Two years ago I shared the story of two young boys who raced outdoors to enjoy the first heavy snowfall of the season. They threw snowballs, made a snowman, and happily screamed as they rode their sleds down the hills between the wooded groves. They suddenly arrived at the edge of a large freshly covered field. One boy challenged the other, "Let's see who can make the straightest tracks across that field!" They began their journey across the trackless expanse. When they reached the other side, they observed that the

track lines were different. One line was almost perfectly straight and the other zigzagged crazily. The zigzagger asked the other, "Why are your tracks so straight while mine are so crooked?" His friend answered, "It's simple. I picked out a post on the other side of the field and kept my eyes on it, always walking straight toward it."

Those with well-defined goals in life walk purposely and tend to achieve more while those who establish no goals tend to leave behind an ill-defined legacy. The beginning of a new year gives us reason to ponder: "Is human history a zigzagged affair or is it haphazard? Has God directed a well-choreographed history of Earth or have the millennia of events preceding this moment been zigzagged and dependent upon non-God orchestrated 'survival of the fittest' principles?" Already, she has initiated the formation of a new women's circle. Many members (those from the past and new members) have stepped up to bat.

The Biblical prophetic utterances (i.e., Isaiah 53, Haggai 2, and Ezekiel 48) encourage us. John of Revelation sees "...the holy city, new Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God, like a bride adorned for her husband." (21:2) One of my favorite teachers, Helmut Thielicke ("The Silence of God"), taught that, "in spite of all appearances to the contrary, God still has a plan for this bankrupt world. He still has something in store for it. He still wants this world as a theater for His grace and glorious direction." We do not fear the future. In faith we walk. We make straight lines of tracks in the snow (or sand) because we see the goal ahead of us. In spite of everything, we move confidently forward to a world waiting for us.

Recover, Renew, Rejoice

Recovery from the devastation of hurricane lan is proceeding, but at a painfully slow pace. Our buildings have suffered recurring damage from high winds and driving rain which has complicated the process of obtaining accurate estimates of repair. However, two estimates have been received and are being reviewed and compared for completeness, accuracy, and competitiveness.

Samples of materials, including carpet, paint and fabric samples are being prepared for review by the property committee and council. We hope to display presentation boards in the narthex soon.

The property committee, led ably by Steve Nielsen has saved the church lots of money by sawing up the three massive trees that were blown over in the storm. Removal of the debris may take a bit longer. Steve also arranged for repair of the window in the ladies' restroom of the fellowship hall.

Our sign will likely be repaired temporarily but not straightened. Our insurer has reimbursed us for replacement cost, and we have obtained two bids for this service. We are delaying the replacement until we have greater confidence that Sarasota County will not be changing the building codes as a result of lan.

Our roof will be replaced beginning after the first of the year. A Notice of Commencement has been filed and building permit was obtained. Fraser Roofing will have a large crew on site in January to get the job done quickly and competently.

Thanks to all those who have donated to the recovery fund. We will recover and renew and then rejoice. In the interim, please prayerfully consider a year-end donation to the recovery fund.

- ▼ The Council continues to put in countless extra hours of meetings and research as CLC moves forward toward total restoration.


It has been an eventful year full of challenges met and blessings received.
