Message from the Pastor April 2021

Let's face it. Easter is about life but it is also about death. Without death, there can be no Easter because the resurrection of Jesus is about victory over death, sin, and the devil. It's tough to face a person who is close to the door to eternal life. They are people with terminal illnesses, for example, people with bodies no longer recognizable, people waited upon by friends or relatives who care for them while traumatized themselves by the presence of an unyielding power. But death is a component of life. One might tear a page from Ecclesiastes (3:2-9) and be comforted by the words:

There is a time to be born, and a time to die;

A time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted;

A time to kill, and a time to heal

A time to weep, and a time to laugh

A time to mourn and a time to dance

And so there is a time to die; it is not a bad thing to die. Who wants to live forever, especially when one grows weary tending to bones that easily crumble, to a heart that wants to call it quits, to aches and pains that only get dull when pills are administered? Yes, I have seen death come like a friend. I have heard those who love say, "Grandma passed away last night. It was a blessing."

But I have seen death come as the enemy. I have never had to fight in a war but I listen closely when those, who have, tell me about the carnage. I once spoke to a friend about the graphic carnage in the movie, SAVING PRIVATE RYAN. He said, "Yes, it was real. But one thing was missing: the stench." In my years of ministry, I confronted death the enemy in some funerals I conducted, funerals I will never forget. The young girl in her early twenties who was senselessly shot to death by a couple of thugs who broke into her home. The young mother who was destroyed by melanoma within just a couple of months. The other mother in her late 30s, the victim of months of suffering at the mercy of lupus.

Is death the thing that permeates life with senselessness and mindlessness? Or is it the great friend? It is neither. It is both. It is a power that can no longer threaten us because of God's greater power of love. There are weapons with which we can contend: faith, hope, and love. To commend a young mother to mother earth can destroy those left behind only when faith, hope, and love are missing. The tragedy of death is mediated when we fight death with love and faith, the gifts of Easter. Once a little boy who, when asked about Enoch, the son of Cain (Genesis 4:17f), replied. "Enoch was a man who went on walks with God—and one day he didn't come back." (Hebrews 11:5)

Easter means a lot but one of its messages is that one day we shall go on a walk with God and not come back. Not a bad thought.

Two Council Officer vacancies were filled with the election of **Dotty Berner** as the 21-22 Council President and **Barbara McAlister** as the 21-22 Council Treasurer, however as a non-voting member. **Louise Glose** was welcomed as a new Council member.

As CLC needs to grow and achieve financial stability, a Stewardship Plan for 2021-2022 was discussed in detail along with a "List of Priorities" for a growing reserve fund. Approximately \$2,200 is needed each week to grow reserves. Stewardship opportunities should be presented to inform the congregation of projects/repairs in need of attention. Most Council members felt that the parking lots are of major concern, thus the priority.

Guest organist Pastor Larry Froemming inspired us with a moving arrangement of Handel's Hallelujah Chorus.


CLC MINISTRY TEAMS NEEDED
