

FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR KEN

Already our thoughts are beginning to turn toward the celebration of the holidays. Thoughts in that direction came to me when I recently visited Home Depot and Wal-Mart to get some supplies for my house. I could not believe it. Thanksgiving and Christmas already? I remembered my return from a visit to Europe in September a few years ago. I went to Wal-Mart to buy an alarm clock. My attention was caught by the familiar strains of "Frosty the Snowman." I was amazed by a large display of Christmas items prominently positioned to catch the eye of any shoppers entering and clearing the checkout area. I saw "Precious Moments" angels, Santa-capped Winnie the Pooh's, and three-foot straw reindeer in an aisle I entered in my search for the alarm clock department.

I was so incensed by what I saw that I decided to write a letter to David Glass, the president of Wal-Mart Stores, Inc. I opined that it was insensitive to confront shoppers with Christmas "supplies" so many weeks before Christmas. I noted that C.S. Lewis accused the shopkeepers of the England of his day of encouraging "profane attempts to keep up some superficial connection with the Nativity." I asked Mr. Glass to consider some sensitive restraint. I received a reply from Wal-Mart assuring me that Wal-Mart "always strives to serve the best interests of its customers." It was a form letter. I wrote a second letter to Mr. Glass and did not receive a reply to that letter. I published my letters and my thoughts in the Venice Gondolier and took the matter as President to the Venice Ministerial Association. I encouraged my fellow clergy and my readers to express their feelings to their local retailers. There was little or no reaction to the expression of my concerns. The mighty outcry I envisioned never happened. I failed to raise up the hue and cry of the rabble.

Oh well, here we go again. The truth of the matter is that neither I nor you can do much to check the secular tendency to exploit religious holidays for the sake of hedonistic self-indulgence. But we can observe the holiday season in accordance with our religious and spiritual traditions and beliefs. The celebration of Thanksgiving will occur in just a few weeks. No matter the outcome of the presidential election, we will give thanks for the democracy in which we live. Soon thereafter, the liturgical season of Advent will begin on the first Sunday in Advent on November 29. We will dedicate ourselves to preparation to receive the coming of Jesus in three epiphanies: the coming of Jesus to Bethlehem 2,000 years ago, the coming of Jesus into our hearts and minds in the present, and the coming of Jesus again at the end of time upon the clouds of Glory. The liturgical color of Advent is blue, the color of the sky whence our Savior will come again.

And then, beginning on Christmas Eve, we will celebrate the birth of our Savior. The Christmas season begins on December 25 and continues for twelve days until Epiphany on January 6, the celebration of the visit of the wise men in Bethlehem.

There is little we can do about the trivialization of our religious holidays except to celebrate in our hearts the great glad tidings that "Jesus is the reason for the season." Well, happy holidays. Next month I plan to express some thoughts about Christmas in the 21st century.

OCTOBER 2020 COUNCIL MEETING KEY POINTS

C12.01 of the CLC Constitution states that "the voting membership of the congregation Council shall consist of the pastor(s), deacon(s), the officers of this congregation, and at least one (1) member (a total not fewer than five or more than nine members)." Current Council members (5) made a decision to invite two more year round CLC members to become a part of the Council bringing the number up to 7 for the remainder of this term. Dottie Berner and Fran Kulak will be installed on the first Sunday in November.

Although no Fellowship Team Leader is in place, thanks to Angie Ziegler, the Fellowship Coffee Time after the service will resume in November. Simple bakery items will be available. All donations for supplies (either monetary or culinary) are always appreciated.

Council member and Worship and Music Team Member, Dorothy Gramstad has graciously offered to purchase a new 24" Advent Wreath for the altar. There will be no Advent services this year, but plans for a beautiful Christmas Eve Service are under way. Anyone wishing to purchase a \$10.00 poinsettia to brighten the church with the color of the season should place an order into the church office by December 11. The Christmas tree will be set up on December 13 immediately after the service. Many hands make light work for the celebration of His birth.
