

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FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR KEN

A few years ago I met a woman who was raised in Vienna as a child. On Christmas Eve, 1946, she and her family were gathered in their cold apartment in front of a tree which her mother had gotten from the woods. Like many others, they were the surviving victims of a disastrous war. In spite of the temptation to wallow in despair, they gathered to sing Christmas carols. When they had gone through a round or two of old favorites, they feasted on pudding made from cornstarch without sugar and they drank unsweetened tea.

They were happy. They sang and sang and sang. They had a roof over their heads when many did not. They had each other; many had lost family members in the war. And most important, they had the Christ child in their hearts when many did not on that evening in the rubble and ruins of post-war Europe. And when they went to bed at 2 a.m., they were still so happy and they kept right on singing and singing warmed by each other under their "Federbetten."

And so did the shepherds so long ago bed down that night with their flocks, singing in their hearts the song of the angels and the glory of a baby in the manger. Reduced to its simplest component, Christmas is about the celebration of the Christ child in one's heart.

Christmas has lost its simplicity and its focus on the birth of a baby in long-ago Bethlehem. C. S. Lewis once pointed out that the exchange of gifts was a very small ingredient in the older English festivity. Scrooge ordered a turkey for his clerk and toys and fruit were given to children but that was about it. And the same was essentially true for the older American colonial celebration of Christmas. Again according to Lewis, the contemporary idea "that not only all friends but even all acquaintances should give one another presents...has been forced upon us by the shopkeepers."

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Lewis points out that the magi gave gifts to the Christ child and that the gift came from God to us: the gift of the child of peace given to all humankind. It seems to me that the gift giving should not be the exchange of gifts (sometimes only suitable for "re-gifting") with each other but should be gifts to Jesus in the form of gifts to the less fortunate. Primary is the giving of our hearts, our time, our prayers, our meditation at Christmas. Parties, gift exchanges, cards, rich foods, and shopping are not excluded but worship and inward "songs of the heart" will best serve the "reason for the season."

When life was reduced to the basics after a horrible war, the hearts of the children in that cold apartment in Vienna were forced by circumstances to find expression in the true meaning of Christmas. Forced by circumstances in this year of COVID-19, we will have to adapt our usual Christmas plans to avoid unnecessary contact with our family and friends. But the Christ child will warm our hearts and minds nevertheless. Perhaps we will be forced to discard some of the usual trappings of the holidays and enjoy the opportunities forced upon us by a pandemic to behold the gift of God, the baby in the manger. May the peace of the Christ child be with you and yours this Christmas. Our Christmas Eve services will held at 6 p.m. If you feel safe, please join us to welcome the child of Bethlehem again in mutual fellowship, word, and sacrament.
