I answered a call a few months ago from a man who wanted to meet me in my office in order to "check out" the Lutheran Church. His first question was an inquiry about the creation account in the book of Genesis. I explained that Lutherans were free to interpret the sevenday account literally or interpretively but that either interpretation would

conclude that, according to the Hebrew scriptures, there is only one God (instead of many gods) who created heaven and earth and sustains all that he has created. He was not happy about my answer and when I replied to his next question about homosexuality and explained that the ELCA interpretation of scripture allowed for inclusion of gays in our community. The gentleman immediately stood up and left for the door but not before consigning me and all Lutherans to hell.

Had the visitor hung around a little longer, I would have explained that the ELCA and most mainline churches now use the term "inspired Word of God," having discarded the more traditional term, "inerrant Word of God." The "inspired" terminology allows for a more contemporary scientific understanding of the Bible. For example, believers are not compelled to believe that the earth is flat but is, in fact, a sphere that is part of a solar system and a galaxy which is one galaxy among galaxies that seem to be in a universe that is infinite. The writers of Scripture confess in the context of their world views their beliefs about God's deeds and nature in human language which we believe to be "divine truth."

I have concluded in my own spiritual journey that a radical literal approach to the bible can lead to a dead end that rules out deeper biblical truth. For example, an insistence that Adam and Eve were real flesh-and-blood people may preclude the search for a more important message from Genesis, a message about the sovereignty of God and our dependence upon that God. That point does not depend upon a literal understanding of the creation account, but also does not rule it out. That is also true about the virgin birth account. The virgin birth accounts in Matthew and Luke do not compel or dissuade us from affirming their literal interpretation. They are statements about the **significance** of Jesus, just as the great prologue about the **Word** in John 1 is a statement about the **nature and mission** of Jesus.

In some ways, Rabbi Abraham Heschel spoke also for Christians when he said, the Bible "is a book that cannot die, that is incapable of becoming stale or obsolete...(it is) ... like an ocean at the bottom of which countless pearls lie; waiting to be discovered, its spirit still to be unfolded...What would be missing in the world, what would be the condition and faith of man, had the Bible not been preserved?" (ISRAEL: AN ECHO OF ETERNITY)

Let us not foolishly cast away pearls by getting caught up too much in the trees and miss the woods.



RICHARD P. BENEDUM



received numerous awards for teaching and other professional activities and in 2009 was named the outstanding alumnus of the University of Oregon's School of Music and Dance. He is also the founder and former music director of the Dayton Bach Society chorus and orchestra, and has conducted all the major oratorios and passions, and numerous cantatas of Bach, as well as other major works from the seventeenth to the twentieth centuries. He is active as an organ recitalist and church musician. He was invited to join the Speakers Bureau of the Ohio Humanities Council and subsequently was named to the Council's Board; since moving to Florida he has joined the Florida Humanities Council's Directory of Humanities Professionals.

He directed fifteen Summer Seminars and Institutes for teachers, based in Vienna and studying the music of Mozart, for the National Endowment for the Humanities between 1990 and 2014, and is currently a consultant and review panel member for the Endowment. He has also directed numerous interdisciplinary programs for teachers on operas, especially by Mozart, in Ohio and Florida, supported with NEH and Ohio Humanities Council funding; and enjoys lecturing to non-specialist adult audiences. He wrote and produced a six-part series of programs for National Public Radio on "Mozart: His Music and His Letters," which was broadcast by an estimated 150 stations nationally. He wrote program notes for the Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra for 30 years. He is a regular review panel member for the National Endowment for Humanities, and was a consultant for the Ohio Arts Council. He has received more than 250 national, state, and local grants for performances, workshops and symposia, and research, totaling more than \$3.5 million; with a University of Dayton colleague he lead workshops on grant-writing for music faculty and administrators.

He received the DMA in organ performance from the University of Oregon, where he studied with John Hamilton. He subsequently studied organ and conducting with Helmuth Rilling (Stuttgart, Germany) and musicology with Christoph Wolff (Harvard University). His research interests include compositional process in Bach's organ works, and the significance and patterns of articulation marks in Bach's autograph manuscripts; and the operas and early biographical studies of Mozart.

He currently resides in Venice, Florida, and recently retired as organist/choirmaster at Christ Church, Bradenton, and co-director of the Sarasota-Manatee Bach Festival.


