Fig.1. After the American Revolution, the Federal Government began to establish various revenue streams in an effort to finance its operations. One of these streams was to come from import tariffs imposed on sea-going trade. But rampant smuggling made enforcement of these tariffs difficult. Then on August 4, 1790, at the encouragement of Secretary of the Treasury, Alexander Hamilton, Congress established the Revenue-Marine to enforce these tariff laws. This service was eventually merged with the US Life-Saving Service in 1915 to become the **United States Coast Guard**. This model from a **Blue Jacket Ship Crafters** kit is an example of one of these early Revenue Cutters. (Blue Jacket Ship Crafters).

Marítíme Matters of the Month

•<u>Museum of Science and Industry, Chicago, IL (Ken</u> <u>Lum)</u>

I grew up in Chicago which is, perhaps, not well known as a center for maritime history to say the least. Nonetheless, it does sit next to Lake Michigan and there is a proud maritime heritage to this city which should be better appreciated. To help this happen, an outstanding collection of ship models is located in the **Museum of Science and Industry (MSI)** (Fig. 4) in the **Hyde Park** neighborhood on the south side of the city and near the campus of the University of Chicago. The museum was founded in 1933 in an exposition building built for the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition. **Julius Rosenwald**, then president of Sears, Roebuck and Company, along with others from the **Commercial Club of Chicago**, financed renovation of the original Exposition building into the present MSI building. Its exhibitions were modeled on those of the **Deutsches Museum** in Munich, Germany which is also devoted to exhibiting topics in science, technology, and industry and also has an outstanding ship model collection illustrating the development of ships over time.

A. Ship's Gallery

The models from various builders began to be acquired during the 1930s mostly under the supervision of **Major Carlos de Zafra** (Fig.5) who was an Engineering professor at New York University and became Curator of Shipbuilding & Navigation at MSI.

My last visit to the exhibition was in 2013 when the models looked to have not been cleaned or conserved since opening in the 1930s and looked mostly the same as it did when I was in high school. Nonetheless, all 43 of the models were still in good shape despite acquiring a thin patina of about 80 years of dust.

Fortunately, it appeared the museum staff agreed with me that the models at least needed a cleaning and proceeded with an extensive renovation of the exhibit in 2016. Not only did they bring in a team of expert conservators from Litas Liparini Studio of Chicago to clean the models, but the exhibit area was completely remodeled and modernized to better tell

the story of sea-borne transport and the maritime history of the Great Lakes.

Some additional models were added to the collection to round out the narrative and the **Oracle America's Cup Team USA** has contributed one of their racing catamarans to add an exhibit on racing which has connected the MSI to the Bay Area (I have not seen this part of the exhibit although I did see the America's Cup races involving these yachts on San Francisco Bay in 2013).

Below are photos of some of the outstanding models as I saw them in 2013 before they were cleaned. All photos were taken by me.




Fig. 16. US Light Cruiser USS Brooklyn 1936.

B. U-505 German Submarine Exhibit The MSI is unique in having the captured German WW2 vintage U-boat, **U-505** (Fig.17), submarine on exhibit, the only one in the US. **U-505** is a Type IXC submarine that served with the Kiregsmarine from 1942 until her boarding and capture by an American Task Force on June 4, 1944. Prior to her capture, she was credited with sinking 8 merchant ships.

While on patrol off the coast of **Rio de Oro** in the western Sahara, **American Task Force TG 22.3** under the command of **Captain Daniel V. Gallery**, made a sonar contact with the submerged *U-505*. The escort carrier, *USS Guadalcanal*, in the TG launched aircraft to search for the submarine while accompanying destroyer escorts closed in on the target location (Fig.18 & 19).

The closest destroyer, **USS Chatelain**, began depth-charging **U**-**505** forcing it to surface just 600m away. Ships from the TG immediately began firing their weapons on the U boat. **Oberleutnant zur See Harald Lange**, commander of **U-505**, gave orders to abandon and scuttle the ship believing the submarine to be too severely damaged to fight against such overwhelming odds.

USS Chatelain and **Jenks** began picking up survivors while a boarding party from **USS Pillsbury** under **Lt. Albert David** entered **U-505** through its conning tower. Finding the submarine completely abandoned, they secured charts and codebooks, closed scuttling valves, and disarmed demolition charges (Fig.20). The submarine was eventually pumped out and taken under tow by **USS Guadalcanal.**




Fig. 21. Left-View towards the forward torpedo tubes. Looks like the cleaning crew has tidied up **Das Boot!**

Believing the nearby port of **Casablanca in** French Morocco was infiltrated by German spies, towing was transferred to the fleet tug, **USS Abnaki**, which took the sub 1,700 nautical miles west across the Atlantic to the US Navy's Naval Operating Base in Bermuda in order to maintain secrecy. The Kriegsmarine believed all of the crew of **U-505** was lost at sea while the Americans Isolated the surviving crew as POWs in Louisiana in great secrecy not to be returned until 1947. **U-505** Signalman First Class **Gottfried Fischer** was the only fatality of the entire operation.

Subsequently, Lt. Albert David, who led the boarding party, was given the Medal of Honor while Captain Daniel Gallery, who conceived and led the mission, received the Navy Distinguished Service Medal. Numerous awards were also issued to many other participants and the Task Group was awarded the Presidential Unit Citation.

After the war, the US Navy decided to use the **U-505** for target practice. However, Captain Gallery's brother, **Father John Gallery**, contacted **Lenox Lohr**, President of the MSI in Chicago which was interested in acquiring a submarine for exhibition. After a successful local fund-raising effort, the **U-505** was towed to Chicago via the St. Lawrence River and set up as an outdoor exhibit and War Memorial in 1954.

Upon finding corrosion in 2004 from exposure to the harsh Chicago weather, a big operation was started to move the submarine into a protected underground indoor exhibit area in front of the Museum. Along with some restoration, the ship was reopened to the public as an indoor exhibit in 2005. A great time-lapse video about how that was done can be found on YouTube at:

It's pretty spine-tingling to see how such a major operation was handled!

The **U-505** is one of many great things to see in Chicago so I encourage everyone to go there to see this extraordinary artifact and compare it to our own **USS Pampanito** in San Francisco if possible! YouTube has many video tours of this famous submarine as well.

•<u>Other Maritime Sights in Illinois</u> There are several other maritime attractions in Illinois despite its relative inland location. I will write about these in the next Foghorn!

Methods to Our Marítíme Madness

•<u>Painting Decorative Friezes</u> A number of mostly 18th Century vintage ship and boat models have very elegant frieze decorations painted into their bow trailboards, railings and stern transoms. These can be seen in such kits as the **Medway Longboat** kit from Model Shipways and the Syren Ship Model company (Fig. 23).




Fig. 25. Replicating a decorative pattern onto a piece of paper for practice or that can be cut out and glued in place. (O. Batchvarov)

These can be painted freehand like the model builders of old (Fig. 24), patterns transferred to the model from printed stencils that are painted over, painted on printed paper stencils that can be glued in place (Fig. 25), or made from photo-etch patterns such as those provided by Vanguard Models (Fig. 26). This last option mostly is available only for manufactured model kits.

The well-known ship modeler, **Olha Batchvarov**, has put together a nice YouTube video on her way of applying painted friezes to ship models.

In this version, Ms. Batchvarov practiced painting a replica pattern on paper first. Then she repeated the process on her model. Apparently, she felt the photo-etch version was too perfect and the hand-painted version looked more authentic to an original Admiralty dockyard model.
