Our CLC community has been busy for almost 5 years turning a ministry facing extinction into a viable faith presence in the Englewood community. We will celebrate CLC's recovery from Hurricane Ian on Saturday, Feb. 8, in the Fellowship Hall and we will celebrate the gift of a new organ on Sunday, Feb. 16 when we attend a concert on the new organ by Richard Benedum.

We need to gratefully acknowledge that the Spirit has blessed us but, sadly, many congregations of the ELCA are struggling to stay open. Many have closed their doors. The larger picture is not hopeful. I mentioned in my sermon on December 22 that church attendance in America has declined from 42 percent to 30 percent since 2000. And the 30 percent that attend church do not attend every Sunday. Today we enjoy school extracurricular activities on Sunday, more options due to affluence, cheaper and easier mobility, more social opportunities, more technology offering more options for pastime, and perhaps a cultural optimism that rules out a feeling for dependence on a supreme being. One mother of two young children recently expressed her view that "millennialists no longer go to church." As I mentioned on Jan. 19, one comedian (Roy Wood Jr.) laments the tendency of Americans to lose connection with one another. Going quickly are conversations with cashiers in Home Depot or Publix thanks to touchscreen, automated ordering, and DoorDash-ing. (TIME, 1-27-24, p.80)

Where are we going? God knows. But I know that we should not throw in the towel. Thanks to the encouragement of their prophets, the people of Judah in exile in Babylon were encouraged not to throw in the towel. They had to wait patiently for 50 years but they were freed from their bondage when a new world leader, Cyrus of Persian, conquered the Babylonian empire and freed the Jewish prisoners. They seized the moment, returned to their homeland, and began to rebuild their temple and their beautiful Jerusalem. They also reclaimed their ancestral faith. They were summoned to a rally in front of the city water gate to hear the reading of God's law and message by their leader, Ezra. (Nehemiah 8)

American Christians need to reclaim their faith and their values without insisting that America be white and "Christian" again. There's nothing "Christian" about demanding that all American be white and Christian. A Christian nation will invite all who seek freedom to come to our shores, Christian or not. The faith of Christianity is won not through coercion, but through witness and we will celebrate the freedom and our "recovery" in order to witness in the following weeks.

The church has faced obstacles and dead ends before. Our present study of the apocalyptic literature in the Bible, including the book of Revelation, is a study of the endurance of the faith. The church has a reputation for becoming stronger in the face of persecution (or cultural drift). Our commitment to our ministry at CLC is an act of faith. The apocalyptic books of the bible constitute a statement about the victory of Christ. His death was a victory over sin, death, and the devil. It was also a victory over secularism, the distraction of technology, and loss of cultural curiosity about deeper questions concerning origin, destiny, and purpose. What is the purpose of human life? No purpose? Hedonism? Accumulate wealth? Get more "stuff" than anyone else?

I recently presided over a "celebration of life" for Conrad Andrzejewski, the husband of Ilse, who died after a number of years as a faithful member of CLC. Conrad was a good-natured man who dedicated his life not only to work for the government but also to work in the community. He helped his neighbors prepare their IRS returns and loved family life. He was called to be a follower of Christ on the day of his baptism in a Polish-Catholic Church in Baltimore and manifested that call in his life. There are many "Conrad's" and "Ilse's" in our congregation. Let us keep the faith. Let us rejoice in the victory of Christ.

OUR LUTHERAN HERITAGE




