New state legislation has resulted in increased eligibility levels for the Property Tax Exemption Program. Qualified senior homeowners and persons with disabilities may receive property tax assessment reductions of between 5 and 50 percent on county, town and school taxes, depending upon their income. Under the new legislation, qualifying seniors and persons with disabilities will be eligible to receive a reduction on their assessment if their annual household income is \$58k or less. Annual household incomes of \$50k or less may qualify for the maximum allowed exemption of 50%!


Called to Volunteer?


