Maritime Matters of the Month

•Model Diorama of Damaged Moskva Russian Missile

Cruiser (Ken Lum). Wow, some people just can't wait! While surfing YouTube, I found someone already having built a model diorama of the damaged Russian cruiser, Moskva, based on released news photos. Here is the URL of that build by someone nicknamed "Studio Blueocean".

As everyone recalls, this was the Russian guided missile cruiser which was sunk near Odessa in the Black Sea, April 14, during the current Russo-Ukrainian War. The model is apparently based on a 1/350 Trumpeter model (Fig. 3). And Trumpeter also supplies a 1/700 version as well (Fig. 4). The kits offer waterline and full hull options. The 1/350 model offers photoetch radar antennae with the kit, and there is a third party vendor for brass gun barrels.




Fig. 6. No, the *Moskva* was not sunk by the Colossus of Rhodes! Well, maybe the Colossus of Ukraine! (Studio Blueocean)

Kít News (Ken Lum):

•New Kit of German Heavy Cruiser, Prinz Eugen. Last August in the Foghorn, I announced the arrival of a new kit from Amati of the German Battleship, Bismarck in 1/200 scale. This month I wanted to inform everyone that a similar wood model kit by OcCre, of the heavy cruiser Prinz Eugen, also in 1/200 scale, has been released. The Prinz Eugen accompanied the Bismarck during the latter's only sortie in May 1941 in an attempt to raid allied supply shipping during operation Rheinübung (Rhine exercise). While the Bismarck was sunk, Prinz Eugen was successful in evading the pursuing Royal Navy and put in for repairs at Brest in German-occupied France.

Following further operations in WW 2, including the famous **Channel Dash** to Brunsbüttel in Germany, *Prinz Eugen* was surrendered after the war to the British and then handed over to the US Navy. After being examined by the Americans, she was towed out to the Pacific where she was used as a target for two atomic bomb tests which the ship survived. Then she was towed to Kwajalein Atoll in bad shape where she capsized. The wreck was a hazmat site due to radiation contamination, but was determined to be safe as of 1974. It is still present there to this day following an extremely eventful career.

The kit is available from Ages of Sail for \$399.00. It makes a suitable companion model with the 1/200 *Bismarck* and a 1/200 *HMS Hood* (available in plastic), perhaps. A YouTube video of the unboxing of the kit can be found here:

Methods to Our Marítime Madness

•Walt Hlavacek's Method for Finishing his Display Cases (Walt Hlavacek).

Walt Hlavaceck perhaps makes the best display cases in the club, and he has made many of them for various projects. Here is an example of one of his creations along with a cross-sectional demonstration of how its parts are joined at the corners (Fig. 12).

Here is his account of how he applies his wood finish.

Finishing Cases

Wood Finishing, depending on desired results, has some basic processes I follow:

After machining my material, I sand with a 150 grit Aluminum Oxide paper product from 3M. This removes any machining marks and provides a smooth open grain finish.

Wipe down with a tack cloth to remove any dust.

A Minwax Sanding Sealing is then liberally applied and when dry is sanded allowing for stain or finish. I use a 220 grit Aluminum Oxide paper product. This process fills the soft grain of the wood so the stain or first clear coat finish will apply evenly. It seems to enhance the grain slightly for natural clear finishes.

Wipe down with a tack cloth to remove dust.

A Stain, if desired, is applied and allowed to dry and is wiped down with a soft cloth to remove any excess material and blend the stain surface.

I apply the first coat of Krylon Clear Glaze finish. When dry, lightly sand using #0000 steel wool. This is just to knock off any raised grain which may have risen do to the first finish coat. Do not sand through the finish as this will affect the stained surface.

Wipe with a tack cloth and apply a second and third coat to build up surface finish. Allow to dry several days.

Using #0000 steel wool, rub surfaces to a dull finish. Wipe using a tack cloth to remove any loose steel wool fillings.

At this point you may spray with a clear or satin finish. This is a very light covering as you only want to bring the finish back up. As an alternate finish, I often use a Minwax Wipe-On Poly (Gloss or Satin) finish. The wipe on finish takes two or more coats depending on desired results.




Fig. 15. Another Jacob Cohn creation, the US Revenue cutter, *Alert*, from Krick models with some progress on deck houses.




Fig. 19. One of the *Papegojan's* masts with the top. The mast is a wooden dowel rod while the top is made from paper parts.
