Happy Easter

The season of Lent began on Ash Wednesday, February 18, and will end on Easter Sunday, April 5. Most Christians in one way or another celebrate the forty days preceding Easter (not including the Sundays **in** Lent) commemorating the time that Jesus took to prepare himself in the wilderness for his earthly ministry. The experts think that the origins of this pre-Easter season have to do with a day-long fast before Easter in the early church. By the fifth century, all Christians observed Lent by fasting, breaking away from

sinful habits, exercising virtues, giving alms, getting “right” with their neighbors, and forgiving those who had offended them. But Christianity has always insisted that the most important observance of Lent is one’s preparation for the celebration of Easter.

In other words, Lent is a time dedicated to a happy ending. The solemnities of Lent have no meaning apart from the joy to which its days advance. Easter is the solution of a problem to which Lent directs us. It’s usually called “sin.,” a condition referenced in our colonial days when the New England Puritan primer declared, “In Adam’s fall we sinned all.” The observances of Lent, at least theoretically, are intended to move us from the denial of our separation from our Creator to honest recognition of our use of free will to reject God’s intent that we love others as we love ourselves. When we reach that moment of clarity, we are ready to hear the solution to our problem, namely, the death and resurrection of Christ by which we are freed from our enslavement to sin, death, and the devil.

Easter reminds us that we do not have to earn, or take, our salvation but that we receive our freedom. As Luther put it, “we are free from the condemnation of the law, but free to love others without concern for our own just condemnation.” Paul called it the “abundance of grace.” (Romans 5) So let’s put a little Lent into our lives. On Wednesdays during Lent at 5 p.m. we will meet to share a simple meal together and hear some of our brothers and sisters in the faith share their faith journeys. Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services (April 2 and 3) begin at 3 p.m. and a fish fry will take place on Good Friday after services in the Fellowship Hall.

So let’s put a little “Lent” into our lives. Let’s prepare our hearts and minds for the big celebration on April 5.

Lenten Soup Supper Invitation

Join us for our Lenten Soup Suppers each Wednesday evening during Lent at 5:00^{pm} in our Fellowship Hall.

We'll share a simple meal of homemade soups and bread, followed by a brief time of reflection.

This is a wonderful opportunity to gather in fellowship, embrace the spirit of simplicity, and prepare our hearts for Easter. Let's walk this Lenten journey together—one bowl at a time. All are welcome—bring a friend, and if you'd like, bring a soup to share! The following soup was so delicious that it was requested to be put into the newsletter. Enjoy!

Lemon Chicken Orzo Soup

2 T. EVO oil, + extra for serving	1 med. Fennel bulb OR 3 stalks celery
1 med yellow onion, chopped	chopped (about 1 ½ cups)
¾ t. ground coriander	1 ¼ t. kosher salt, divided, + more to taste
8 c. low sodium chicken broth or stock	2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts
1 c. orzo	(1 ¼ lb. trimmed & cut in half lengthwise)
⅓ c. tahini, optional	¼ c. fresh dill - chopped + more for garnish
1 lemon zest (grated from fresh)	¼ c. fresh lemon juice
freshly ground black pepper for serving	

- Sauté the vegetables:** Heat the oil in a Dutch oven over medium heat until shimmering. Add the fennel or celery, onions, coriander, and ½ t. of the salt and cook until softened and nearly translucent, about 5 mins.
- Poach the chicken:** Add the broth, chicken, and the remaining ¾ t. salt. Increase the heat to high and bring to a simmer. Turn off the heat, cover, and let stand until the chicken is cooked through. 10-15 minutes. It should reach an internal temp of 160°F.
- Shred the chicken:** Transfer the chicken to a plate and let it sit until cool enough to handle. Using two forks or your hands, shred the chicken into bite-sized pieces.
- Meanwhile, cook the orzo:** Return the soup to a simmer over medium-high heat. Add the orzo and simmer until tender, 11-13 minutes, stirring occasionally to prevent sticking.
- Season the soup:** Take the soup off the heat and stir in the tahini, if using, dill, lemon zest and juice, and shredded chicken. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Serve drizzled with EVO oil and sprinkle with lots of black pepper and extra fresh dill.

Refrigerate leftovers in airtight container for up to 5 days. The orzo will absorb broth as it's stored, so you may need to add more broth when you reheat it. Freeze for up to 3 months. For best results freeze without the orzo, tahini, lemon and dill, adding them when you reheat the soup.

Andy Egeland

Good morning, Lord, please let my words be acceptable to you and let them enlighten and bring joy to our congregation. My name is Andy Egeland, I am a steward of Christ, a father, a husband, a commercial fisherman, a Florida man and the son of a son of a sailor.

I grew up in Alaska where my dad was a commercial fisherman, and my mom was a teacher. I moved to Florida 30 years ago (if you can believe that!). I have 4 children and have been married 3 times. I am wondering why Pastor Ken asked me to do this talk. I have put much time and thought into what to say today. What will impact the listeners? It's not often we get to talk in front of so many like minded people of God. I do feel blessed to have this opportunity. I am also nervous and confused. However, you cannot worry and pray at the same time, I choose prayer. I pray God has a plan for me. God is never wrong.

