Would That All the People of the Lord Were Prophets! That the Lord Might Bestow His Spirit on Them All!

I love that in the past few weeks the Scriptures have reminded us about the importance of gathering at “the tent” to encounter God. Once again this week we hear, especially in the time of Moses, about coming together at the tent. Remember, since they were very nomadic and traveling through the desert the Israelites needed a place that was mobile for them to connect with each other, and with God. What is interesting is that this “spirit” of God came down upon those who were present at the gathering tent, but then today we hear a portion of that spirit also fell upon a few other faithful disciples who were not there that day. When I think of the weekly Mass attendance, and of course my desire for our whole community of Seaford to come here, we cannot limit what God can do. When families are attending to the sick or traveling into the city to be with other family members, or even in the activities that keep these families away, God is pursuing and searching for all of us.

Sometimes I can get frustrated by asking the question where are they? And yet I do not have the blueprints of God’s plan for our future. Each morning when I pray, I discern and listen to the movement and direction God is guiding me as the Pastor of Saint William the Abbot. I desire and pray for a renewal of our parishioners to put God first. With sports, caring for sick family members, work, and other activities there is a tension in trying to balance and weigh how to distribute time as a family. As I see each week a few more families returning whether it is because school has started up, or Faith Formation, or just a real desire to reconnect with the sacredness of God, it is encouraging. I think the ultimate mission for us as a parish is to be a welcoming place for people to encounter God’s love and fall deeper in love with Him and His church.

The reason why we come each week to worship God at the Eucharist is not so much for him, but us. To stand with other sinners who recognize how much we need God. For me, it’s not that I need God once a week, but I return each day with intentional prayer and the celebration of the Eucharist to make it through that day! My relationship with God sustains me through the difficult moments in my personal and family life, as well as our united experience here in being entrusted with a Parish at this season in our history.

As we look back at almost 95 years, and look ahead at what is to come, the scripture this week is especially relevant. Obviously, we can go to the list of pastors and priests, religious and dedicated lay faithful, and the pillars of the past and present who have strengthened and moved the parish into a place of worship and praise. I reflect on some of those individuals in the 1st Reading today. Some of us can get a sense of entitlement because we are “here all the time” we should get more – time, acknowledgment, preferential treatment. But remember the Israelites traveled through the desert from place to place, not staying in one place - both physically and spiritually. For us too – are we in a rut, or locked into doing the same thing, because we have always done it that way before. Well... who in our family, or on our block, or in the neighborhood have either taken a pause from their experience here at St. William’s or have not actually met the Lord yet? To know that God who can do anything, maybe sending forth a Spirit upon them, so they can return and bring others with them. But those who do not know the Lord - in the neighborhood, or on the field, or in the pick-up line at school, need you and I to live and witness to the faith. To make being a Disciple of Jesus attractive and joy filled.

And so, in this NEW season, really from now until the New Year, we are beginning again. Our focus will be on welcoming home those who have been away, maybe for 18 months because of the pandemic, or maybe for years because of something that may have happened to them or their family. But it cannot be Fr. James, Fr. Collins, and me alone - it is that line from above “Would that all the people of Lord were prophets.”

Are you willing to be their prophet, to discern how you may be called to assist in the movement of evangelization, of bringing the hope of God to those who do not know Him, or for a time may have forgotten about God? This is a time for us to really discern and to realize that for some of us, we will be re-engaging in a ministry that you were part of in the past or finding a new one. Or to realize that in this season of your life you may only be able to spiritually support or financially support the parish because of the many things are happening in your life and family. The Scriptures often talk about the Gifts of the Holy Spirit, that each of us have been entrusted with talents and gifts unique to all others. Quiet your heart and take to prayer how God may be moving you – and we can discern together the best place to celebrate your gifts, and the needs of the parish, and the greater Church.

May the Lord bless us with an abundant harvest as we enter into the Fall and a rediscover the Sacred.

