The story I told a few years ago is worth repeating. I once met a woman who was raised in Vienna as a child. On Christmas Eve, 1946, she and her family were gathered in their cold apartment in front of a tree which the mother had gotten from the woods. Like many others, they were the surviving victims of a disastrous war. In spite of the temptation to wallow in despair, they gathered to sing Christmas carols. When they had gone through a round or two of old favorites, they feasted on pudding made from cornstarch without sugar and they drank unsweetened tea.

They were happy. They sang and sang and sang. They had a roof over their heads when many did not. Although Dad was lost in the war, they still had each other; many had lost many more family members in the war. And most important, they had the Christ child in their hearts when many did not on that evening in the rubble and ruins of post-war Europe. And when they went to bed at 2 a.m., they were still happy and they kept right on singing and singing warmed by each other under their Federbetten.

And so did the shepherds, so long ago, bed down that night with their flocks, singing in their hearts the song of the angels and the glory of a baby in the manger. Reduced to its simplest component, Christmas is about the celebration of the Christ child in one's heart.

We will gather in a few weeks on Christmas Eve and sing (in English) some of the same songs sung by the children of Vienna. But we will not be huddled together comforting ourselves in a war-torn nation. Some will. Many Christian families will attend services in the midst of flickering candles in old churches with ears listening for air raid sirens in Ukraine. Some Christians in Bethlehem will gather in the centuries-old Church of the Nativity. Although not likely to celebrate the birth of the Christ child, some (Muslims and Jews) within a few miles of his birth place will know that two billion people in the world will mark His birth in some way. They are uneasy or perhaps even unable to worship. The bombs are imminent. Some will mourn the loss of friends and family; many in the Gaza Strip will be searching for food, water, or medical attention.

But we will worship or, at least, have the option of worship. I will pray at the altar that Jesus, the Prince of Peace, will come into the hearts and minds of the leaders of this world and turn their thoughts of fear, worldly power, hate, revenge, and retribution into thoughts of reconciliation, diplomacy, and forgiveness.

Sadly, we will not see world peace in our remaining years. But we know what peace is. We know that forgiveness, mercy, lives given over to love for others, works. At Christmas, we see that which will come. We will gratefully acknowledge the coming of the Savior in Bethlehem, the coming of the Savior on the clouds of glory in the future, and, most important, the coming of the Savior into our experience of the present. We will come to the altar to experience a foretaste of the heavenly banquet. We will celebrate the passage of COVID and Hurricane Ian. But those events of recent memory are merely rough spots on the road compared to the ongoing violence in Ukraine, in Israel, and in Gaza.

Christmas is a time to think and pray about peace on earth. Surely, this year, we have much to think and pray about. May our prayers reach to the highest heaven and may they be returned to change the hearts of those who know no peace, who want no peace, who glory in chaos and death. We who are people of peace have seen peace in the form of a baby, wrapped in swaddling clothes in the straw of a manger. His peace will come. If nothing else, the survivors of war-torn cities and communities have that to hope for.
