"Be strong, fear not! Here is your God." Isaiah 35:4

You cannot look at some of the recent events taking place in our world, natural movements like the fires in California, the earthquake in Haiti, and of course the recent hurricanes from the Gulf of Mexico up the East Coast. We can look at the Middle East as well - what is happening in Afghanistan, the blatant disregard of human life and dignity with those vivid scenes at the Kabul airport. The effects of the global pandemic, especially as we prepare to open our schools. We can see the passion and the fear in the continued discussions regarding the protection of our most vulnerable, the children, and the elderly. With all those things happening, we are as a people of faith encouraged to look and hold onto the beautiful verse from Isaiah – "Be strong, fear not! Here is your God."

At the center of our faith experience is that we are a people of hope, 'where the blind will see, the deaf will hear, the lame will walk, and the mute will speak.' Even in the experiences of dryness, or the desert, our Lord God promises 'pools and springs of refreshing water for all those who hunger and thirst.' But the only way we can experience that, or encounter the love of God, is if someone can point us to the Lord, or bring us to Him.

In the Gospel this weekend we hear the people brought to Jesus a deaf man in order for the Lord to heal him. For those of us who experience sickness or disease in our own families, there is nothing that we would not do to bring our loved one to health, and wholeness. We live in a world that is so broken and confused that we grasp onto the things that may alleviate some of the symptoms, but do not go to the core of the disease. People come from all over the world to go to the Mayo Clinic, Sloan Kettering, St. Francis Heart Center, Johns Hopkins Hospital, or Massachusetts General Hospital because they know of the care and expertise at those facilities and institutions. But when it comes to their spiritual well-being how quickly we turn to self-help articles, psychics, soothsayers, yogi masters, or eastern "spiritualities." When we embrace anything besides God, it is an offense, A SIN, against the First Commandment.

So, let's be honest - during these past 18 months where have you brought your concerns? Worries? Fears? Have you kept your focus on God? And his healing powers? Or in the midst of your despair and hopelessness, and even darkness, have you asked the question, "Where is God?" And yet, we have not invited Him into our fear, our family's struggle, the sickness, or loss of a loved one. How can God help and heal something that has not been presented to Him?

Rediscover the Sacred. For the upcoming year this will be a theme for us as a parish. For almost 95 years St. William the Abbot has been a Lighthouse of stability, strength, guidance, and faith for this powerful community on the South Shore of Long Island. We have celebrated countless Baptisms, Communions, Weddings, Anointings, Funerals – in the moments of joy and difficulty – God has been there for us. If you or people you know and love have put God on the back burner because of the Pandemic, or fear, distraction, or maybe even laziness, can I encourage you to make this season a time to do just that – Rediscover the Sacred. Pull out the old Baptism, Confirmation, or Communion albums, or even better the Wedding video. Look at the beauty of St. William Church. We can discuss the hairstyles and the fashionable collars and shoe styles in another letter, but return to that feeling, that spirit, and the emotions from that special place.

As I reflect on the 20th anniversary of 9/11 – and how our hearts were turned to God – and in many cases the Church pews were full, I ask, do we need God less now? I would say it is just the opposite – it is now time to return – not just because school has started, or Faith Formation, or because all the vacation trips are over. The Lord is waiting and beckoning for us to come to Him – to be seen, cared for, and loved. To draw into a deeper friendship and intimacy. Make time for God. We know the world and our lives are a little crazy, busy and distracted, but as the scripture reminds us - "Be strong, fear not! Here is your God."

As always, I am so grateful for your presence and generosity.

Fellowship Tent of Meeting

In Exodus 33:7-11, the intimate prayer of Moses with God is described. A designated place for prayer, a "tent of meeting," was set up outside of the Israelite camp. Faith Formation

Today we hear how Jesus helped a man who could not hear nor speak clearly. WHY DO WE NEED TO CALL A PRIEST FATHER AND THE POPE HOLY FATHER; DOES IT SAY THAT IN REFERENCE TO THE BIBLE?

To begin with, let us consider this quote from Paul in his letter to the Romans.

"For those who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you received a spirit of adoption, through which we cry, "Abba, Father!" The Spirit itself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God. (Romans 8:15-16)

An analysis of the text reveals that all believers become children of God through the power of the Holy Spirit. Now when God became man in the person of Jesus Christ, he conferred this power of the Holy Spirit on the men he had chosen (The Apostles) to continue his ministry.

We can find proofs of this in scripture first at the resurrection appearance: Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you. And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." (John 19:21 -23)

Second, on the occasion of the great commissioning: "Go, therefore, and make and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and f the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you..." (Mt 28:19-20)

These were means by which God empowered chosen human beings to act in his name and with the power of the Holy Spirit. By these same means therefore, Bishops and Priests, called and chosen to act in the name of God and pass on his divine life to believers through spiritual birth in Baptism, come to share in the fatherhood or paternity of God. So they are called "Father" by analogy; in the sense of participation, imitation and sharing in the universal fatherhood of God. They stand in for God as his physical representatives here on earth. For this reason another title for Priests is: Alter Christus- a Latin expression meaning another Christ.

Acting in the name and power of God as spiritual leaders of a parish, each priest assumes the spiritual care of the faithful people of God. They give spiritual birth to the faithful in baptism, pass on the faith to them, and counsel them as a natural biological father would do for his sons and daughters.

