The Exaltation of the Cross

I was recently reminded of the Lenten/Good Friday hymn "Lift High the Cross" when a student was actually singing it walking into the church. It is a popular and familiar tune, often sung as a reminder as we get closer to Holy Week with Jesus and approach the hill of Calvary, not necessarily in September. The cross is a reminder of Christ's love for us, how he suffered and died for our sins - embracing, carrying and being lifted up for all to see. My guess is that some of you might be humming the song out of memory in your mind as you read this letter. This triumphant sign is the pathway of our redemption, salvation and ultimately, our freedom.

The past few weeks, like the cross, have revealed a contrast of joyful celebrations and also confusing suffering and pain. The Pope welcomed two new young saints, a beautiful display of God's movement in the youth and young faithful last week. We also commemorated the 24th anniversary of September 11th and are still in mourning for the senseless shootings occurring in a Catholic church and on college, high school, and elementary school campuses. These events have made me question aloud "where is God?" On Thursday, when I looked upon the steel Ground Zero cross in the sanctuary, I prayed for wisdom and guidance from the Holy Spirit. As parents and grandparents, so many of you are racked with questions and concerns about how to keep our children safe and insulated from the pain of the absurd actions happening in our world. We pray for a balance of calm and peace at the beginning of the school year, but we are also reminded that sin entered the world from a tree in a garden and humanity is wounded by 'the fall' and that original sin.

This weekend, we'll pause to celebrate the great Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. At first glance, it may sound strange to call the cross "holy" or even "beautiful." The cross was a Roman tool of torture, humiliation, and death. Yet, as we proclaim in the Gospel, "God so loved the world that He gave His only Son" (John 3:16). Jesus embraced the cross not as an accident of history, but as the very means of our salvation. By mounting the cross in love, He transformed it from a symbol of fear into the pathway to holiness, freedom, and eternal life. What once repulsed and terrified humanity now draws us close to God and it is in the cross we see vulnerable love.

Each of us carries a cross - sometimes very visible, other times hidden deep within our hearts. There are moments we may want to cast it aside, to wish it away, or to ask why God has allowed it at all. But Jesus, in His tenderness, invites us to let Him share the weight and to trust that our sufferings do not go unnoticed by the Father. Just as Christ's cross became the door to redemption, so too our crosses can, with God's grace, become the very way we are sanctified and drawn into deeper communion with Him. The "wonderful cross," as the saints have called it is not wonderful because of the pain but because of the love that transforms it.

And yet, we are not left hanging on Good Friday. The promise of the cross always points us and brings us to Easter Sunday. The story of our faith is one of hope, of resurrection, and of victory over sin and death – Jesus truly wins, and His way, although not always easy, is the best path. Even when our families, friends, or the world does not understand our faithfulness, we are reminded that the way of the cross leads to glory. These past few weeks have been difficult to watch, and our hearts and knees may ache from the amount of praying we have done. But the invitation of Jesus continues – to follow Him and fear not. As we look at Jesus' cross, and our own crosses, we are reminded that those challenging moments of embracing and veneration can help us to discover redemption, hope, and the fullness of God's love.



May the Lord continue to bless and strengthen us.