I pray a lot as a fisherman. If we could live in prayer we would be in a constant connection with God. As a commercial fisherman we have the oldest job on the planet. God provided us fish since creation, maybe day 3 or 4! He doesn't make it an easy job, and a lot could go wrong. When God graces us with a good day and all things are in order we go fishing.

To fight a fish is the biggest thrill, to lose a fish is the biggest disappointment. For some it's the experience of the fight, for me it is much more. We need to put fish in the boat to survive. The only way that happens is through the grace of God. Sitting in this church we are all fishermen and we need to put fish in the boat. As fishermen we experience many ups and downs. We have calm sea and turbulent tides. Calm seas don't make good sailors. We must always have Faith over Fear!

It's the struggle that lets us know joy. Kids are proof of that! Each fish I catch I get to struggle with and get to thank God afterwards. If I lose the fish, I must thank God for the opportunity and ask for another one. I have also learned to take what the good Lord gives me. Be happy with what you got. True living is through Christ. I think the world can be broken down into 2 things Good and Bad. If it is good it comes from God. If it is bad, it does not. Fish come from God. Love comes from God. Our planet and world come from God There are many struggles in life, but our joy is in the Lord. The struggle is real and we must embrace it and grow from it.

A day not long ago when I was having difficulty understanding why things are the way they are I decided to take a walk on the beach. On this particular day it was very windy, blowing 40 mph out of the North. The waves were 10 feet tall. It was so windy that the sand looked like snow. There weren't many people on the beach that day. I walked into the wind for about an hour. Each step was a struggle with my head down and my eyes almost closed the whole time wondering why. Why are all the things in my life the way they are. I reached a point where the beach finally disappeared into the waves. I had to turn around. When I did life became easier, it was no longer a struggle. I felt as if I was floating down the beach. I was able to open my eyes without being blasted with sand. My walk back was invigorating; my steps were easy. I felt like a kite soaring down the beach. When I got back to my truck, I realized my troubles and worries were still there but if I put them at my back things would become much easier. God is like the wind; he is the wind. If you go against God every step is a struggle but if we go with God, we can almost float.

I would like to make a pledge now before God and the congregation to use my blessings and talents to bring people closer to God. We are sponsoring a fish fry on Good Friday April 3rd. Which happens to also be Pastor Ken's birthday! We will have our Good Friday service at 3 pm. Directly followed by

the fish fry at 4 pm. If you plan on attending, please sign up and let us know how many people so that we have enough fish.

Bob Cosler

Good Morning, I'm Bob and I've been asked to share my Stewardship Journey today in the hope that you will review your journey as well.

Up until about 20 years ago I was a "pay the price of admission" Christian. I contributed an amount that seemed reasonable to me as a price for my attendance at a worship service. As a child and a young man, I attended church very regularly and was aware that making an offering was a regular part of the service. I knew that buildings and utilities and services cost money and I was willing to give an amount that would cover my fair share of the expense of the event. I suppose I saw myself as a consumer of religious services. Years passed, and when I went to church, I gave and when I didn't go, I didn't give.

Then one day, God gave me an opportunity to wake up. I was going through one of those painful transitions in life that many of us have experienced. And, I had just gone through a period of what I'll call "conspicuous consumption". I bought a lot and gave a little. But, with my disposable income cut by 60%, I found myself renting a very modest home that had been abused by renters and owners alike. It had style but was the shabbiest of sheik. However, (and you know God planned this) it was within easy walking distance of a very active Lutheran Church. I began attending, and as my involvement with that congregation increased so did my recognition that God had real and well-defined expectations of what caring for people and property, and utilization of time, talents and treasure, should be.

Now, I've never been a rigid, stick-to-the-budget person. But what I am good at is pigeon-holing resources prior to getting my grubby little hands on them. So I began by making sure that I made an offering every single week, even when I wasn't there by arranging for automatic deductions from my checking account. Back then, it wasn't as easy as it is now, with apps like PayPal and Zelle and Google Wallet at our disposal. And, you know what I noticed? I didn't notice any significant financial hardship! So I increased my giving, truthfully as sort of a test of God's abundance. Still, no noticeable effect! The money was gone before I could decide what else to do with it. I also became aware of ways in which I was not an especially good steward of time and talent either. I also notice a strange feeling of warmth and peace that stayed with me when I shared my time, God-given talents and treasure.

In 2009, I moved and God again put me near to a very active and loving Lutheran congregation at Galilee Lutheran in Pasadena Maryland. But I had made a yearly commitment to the previous congregation. I wondered, could I complete that commitment and take on a new one as well? I'm here to tell you that when you give God gives back.

During a Sunday morning sermon at Galilee, the pastor shared a story entitled A Handful of Rice. The story tells about how the people of Mizoram, a Northeastern state in India, practice a tradition called Buhfai ot, "one handful of rice at a time". These VERY poor people set aside a portion of rice at every meal for God. When they collect enough rice they donate it to their local church which then sells the rice to generate income. Pitiful right? Meaningless, seemingly! Really? To be sure it was a meager beginning. The sale of rice in 1914 brought in \$1.50 US. BUT they have continued and eventually raised \$1.5 million to support missionaries and local ministries.

Now that I'm retired, I can spare more than a handful of rice. I can share my time and talents as well. BUT I can do more. Join me, won't you? Even if it's only a handful of rice.