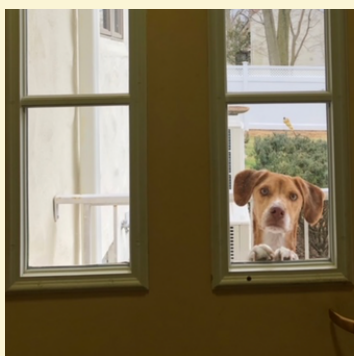

Fellowship Tent of Meeting

In Exodus 33:7-11, the intimate prayer of Moses with God is described. A designated place for prayer, a "tent of meeting," was set up outside of the Israelite camp. As Moses would enter this tent, a "column of cloud" would descend upon it, signaling the presence of the Lord, to whom Moses would then speak "face to face, as one man speaks to another." With their intercessor standing before God, the Israelites would then begin to pray "at the entrance of their own tents."

We will begin to extend the opportunity to come together after selected Masses each weekend just as the Israelites did with a Fellowship Meeting Tent. The Fellowship Meeting Tent will take place at two selected Masses each weekend. The selected Masses will be announced in future bulletins and our social media. Each week the tent will feature refreshments.

WHY DO WE NOT CELEBRATE THE MASS TRADITIONAL, WITH LATIN MASSES? IS THAT NOT THE CORRECT WAY TO PRACTICE MASS?

The term "Latin Mass" or "Traditional Latin Mass" has often been used to refer to the Tridentine (or Extraordinary) form of the Roman Rite Mass, which is celebrated exclusively in Latin. It goes by many names—Traditional Latin Mass (TLM), Extraordinary Form (EF), Usus Antiquior ("Ancient Use"), 1962 Missal, Missal of St. Gregory the Great, Mass of the Ages, Tridentine Mass, Classical Mass.

After Pentecost, the apostles spread throughout the world. The bishops of the metropolises of Rome (the pope), Antioch, Alexandria, Jerusalem, and Constantinople each maintained their own forms of liturgy. Though originally Greek, the language of the Roman church changed to Latin around the second century. For Roman Catholics, the Traditional Latin Mass descends from this period. Until 1965, with some exceptions, Latin was the sole language used in the Roman Rite Mass.

During the Protestant Revolt, abuses crept into the Mass in many places. In an effort to restore the Mass, Pope St. Pius V wrote "Quo Primum" in 1570 and declared, "We grant and concede in perpetuity that...this Missal is hereafter to be followed absolutely...and may freely and lawfully be used." Since his restoration occurred shortly after the Council of Trent, the Traditional Latin Mass is sometimes referred to as the "Tridentine Mass" or the "Missal of St. Pius V."

This is a bit of the historical development of the Latin Mass. It is to be noted however, that the Latin Mass had some differences in structure, actions and postures. For example the Priest said Mass with his back turned toward the congregation. This practice was explained by Pope Benedict XVI (then a cardinal) that the common turning toward the East was not a "celebration toward the wall"; it did not mean that the priest "had his back to the people": the priest himself was not regarded as so important. For just as the congregation in the synagogue looked together toward Jerusalem, so in the Christian Liturgy the congregation looked together "toward the Lord."

In the Latin Mass also communicants knelt to receive communion and it they received on their tongue only.

However things have changed over time. In the first Place the Latin Language is one that has become limited in its learning and usage. In practice, Latin has fallen out of use in local churches. A small percentage of liturgies are celebrated (either entirely or partially) in Latin and, due to lack of teachers of the Latin language, most seminaries do not require that those wishing to enter the priesthood should study the language.

Secondly, it has been argued by theologians and liturgists that the full, active and conscious participation of the faithful at Mass is much more effective and efficient when the Priest faces the faithful and invites to them respond to the various prayers and gestures in the Mass.

Furthermore, health issues (like the pandemic we face now) became another reason over the years to give communion in the hand rather than on the tongue.

The Second Vatican Council document Sacrosanctum Concilium also gave authority to the bishops to employ greater use of the vernacular in the Mass, as well as in the administering of sacraments and sacramentals.

Even though In 2007, Pope Benedict XVI issued a command (motu proprio Summorum Pontificum) accompanied by a letter to the world's bishops, authorizing use of the 1962 Latin Mass by all Latin Church Catholic priests in Masses celebrated without the people, Pope Francis on the 16th of July 2021 also released another command (Motu Proprio, Traditionis custodias) restricting the use of the Latin Mass because he observed so much division created by the use of this Mass in various places.

So we can say in conclusion that since the passage of time, circumstances, situations and events influence changes in the way things are done, this has become the case also for the use of the Latin Mass in the Roman Catholic Church.