Fundamentalists have often quoted Matthew chapter 23:8-10 that Jesus forbade calling any man on earth father, teacher or master. However, these words of Jesus were strictly with regard to the pride and arrogance of the Pharisees who diverted all attention to themselves to the point of literally taking over the place of God as the one with ultimate and absolute authority over humanity. He was using hyperbole (exaggeration to make a point) to show the scribes and Pharisees how sinful and proud they were for not looking humbly to God as the source of all authority, fatherhood and teaching, and instead setting themselves up as the ultimate authorities, father figures, and teachers. In effect that quote should be appropriately understood as "call no one who makes himself God your father."

The word "Abba" in the text above is the Hebrew word for Father. It's translation in English is "Abbot" referring to the father or head (in the faith) of a group of monks. For example, the Patron Saint of our Parish, Saint William, was the founder and father of the monastery of Monte Virgine hence he had the title The Abbot. This means to become the leader of a faith community is to have become their "Father" For this reason, Saint Paul referred to himself as the father of the Christians of Corinth in Christ Jesus because he had preached the gospel to them and, as it were, begotten them in the faith. (1Cor. 4:14-15)

With the same understanding he spoke of individuals like Timothy (Philippians 2:22) and Onesimus as his children (Philemon v. 10), meaning he had become a father to them in the faith.

The Jews or the Israelites and of course all Christians refer to the Abraham, Isaac and Jacob as "our fathers" in the faith. This usage of father here is clearly not in the sense of denying God's universal fatherhood but in the sense of them being our pioneers or mentors in the faith journey with God.

This same spiritual fatherly relationship existed between the prophets Elijah and Elisha. So when Elijah was carried up in a whirlwind Elisha cried out: "my father!" (2Kgs 2:12)

Mahatma Gandhi is known as the father of Indian independence. The early leaders of every nation are referred to as Founding Fathers.

Therefore, the words of Jesus in Matthew 23:8-10 are not to be understood as forbidding the use of the title father for all of these levels of relationship but as criticism of a group of self-righteous religious leaders.

Another theological reason for the use of "father" also comes from an understanding of the Church as the Family of God. In the Jewish culture the father is considered the head of the family. So when we regard the Church (which came out of the Jewish culture) as the family of God, then the head is called father. On the other hand when the Church is regarded as the "sheep" of God (the term Jesus used when entrusting his church to Peter. cf John 21:15-17), then the head or guardian of the sheep of God is known as "Pastor." Pastor is the English word derived from the Latin Pastores-meaning shepherd. The Catholic and the Anglican Churches use these two titles of "Father" and "Pastor" interchangeably to refer to the same leader of the Church but Protestants are more at home with the term Pastor.

It is with the same understanding, as the head of the entire Catholic Family of God, that the Pope is also called "Father". The Latin word for Father is Papa and it is from this "Papa" that we derive the English word Pope. So the head of the Catholic Family is either called the Pope or the Holy Father; all have the same meaning.

The attribute "Holy" is one that flows from occupancy of the seat as the human representative of Christ, the Holy one of God, rather than a personal achievement or spiritual status of the Pope. Aware of this, Popes, including the present one, have often referred to themselves as sinners in need of God's mercy. The Pope has a confessor to whom he goes for the confession of his sins. All Christians are called to holiness; and the Pope, like all others, strives to achieve that too.

Background Screening Update

The Office for the Protection of Children and Young People:

The Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People (The Charter) promulgated by the Bishops of the United States in 2002 outlines specific practices and guidelines providing standards of safety in parishes and dioceses throughout the United States. As directed in The Charter, the Diocese of Rockville Centre requires all employees, clergy, and volunteers to complete three requirements within thirty days of employment or volunteering:

- 1. Attend Protecting God's Children Program (Virtus)
- 2. Sign the Codes of Conduct;
- Complete a background screen application. The Diocese requires all those who remain in active ministry be rescreened at 5 yr. intervals. volunteers/employees.

A Word on Background Screening of Volunteers:

The Office for the Protection of Children and Young People (OFPCYP) has streamlined the volunteer application process enabling volunteers to complete the three safe environment requirements in one step. Individuals wishing to volunteer in a parish or school:

- Register to attend a Protecting God's Children class and create a Virtus account on the Virtus website: www.Virtus.org
- 2. Electronically acknowledge the Diocesan Code of Conduct- provided during the Virtus registration process.
- 3. Follow the instructions to complete the Sterling Volunteers background screening application background offered during the Virtus registration process.

Active Volunteers:

If you are active in a parish ministry, have already attended Virtus and have been background screened you may be at – or beyond- the *Syr. rescreening requirement*. If this is the case, you will receive an email from *Sterling Volunteers* asking you to complete the background screening application on-line. You may access the background screening application by following the prompt in the email or logging into your Virtus account. *Please be aware-this is not a scam nor has your e-mail been hacked.* The OFPCYP has been working with your parish to update the Safe Environment records and noted it is time for you to be rescreened. You may also be prompted to electronically resign the Code of Conduct when you log into your Virtus account.

To access your Virtus account: www.Virtus.org You will need your Username and Password. If you need assistance, please contact Virtus: 1-888-847-8870 or helpdesk@virtus.org. Once in your account, review your account information-particularly your e-mail address. If your account requires updating, please hit the TOOLBOX tab at the top of the screen. On the left side of your screen in the green column click "Update My Account" You will be able to make the necessary changes-please remember to hit the SAVE button at the bottom of the screen.


Consider Automated Giving


